What's in your toolbox?

Many years ago, I set some personal goals for myself with hopes that reaching those goals would help me attain improved career opportunities. I didn't know it, but what I really did was build a career advancement "tool kit." It seems like a stretch to compare such things as education, experience and occupational certifications to wrenches, hammers and sockets, but think about this: a missing tool cannot help you complete a task. When you need a certain size wrench to turn a bolt, nothing else will do!



Your work history and experience are valuable to your employer, and can help lock in that new job. But more often, there are more qualifications that are essential for the position:

Work Experience and History - A strong work ethic, a positive attitude and a willingness to be there when your employer needs you will carry you a long way. The old saying, "It's hard to find good help" has a solid ring of truth to it. If you are the "good help" you should make yourself invaluable to your employer. Be accountable and honest with your employer, and you should expect that in return. Stay out of inter-office politics or gossip - it will lead you down a rocky road. Always be prepared with knowledge and facts about the current project. Go the extra mile but don't burn yourself out. In the words of Bill Gates, "You have to make them need you."

Trade/Occupational Certification - An FAA airframe and power-plant certificate, a computer or networking certification, an FCC license and an EMT certification are examples of a trade certification that can open doors to you. In the government sector, they may not be required but may be useful to help showcase your experience. If you are currently working in a field that offers a certification, find out what the process is to obtain the license or certification. It may be useful to climb the career ladder, it may open doors for you and you might even learn more about your chosen occupation.

Associate's, Bachelor's, and Master's Degrees - If you are enrolled in the University of Arkansas OMGT program, it is safe to assume you have a degree. Encourage your coworkers or mentor a subordinate by encouraging them to set and achieve educational goals. Having a Bachelor's degree is one tool in your box that is invaluable, if the help wanted ad requires one. Sometimes it is not so clear why a Master's degree is important; however, it is a "specialty tool" that is absolutely essential to achieving that next level in employment opportunities. Many employers require you to have a Master's degree to move to upper level management. Even if it is not required it may edge your resume to the top of the pile against other candidates. Today's workplace is an ever more competitive environment for those seeking to move up. If all other factors are equal (experience, work history, certifications), the Master's degree may be all the separates you from the pack.

The UA Operations Management degree provides you with challenges you need to hone your speaking and writing skills, improve your critical thinking processes and understand the need for technology driven management tools. When you earn this degree you have placed an invaluable tool into your inventory, and when you need it, it will serve you well.
