THE WCO

The Women's Communications Office welcomes your interest in the Lady Razorback volleyball program. We will make every effort to make your coverage of the LadyBacks enjoyable. Any additional information, interviews or photos may be requested from the Women's Communications Office, Room 102, in Barnhill Arena. Please note that all interviews with players and coaches must be arranged through the Communications Office. Phone interviews with out-of-town media are encouraged and can also be arranged. Coach Poole and his staff are generally available in their offices weekdays between 9:00 a.m. and noon. All requests for information should be made to Jeri Thorpe in the Communications Office.

The University of Arkansas has separate men's and women's athletics departments. As a result all support services are also separate. Please keep this in mind when requesting information on Lady Razorback teams, and be sure to contact the Women's Communications Office in Barnhill Arena.

ON THE WEB

The official home page for the University of Arkansas Women's Athletics Department begins its 10th year of full-time operation in 2006-07. LADYBACKS.COM is a one-stop source for fans and media members. All Women's Communications Office press releases and statistics are posted on the web site as well as highlight video packages with post-game quotes. In addition, live stats are available for all home matches and live radio is available for many home and away contests. Arkansas will also provide fans with live video from select matches. Point your browser to: LADYBACKS.COM.

CREDENTIALS

Media credentials for Arkansas women's events may be obtained by contacting Thorpe

in the WCO. Credentials may be picked up at 102 Barnhill Arena up to the day of the event or at media will call one hour prior to event time.

Members of the media are supplied with weekly press releases including updated individual and team statistics and information on upcoming events. On event days, the WCO staff will distribute event programs, individual and team stats and any pre-event information.

PHOTOGRAPHY

Photography credentials are issued to newspapers, wire services and special periodical publications on a first-come, first-served basis. No flash photography is permitted and strobe use must be approved in advance with the WCO. Photographers are required to stay behind the marked areas behind the playing area. There has been a rule change for photographers to establish the media area as within one meter of the boundary defining the playable area. Media are NOT allowed in front of the team benches or between the attack lines on the bench side of the court.

LIVE RADIO/TV

The University of Arkansas Women's Athletics Department retains all copyrights to its home events. All visiting media must contact the WCO 48 hours prior to the game to make arrangements. Opponents may be subject to line charges as well as rights fees. The use of courtesy lines are at the discretion of the visiting SID. Others requesting a phone line should contact SBC directly. Requests for live or tape-delayed television rights should be made one week in advance, and in writing, to the WCO.

FACILITIES/PARKING

Barnhill Arena is located on Stadium Drive adjacent to the football stadium. Please drop your athletes off at the South entrance to Barnhill before parking vans or cars. Parking permits are not required after 5 p.m. Monday-Friday or weekends. If you will be in Barnhill during regular business hours, please make arrangements to receive a parking pass from associate head coach Holly Watts as tickets may be issued. Parking can be found at LadyBack Yard south of the arena or in The Pit (the football stadium) north of the arena. Parking is also available at the parking lot west of Barnhill Arena.

WIRELESS/INTERNET

The Women's Athletics Department is installing a wireless access point in

Barnhill Arena for visiting media to use. Please contact Thorpe for more information.

LADY RAZORBACK TV

The Arkansas Women's Athletics Department begins its fourth year of Lady Razorback TV. The 21-episode series begins the first week of November and runs until the beginning of May 2006, and covers all 11 Lady Razorback teams. Each coach will host during their primary season. It airs in Fayetteville and Fort Smith on the FOX affiliate, KPBI-TV on Saturdays. The show repeats in the northwest Arkansas market on Sundays at 10 a.m. on KFDF-TV, as well as on Cox Sports Arkansas and UATV, the on-campus cable channel. It airs in the central Arkansas area via Cox Sports, and is available across the country on Cox Sports channels. It is also available on-line at LADYBACKS.COM, along with special web-only editions of the show. Blair Cartwright returns for another season as the show's award-winning producer and director. Cartwright also serves as the co-host along with the LadyBack coaches. Bill Smith is the executive producer.

A Closer Look At The Schedule

⇒ Arkansas opens the season with a tournament at Oklahoma - the first time the Lady Razorbacks have played a tournament during the regular season in Norman. Arkansas faces Idaho, North Carolina and host Oklahoma, meeting the Vandals for the first time in program history. Arkansas is 0-1 against North Carolina, falling to the Tar Heels in 2003. The Lady'Backs are 2-0 against the Sooners with the most recent meeting coming in 2002.

⇒ Arkansas hosts a tournament the second weekend of the season. It marks the 12th time in 13 seasons the Lady'Backs have hosted a regular-season tournament. The break came in 2003.

⇒ The Lady'Backs host Sacramento State, Southeast Missouri State and Stephen F. Austin in the home tournament. Arkansas is 0-1 against Sac State (1994), 1-1 against SEMO and 3-0 against SFA.

⇒ Arkansas next travels to Kansas for tournament action facing BYU and host Kansas in a pair of afternoon matches.

⇒ The Southeastern Conference schedule changed this year and teams will play a double-round robin. Each SEC team plays a home-and-home with the other 10 conference schools, so Arkansas travels to each of the other 10 schools this year and all travel to Fayetteville. The change brings the number of conference matches to 20, up from 16 last year.

⇒ Arkansas faces nine NCAA Tournament teams this year. The schedule is highlighted by Tennessee who reached the semifinals before being eliminated by eventual national champion Washington. Florida advanced to the elite eight and the perennial powerhouse Gators are loaded for the 2005 season. North Carolina, Sacramento State, Kansas, BYU, Kentucky, LSU and Alabama all reached the NCAA Tournament but fell in the first round.

⇒ Arkansas plays in 13 home matches this year and hosts an additional three matches during the Arkansas Invitational.

Barnhill Arena - Home of Arkansas Volleyball



Is it the fans? Is it the facility? Is it the band and cheerleaders?

It's all of those elements that make Barnhill Arena, the home of the Lady Razorbacks, one of the toughest volleyball venues in the country.

Renovated several times, Barnhill Arena officially closed its doors as one of the most feared basketball facilities in the country March 3, 1993. It was reconfigured into the largest volleyball-only arena in time for the inaugural season in 1994.

The Barn underwent a second significant face lift prior to the 2002 season to welcome gymnastics.

Barnhill Arena was authorized in 1953 as the University's new multipurpose arena. Named for athletic director John Barnhill, the Fieldhouse, as it was originally known, underwent a drastic renovation in 1976-78. The renovation created the seating arrangement that turned the facility into a basketball-only configuration.



March 3, 1993, closed Barnhill's career as a basketball facility with a gala party, complete with a coast-to-coast broadcast of the Arkansas-LSU men's game on ESPN and closing ceremonies carried live statewide.

As the home of Lady'Back volleyball, Barnhill underwent renovation of its playing surface to convert the then 19-year-old hardwood floor to a volleyball configuration. It was unveiled to the public during Arkansas' summer camps, including the first-ever volleyball camp at the Fayetteville campus in 1994. In addition to the on-the-court renovation, the Lady Razorback volleyball program was provided

with a state-of-the-art locker room. The locker room features a lounge area, team room with a large-screen television and VCR for viewing film and a changing room with lockers and showers.

Barnhill again underwent changes in the summer of 2002. The volleyball-only facility welcomed the addition of gymnastics for the 2003 season and the facility was given a face-lift to remain one of the best in the country. Changes included new paint on the court, expanding the borders to 10 feet, and refinishing and lightening the surrounding wood surfaces.

New lights, including specialized "show lights" with shutters that allow for instant "on-off" capabilities, and new seating were some of the other changes.

Barnhill Arena also serves as office space for the Lady Razorbacks. Several coaches' offices, most of the teams' locker rooms and the training and equipment rooms are located here.

When first-ever head coach Chris Poole agreed to coach volleyball at the University of Arkansas, he had a lot of work ahead of him.

There were no assistants, no players, no equipment and no locker room.

The 1993 and 1994 seasons proved to be busy ones for Poole with renovations to Barnhill Arena and the construction of the first locker room.

Since that time, the Lady Razorback locker room has been updated featuring an entry hallway with all-conference and all-district honors and a wall dedicated to the Lady'Back all-Americans.

In addition, a year-by-year time line featuring a key photograph from each season lines the team room. A hardwood court replica is home to the video equipment and is where the Lady'Backs meet for their "chalk talk."



Also at home in Barnhill Arena is the first-ever museum dedicated solely to female athletes at the collegiate level.

The Lady Razorback Museum features highlights from all 11 of Arkansas' teams with a special section for the volleyball team. This area houses Arkansas' 11 Southeastern Conference Western Division trophies as well as the SEC Tournament trophy.

Arkansas' Time Is Now

As the 2006 season approaches and a new senior class steps into the limelight, we find that their goals are really no different than the countless classes that came before them. Get to the next level.

The difference this year at Arkansas is that the senior class has done something about that goal. They have re-dedicated themselves to an off-season training program in the hope of leading this year's edition of the Arkansas volleyball team one step further.

Arkansas put a solid season in the books last year with the program's ninth 20-win season in 12 years of volleyball. The team won a share of the Southeastern Conference Western Division title for the 11th time and earned the program's eighth selection to the NCAA Tournament - the 10th post-season trip in program history.

In addition, individual honors were numerous highlighted by another solid blocking effort as Arkansas finished first in the SEC and 12th in the nation with 3.28 blocks per game. Last year's rising junior Amy Allison also led the SEC and was second in the country as an individual in blocking with 1.83 bpg and returns this year as a senior with bigger goals in mind.

"My individual goals are to lead the nation in blocks, to have a hitting percentage better than .300 and to be a good leader on the team," said Allison. "We want to be more than a mediocre team. We're ready to prove that we are just as good as the top teams in the country."

This year's senior class also includes a pair of outside hitters in Kele Brewer and Denitza Koleva. Their storied careers were successful from the first moment the duo set foot on campus. Koleva earned SEC Freshman of the Year honors and both have earned multiple individual honors.

The senior class has amassed a 65-35 record and a 36-12 SEC mark winning 75 percent of their league matches. They have helped Arkansas to the three NCAA Tournament appearances reaching the second round twice and captured three SEC Western Division titles, reaching the finals of the SEC Tournament in 2003.

Despite all of the success, this year's team wants even more and the corps of senior leadership combined with a hungry underclassmen base is bound to help Arkansas reach this year's goals.

SETTERS

Arkansas is most inexperienced at the setter position. The Lady Razorbacks have utilized a 6-2 offense with two setters rotating in the lineup in recent seasons but the graduation of senior Iva Docekalova

and retirement of junior Nicole Martin have depleted the Lady'Back setters.

Sophomore Caira Daugherty returns for her second season having seen action in 100 of Arkansas' 127 games last year. But the second-year player was used as a defensive specialist in 2005 and only recorded 15 assists. She had a pair of kills, eight service aces and 124 digs to go along with her assists.

The Springfield, Mo., native was recruited as a setter and saw a lot of action this spring but Daugherty may face a trial by fire when the season opens in August.

"The biggest question mark for our team this fall is the setting position," said Arkansas head coach Chris Poole. "We have always been very fortunate to have returning setters or experienced setters joining our team since Tina Rico tackled the job as a true freshman in our first season as a program. Iva (Docekalova) graduated in this spring and Nicole (Martin) has decided to take an early retirement from college volleyball. This has left us a hole that must be filled by Caira, and a pair of freshmen in Lindsay (Scanlan) and Ivana (Suput). All of these young ladies had successful careers as setters in high school and club ball, but none have college experience leading the team."

The Lady'Backs also welcome the addition of freshmen Lindsay Scanlan from Rockwall, Texas, and late addition Ivana Suput from Zitiste, Serbia.

Scanlan, 6-0 setter/outside hitter, played both positions for her high school team and the Dallas Force club team. Her experience will add depth to the setter po-



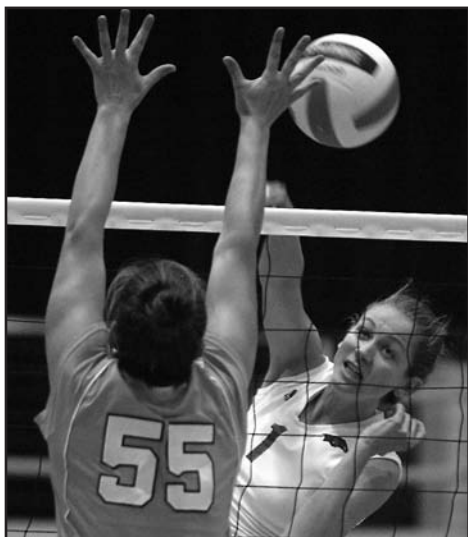

sition. Suput joined the roster in late July but her international playing experience is sure to be a plus for Arkansas.

"Ivana has played club ball for Zitiste Club since 10 years old," said Poole. "She is fast, aggressive and very athletic. She has very good passing, defensive, and serving skills. Ivana has the experience to add depth in our setting and libero position. We felt it was important to add more depth in our setting position and, while that position is going to be inexperienced, Ivana gives us another option to consider. We also felt it was a win/win situation with her libero experience because both Ashley and Kelli will be juniors this season."

OUTSIDE HITTERS

While the setters are a bit thin, Arkansas may be most deep at the hitter position. This year's offensive threat comes from seniors Brewer and Koleva along with junior Jessica Dorrell and sophomores Christina Lawrence and Kristin Seaton.

"Easily our most experienced group and the success of our team will rely heavily on our outsides hitters, both on the left and right side," said Poole. "Denny, Kele, Jessica, Christina are all returning starters from last season and all four can play both the left and right side. This will give us a lot of options for our serve receive and line-ups."

Forty percent of last year's kills were attributed to Koleva and Brewer and they ranked first and second, respectively on the team. Koleva recorded the top five

single match kill totals last year highlighted by a career-best 27 kills against Kansas State in a five-game thriller in Barnhill Arena early in the year. She also had plus-20 kill matches against South Carolina (24 kills) and Alabama (23 kills) last year.

Brewer's kill totals were down a bit from her previous two seasons as the Castroville, Texas, native recorded 317 kills compared to 356 her freshman year and 339 as a sophomore, but her service aces, dig totals and blocking numbers were all career-bests last year.

Koleva and Brewer also became members of the 1,000-kill club at Arkansas last year with Koleva ranking ninth all-time with 1139 kills and Brewer checking in at number 11 with 1012 career kills.

"Denny and Kele have been three year starters for us going into their senior season," said Poole. "They have been part of great success and their leadership will be counted on heavily, both on and off the court. We expect both of them to fight for a full rotation position and hope that this summer has paid off with continued work on their overall ball control."

Dorrell also continues to come on strong for Arkansas. Although the Aledo, Texas, native is not usually the primary focus of opponent defenses, Dorrell quietly puts up big numbers for the Lady Razorbacks. She improved her kill totals from her freshman campaign getting 271 last year to average 2.17 kills per game. Also up were her blocking numbers creeping over the one block per game milestone to 1.03 bpg last year.

"Jessica is a two time starter that is returning as a junior and we expect her

to have another great season," Poole added. "Jess led us in hitting percentage her freshman year and the first half of her sophomore season when an injury slowed her for the remainder of the season. She should have her jump back up from the spring and summer and we look for her to again be playing high above the net. Jessica has also improved her serve and backcourt defense to the point that she will also push for extra playing time full rotation."

Lawrence checks back into the Arkansas lineup from Sullivan, Mo. The multi-sport athlete redshirted her first season at Arkansas to play basketball but returned to the volleyball court full-time last year. Her inaugural season got out to a fast start as she earned all-tournament team honors and a pair of SEC Freshman of the Week awards.

"Christina was the surprise of last season," said Poole. "Although she came to Arkansas with great athleticism, she had never played club ball and had a lot to learn about the speed of the collegiate game. Christina was very determined during her red-shirt season in 2004 and came in with a bang in 2005 by earning all-tournament in our first tournament and her first taste of competitive volleyball. She has a lot of potential and we look forward to her continued growth the next three years."

Seaton rounds out the Arkansas outside hitters. The Fort Smith, Ark., native is really the dark horse of the bunch and was expected to surprise opponents this year.

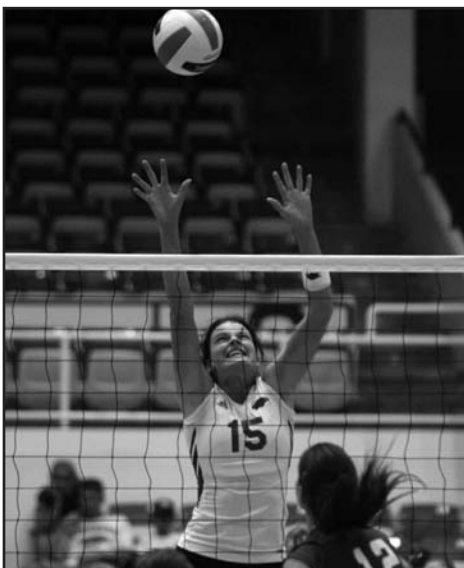

An off-season accident, however, has sidelined the second-year player and she is expected to miss the entire season in 2006.

"We are also hoping for a healthy Kristin Seaton this season," Poole said. "Kristin is one of the best athletes to ever play in our program. Unfortunately, she spent all last fall with a broken bone in her foot and it limited her greatly. After surgery over Christmas holidays, Kristin came back this spring working to recover and get herself in top college shape. We are hoping that we will be able to push her this fall and help her to reach her potential.

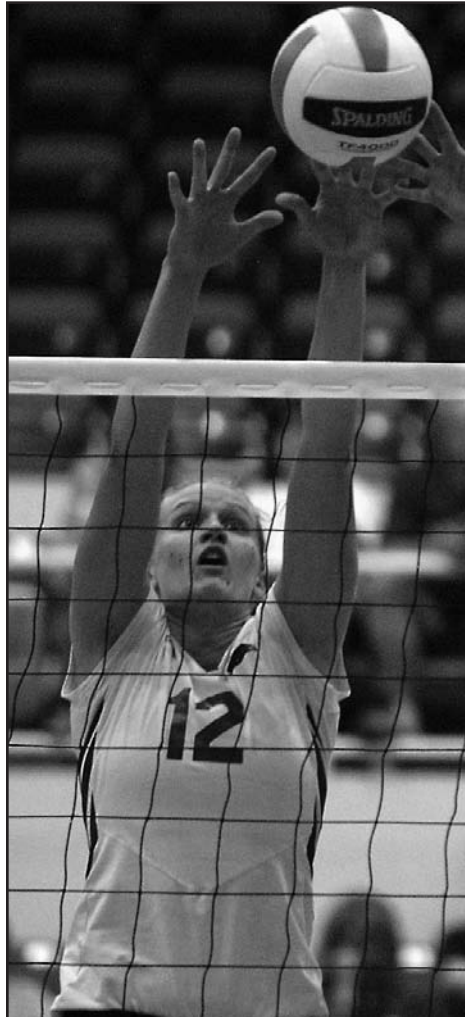
MIDDLE BLOCKERS

Destiny Clark and true freshman Catherine Fowler. Last year, Allison teamed with then-senior Karla Crose to handle much of the middle duties but this season, Allison will carry a heavier load and also guide the newcomers in this important position.

Allison's first two seasons with the Lady'Backs saw the Oklahoma native serve as a role player but her duties were expanded last year and Allison responded to the challenge.

"Amy is our only returning all-conference player from last season and really showed her improvement over her freshman and sophomore season," said Poole. "She was determined to step up big and it made a difference in our season and we will again court heavily on Amy's experience both on and off the court. Amy has very high expectations for herself this season and has dedicated this summer to being in the best shape of her life. She'll have to be a go-to player for us this season and will draw the assignment of trying to stop the top middle from each opponent.

Clark checks into the Arkansas lineup as a redshirt freshman. The gifted Kansas native was Poole's diamond-in-the-rough last year and a season's worth of training combined with spring playing opportunities have polished her playing skills.

Fowler was so excited about becoming a Lady Razorback that she graduated high school a semester early and joined the team in January. She has a jump start on other freshman having played all spring with the team.

"While Amy's experience gives her a head start, we are excited about the potential of our two other middles," continued Poole. "Destiny and Catherine are two of the most athletic middles in the country. Both these ladies jump over 10 feet and have a tremendous future. Although both are only a freshman in eligibility, we expect them to push for a starting position. The quicker they can continue to

adapt to the speed of the game, the more playing time they will see on the court. All three of these young ladies have a chance to contribute this season and we look forward to the competition in pre-season for the two middle blocker positions."

LIBEROS

The position of libero is still relatively new to the collegiate game and fans often wonder about the player in the opposite colored jersey. But the libero has significantly changed the game and Ashley Miller has forever changed the make up of the Lady Razorbacks.

In two seasons, Miller has rewritten Arkansas' dig records. She holds the top spot for digs in a match with 32 breaking one of the program's oldest records last year. In addition, Miller holds the top seven spots for digs in a five game match, the top two places for single season digs and ranks fifth with 1,058 career digs in just two seasons.

"Ashley is on her way to breaking most every digging stat that we have," said Poole. "She is the most experienced defensive player we have had in the program and her presence on the court is recognized by every team we play. Ashley is the heart of the team and a lot of our emotion and aggressiveness starts with how she plays the game."

Miller is not alone in her defensive prowess or her ability to spark the team. She is joined by junior Kelli Cole, an Arkansas native and true Lady Razorback.

Cole, more of a role player for the Lady'Backs in her first two seasons, is known for her ability to fire up the team whether she's on the court or on the sideline. She's willing to sacrifice her body and layout for a ball and always brings a lift to the team.

"Kelli has made incredible improvement over the last two years and we are very confident in her being out on the court," said Poole. "How much time we

can play the extra defensive specialist will depend greatly on the decision we make with a 5-1 or 6-2 offense. Both these young ladies respect each other and work hard together in every drill. It is nice to see the healthy competition they bring to the court every day."

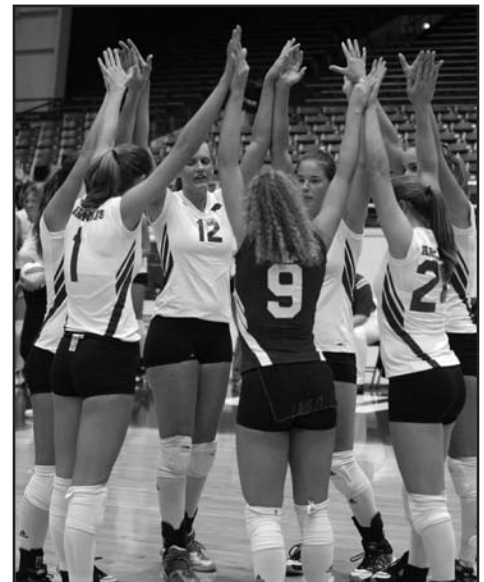

"I am excited about this season, even with the question mark of the setter position," concluded Poole. "We have depth in every position and a mixture of experience and athletic youth. Our schedule will be very tough, but we wanted to challenge our team from the beginning. Much of our success early will be determined by the work the girls put in this summer. Two weeks is not enough time to get a team ready for battle, therefore, we are dependent upon the work they have already put in since April. We will have a lot of decisions to make with our line-up in August, but feel good about the potential for more success this fall."

Anyone trying to understand the reason behind the University of Arkansas' unprecedented success on the court doesn't have to look any further than head coach Chris Poole.

Since arriving in Fayetteville in 1993, Poole personally handled every element of building the program from buying the first pieces of equipment, hiring the assistants and recruiting the players to renovating the court and building locker room facilities. The results are nothing short of phenomenal.

Since the first season Arkansas fielded a volleyball team in 1994, Poole has led the Lady Razorbacks to 11 Southeastern Conference Western Division titles. Add to that 10 postseason appearances - two NIVC and eight NCAA - along with the SEC Tournament title and numerous individual player honors.

Poole grew up in Heber Springs in north central Arkansas where he dreamed of one day becoming a coach at the University. Having faithfully watched Arkansas athletics his entire life, he understood the dedication to excellence and the commitment to quality the University demanded and he was a perfect match for the program's philosophy.

Poole dreamed of building a nationally recognized program from the beginning. Peo-

ple warned him that it would take years for Arkansas to become competitive in the SEC, not to mention on the national scene. Poole didn't seem to hear them.

Along the way, he made Arkansas, both its players and fans, believe in his dream.

He has produced two AVCA all-Americans, two AVCA honorable mention all-Americans, 22 players with 43 all-SEC honors, three SEC Freshmen of the Year and 22 AVCA all-district honorees.

In addition, Poole's teams get it done in the classroom as well with 58 SEC Academic Honor Roll selections, eight CoSIDA all-district, two H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete finalists and one McWhorter winner.

In their most recent season, Poole guided a young team to a 21-12 record and an 11-5 mark in SEC play. The Lady Razorbacks won a share of their 11th SEC Western Division title in 12 seasons and reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

Junior Amy Allison and redshirt freshman Christina Lawrence earned all-conference honors and Allison was selected to the conference all-tournament team.

Allison also emerged as the top blocker in the conference and finished the year ranked second in the nation in blocking with 1.83 bpg.

Are the Lady Razorbacks really dominant in the SEC West?

You bet.

Here's a quick look at what Poole's done in the conference. Since adding volleyball in 1994, Poole skippered Arkansas to a 288-129 overall record and a 144-40 record in the SEC regular season for a 78% league winning mark.

Poole and the Lady Razorbacks are even more impressive against the Western Division winning 11 of 12 titles. Arkansas is 109-8 versus the West during the regular season with a 93 percent winning percentage. Add to that seven perfect seasons against the West in 12 years and a perfect 8-0 record against Western Division teams in the SEC Tournament and it's easy to see why Arkansas is respected in the league and in the country.

Head Coach Chris Poole

How it all began.

The 1994 season saw Poole, who had spent an entire year away from competition while building his program, chomping at the bit to get on the court. His players, a small group of only seven that included five freshmen, a sophomore and junior, struggled to a 6-7 record before beginning SEC play.

But Poole believed in the dream and he made it come true by leading Arkansas to a 19-17 overall record, a 10-5 SEC mark and a SEC Western Division title with a perfect 10-0 divisional record in the first year of competition. The Lady Razorbacks finished third overall in the league behind nationally ranked Florida and Georgia that year and played well enough to earn a postseason bid to the National Invitational Volleyball Coaches tournament in Kansas City where they finished seventh in a field of 20 teams.

The team's accomplishments drew notice from the SEC as Poole was selected the 1994 SEC Coach of the Year, two players (Krystal Osborne and Jaimie Torromeo) earned all-SEC honors, and one player (Osborne) earned all-district honors.

Not a bad way to start.

It began an Arkansas tradition as the power of the SEC West with a near-perfect record against divisional opponents (76-6).

The second year of volleyball saw continued growth. Fan support increased as the crowds began to understand the game and believe in Poole and his players. Defending their Western Division title, Arkansas defeated LSU twice in three days to secure the divisional title and go into the SEC Tournament as the #1 seed. In addition, Arkansas again went undefeated against West opponents and picked up its first win against an Eastern foe that year.

Arkansas fared better in the SEC Tournament advancing to the championship match where they were eliminated by the #4 Florida Gators and went on to their second consecu-



tive NIVC Tournament. Poole took the program another step further as the Lady Razorbacks received their first-ever recognition in the USA TODAY/AVCA Top 25 Coaches poll.

After sharing the Western Division crown with Auburn in 1996, Poole took Arkansas to the next level, reaching the 48-team NCAA Tournament. The Lady Razorbacks, who won their first-round match, were excited about making the field of 48 as the NCAA expanded the tournament to include 56 teams in the 1997 tournament.

The 1997 season brought another feather for the Arkansas cap as the Lady Razorbacks upset fourth-ranked Florida to win their first SEC Tournament title. The Lady Razorbacks advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament and reached their highest ranking to date of 17th. In addition, Jessica Field was named AVCA All-American and Yarleen Santiago was named National Freshman of the Year. Poole earned District IV Coach of the Year, and Field (USA) and Santiago (Puerto Rico) went on to work out with national teams that summer.

Poole followed up by hosting the SEC Tournament in 1998 where the Lady'Backs finished second. The Lady Razorbacks went on to their best finish in the NCAA Tournament, hosting and winning the first two rounds before reaching the East Regional in Gainesville, Fla., where they lost to Hawai'i. Poole had his second all-American in Kim Storey that year.

The 1999 season was a question mark for the Lady Razorbacks. Gone were most of their big guns and left in their place were several talented but young players. Newcomers Libby Windell and Eftila Tanellari stepped up to team with veterans Santiago, Ning Zhao and Sandy Martin to give Arkansas its sixth divisional title and helped the team to again reach the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

Poole and the Lady Razorbacks had their most frustrating season in 2000. An up-and-down year saw Arkansas rebuild a young team but still capture several honors and awards. Included in the 2000 highlights were three all-

conference players and two all-district selections.

The next four seasons saw Arkansas continue to improve will returning to the NCAA Tournament. Tougher non-conference opponents and an expanded travel schedule have helped the Lady'Backs gain regional and national recognition.

Prior To Arkansas

Poole's ability to build was proven first with Arkansas Tech then at Arkansas State. He took over days prior to the 1987 season at ASU, and his first team showed the effects with a dismal 8-24 record. But with one season under Poole's careful tutelage, virtually the same team was 41-1 the next year, launching a five-year run of winning seasons for the Lady Indians.

His 1988 team had a 33-match win streak, longest in the nation, and posted a school-record 41-1 overall mark. The next year, ASU had a 34-match win streak, notched the Lady Indian record with 43 wins (43-6 overall) and was ranked ninth in the South Region.

In his last season at ASU, the Lady Indians were 41-6 and received an automatic bid into the NCAA tournament in 1992. ASU entered the 32-team NCAA field with the most wins of any team, but lost a tough four-game match to the Northwest Region's top-seeded team, Long Beach State.

Prior to ASU, Poole was an assistant and later head coach at Arkansas Tech. In two seasons as head coach at ATU, he posted a 53-20 record, winning the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference title in 1985 as co-head coach and finishing runner-up as head coach in 1986. He started his collegiate career in 1983-84 as a graduate assistant for the nationally ranked Arkansas Tech Golden Suns. Tech was 58-9 and a perfect 24-0 conference mark in two seasons with Poole as an assistant coach.

A 1983 graduate of Arkansas Tech, Poole and his wife, Toni, a former Arkansas State track and field standout, have two children, son Joshua and daughter Taylor.

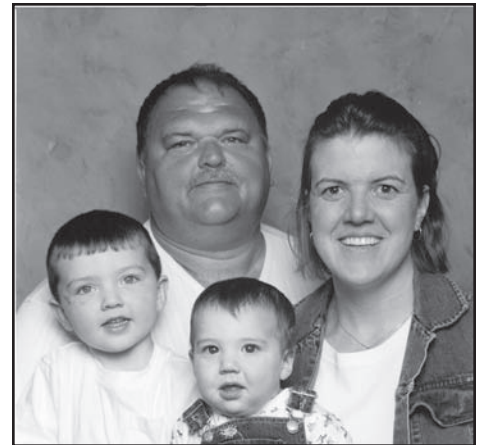

Holly Watts helped guide the Arkansas volleyball program to its highest level since joining the staff in April of 1996.

The Lady Razorbacks have played to a 234-97 record, nine Southeastern Conference Western Division titles and eight NCAA Tournament appearances with Watts in the second chair. Her hard work and commitment to the program was rewarded at the conclusion of the 2002 season when she was promoted to Associate Head Coach.

Although her duties are many and varied, one of Watts' most critical jobs is to coordinate all of the Lady Razorback recruiting efforts including correspondence, evaluation, visits and tracking athletes.

In addition to her recruiting duties she serves as the primary coach for Arkansas' hitters and blockers.

Her blocking talents are evident as the Lady Razorbacks have consistently ranked in the top of the SEC and the nation in blocking. In fact, the Lady Razorbacks finished the 2005 season first in the league and 12th in the country with a 3.28 block per game average. Watts has also coached the best blockers in school history including all-Americans Jessica Field and Kim Storey along with several all conference selections. Most recently she has helped 2006 senior Amy Allison finish the the 2005 season ranked second in the country in blocking.



Watts was invited to assist with the U.S. National Team for several weeks in the summer of 1998, working with the country's elite volleyball players. While busy with the day-to-day demands of the Lady Razorback program, Watts also founded the Ozark Juniors, a club program, in the northwest Arkansas area. Ozark Juniors plays an inter-state schedule and provides playing opportunities for all ages. Watts is now serving on the board for Ozark Juniors which continues to expand with each season.

As an athlete, the former Holly Graham helped Texas to national dominance and was the Lady Longhorns' MVP as a senior. An all-conference pick, she was an all-SWC and all-SWC Tournament selection as well as being named to the all-South region team in her final year. She went on to play basketball in her final year before graduating with a bachelor of science degree in kinesiology from UT in 1994.

Watts began her coaching career while in college working with Mick Haley at the UT Volleyball Camps. Watts accepted the assistant coaching job at Texas-Arlington in 1994, a position she held until coming to Arkansas.

Watts is married to John Watts and the couple has two sons, Jeremiah and Jared, and reside in Fayetteville.

Laura Grote joined the University of Arkansas in 2005 after a successful four-year playing career at Texas Tech University.

Grote played in 91 of 98 games and 25 of 26 matches as the Red Raiders' staring setter. She tallied a team-best 902 assists and was second on the team with 197 digs as a senior. A three-time first-team academic all-Big 12 selection, Grote earned her undergraduate degree in public relations in May 2005.

AS A JUNIOR (2005)

Amy Allison's role continued to expand with each season and she truly came into her own as a junior in 2005. Allison emerged as a solid middle blocker finishing the year ranked first in the Southeastern Conference and second in the country in blocks per game with a 1.83 bpg average. In addition to her tough defensive play, Allison was a solid offensive threat for the Lady Razorbacks leading the team with a career-best .296 hitting percentage and 2.11 kills per game. Allison set the single five-game block record with 14 twice last year, first at Alabama and again at Georgia, and she earned SEC All-Tournament team honors for her play at the league championship. Allison's solid junior season saw her climb in the Arkansas record books as well, and she enters the 2006 season ranked 19th for career kills (503), 20th for total attempts (1177), 10th for block solos (40), eighth for block assists (332) and eighth for total blocks (372). In addition, Allison ranks fifth all-time for blocks per game (1.25) and 17th for points (711). Allison was named the Arkansas Invitational MVP and was a two-

time SEC Defensive Player of the Week. She was named to the SEC Good Works team and was an SEC second-team selection as a junior.

AS A SOPHOMORE (2004)

Allison jumped from 44 games played the previous year to 132 in 2004, and was a key player for Arkansas as a sophomore. Allison's job in the middle saw her collect 121 block assists and five block solos averaging 0.95 blocks per game in her second season. She had back-to-back matches with eight total blocks midseason against Valparaiso and at LSU. Allison's offense was also much improved as a sophomore as she tallied 205 kills including four matches with double-digit kills. Allison recorded a season-best 14 kills twice, first against Pacific and again at No. 22 Santa Clara.

AS A FRESHMAN (2003)

Allison was a spot player for the Lady Razorbacks as a freshman in 2003. Allison played middle for the Lady'Backs seeing action in 44 games with 40 kills and a .217 hitting percentage. The Jenks, Okla., native added 13 assists, 13 digs and 23 total blocks in her first season. Al-

lison played well against the Magnolia State recording a career-best nine kills against Ole Miss on Halloween. Allison hit .389 in the match with a career-best five block assists in the win. She followed up two days later with six kills and a career-best .417 hitting percentage against Mississippi State. Allison's averages included 0.91 kills per game, 0.30 assists per game, 0.30 digs per game, 0.52 blocks per game and 1.23 points per game last year.

AT JENKS HIGH

Allison joined the Lady Razorbacks from Jenks High School where she earned MVP honors as a senior for the Trojans. Allison was a first-team all-state, an academic all-state, all-district and all-region player as a junior at Blue Springs (Mo.) High. Allison set the 4A record for kill efficiency with a .400 mark at the state tournament her junior season and finished her high school career at Jenks (Okla.). Allison was a three-year letterwinner in both volleyball and basketball at Blue Springs and Jenks.

AS A JUNIOR (2005)

Kele Brewer's raw talent made her an offensive threat in her first two seasons of collegiate volleyball. As a junior, Brewer continued to grow into a well-rounded, mature player who could lead the team with both her words and her actions. Brewer became the 11th player in school history to reach the 1,000-kill plateau last year while hitting .201 with 317 kills and 2.50 kills per game last year. Brewer's quiet on-court demeanor hide her explosive arm as she averaged 2.50 kills per game last year. While her career-best for kills (21 versus Missouri State) came in 2004, Brewer's game expanded last year with career bests for service aces with three in a win over Mississippi and digs with 17 against St. Louis. Brewer also recorded season bests for block assists with five against No. 4 Florida and total blocks with five against both No. 4 Florida and LSU last year. In addition to ranking 11th for kills at Arkansas, Brewer holds the number eight spot for total attempts (2943), and she ranks 14th for points (1106.5) for the Lady Razorbacks.

AS A SOPHOMORE (2004)

Brewer was slowed last year by injuries that saw her miss much of the preseason workouts as

well as the first three matches of the year. When she returned, the sophomore picked up where she left off from the previous year with 19 matches with double-digit kills including consecutive runs of seven and eight. Brewer finished the year with the eight-match run with back-to-back 19-kill matches against LSU and Tennessee at the Southeastern Conference Tournament earning selection to the all-tournament team. She posted a season and career-best 21 kills against Southwest Missouri State and added a 20-kill match against Kentucky. Brewer averaged 3.05 kills per game and stepped up defensively averaging 0.95 digs per game.

AS A FRESHMAN (2003)

The University of Arkansas has a long history of better-than-average freshmen on the floor, and Kele Brewer fit that mold in 2003. Named to the inaugural Southeastern Conference All-Freshman team, Brewer was a dangerous hitter from any angle. As a freshman, the Texas native hit .214 and was third on the team with 356 kills. She tallied 88 digs and 39 block assists as well. Brewer led Arkansas in kills in eight different matches with a career-best 17 kills in a win over Brigham Young. In addition she

hit better than .300 eight times with a career-best .550 mark against Creighton.

Brewer's numbers were up in SEC matches hitting .223 in league contests. Brewer recorded 145 kills with 2.96 kills per game in SEC matches. She added 31 digs, 15 blocks and 153.5 points in SEC contests. Brewer concluded her first season ranked 18th on Arkansas' career records list with 356 kills. She was ninth in kills per game with a 3.02 average, 16th in total attempts with 1010, 20th in points with 379 and 14th in points per game with 3.21.

One of Arkansas' most consistent players in 2003, Brewer recorded 14 kills in the third match of the season at #21 Missouri and finished the year with 14 against #23 Southwest Missouri State in the first round of the NCAA Tournament in Manhattan, Kan.

AT MEDINA VALLEY HIGH

A four-year team captain and letterwinner for the Medina Valley Panthers, Brewer earned numerous all-tournament team honors capping her career with a District 28-4A first-team selection as a senior. A four-time District 28-4A MVP, Brewer paced the Panthers to a district runner-up finish her senior year. In addition, she and the Panthers were regional semi-

AS A JUNIOR (2005)

Denitza Koleva continued to rank among the Arkansas leaders as a junior in 2005. Koleva led the team with 422 kills, 3.46 kills per game and 1162 total attempts. Koleva had 26 matches in which she posted double-digit kills, highlighted by a career-best 27 in a five-game set with Kansas State early in the year. It was one of three matches in which Koleva posted 20 or more kills for Arkansas. Koleva continued to climb in the Arkansas career record books as well, becoming the 10th player in school history to reach her 1000th kill in a five-game win at Georgia mid-season. In addition, Koleva begins her senior season ranked ninth for kills per game with 3.01 and is fifth in attack attempts with 3,288. Koleva also starts the year with 99 career service aces to rank ninth, and she is third in service attempts with 1594 in just three seasons.

AS A SOPHOMORE (2004)

Koleva returned for her sophomore season as a marked woman in the SEC. The returning SEC Co-Freshman of the Year, opponents had her in their sights when she stepped into the front row. But Koleva found a way to adjust against the defense she faced all season and rallied for Arkansas recording 344 kills and averaging 2.61 kills per game as a sophomore. Koleva had 17 matches

with double-digit kills including a career-best 23 against Pacific on the road. She added a career-best 13 digs at Georgia in a solid year statistically.

Koleva continued to climb in the Arkansas record books ranking 14th for kills with 717 in just two seasons. She was 12th in kills per game with a 2.80 average and was 12th in total attempts with 2126. Koleva was tied for 12th overall with 62 service aces, ranked 20th in block solos with 11 and was 14th in points with 846.5.

AS A FRESHMAN (2003)

Quiet and unassuming off the court, Koleva comes alive between the lines. Koleva and teammate Kele Brewer had big shoes to fill as freshmen and they answered the call with Koleva earning Southeastern Conference Co-Freshman of the Year honors and being named honorable mention all-district by the American Volleyball Coaches Association in 2003.

Koleva hit .231 as a freshman with 373 kills ranking second for the Lady Razorbacks. She tallied 11 assists, 31 service aces, 170 digs, 53 total blocks and 431.5 points in all matches. Her conference numbers included 170 kills, 3.09 kills per game, five assists, 18 service aces, 71 digs, 21 blocks and 199 points.

After just one season of play, Koleva ranked 17th on the Arkan-

sas career kills list with 373. She was 11th for kills per game with 3.01, 17th in total attempts with 993, 18th in hitting percentage at .231, 13th in service aces per game with a 0.25 average and 18th in points with 431.5.

Koleva tallied 25 matches with double-digit kills as a freshman opening the season with 14 of her first 15 matches with double digits. She had a career-best 16 kills against Alabama and had two double-doubles (kills and digs) as a freshman.

AT MIDDLETON

Born in Sofia, Bulgaria, "Denny" Koleva spent her high school career in Middleton, Wisc. A pair of MHS team MVP honors corresponded with two Big 8 Conference titles and a pair of conference MVP honors. Koleva helped the Cardinals to the Wisconsin Division I state finals in 2001 and 2002 earning second-team all-state as a junior and first-team honors the following season.

Koleva also has extensive national team experience. Her club team, CSKA Volleyball Club, was a four-time gold medal winner at the Junior National Championships.

In addition, Koleva was a member of the junior national team of Bulgaria with several international competitions under her belt.

AS A SOPHOMORE (2005)

Jessica Dorrell began the 2005 season on fire opening the year hitting .379 with 2.50 kills per game in the first 10 matches. Her numbers continued to stay solid all season with Dorrell finishing the year with a .266 hitting percentage leading all of the outside hitters. Dorrell's numbers included a career-best 271 kills, 129 blocks and selection to two all-tournament teams last year. Dorrell's blocking was noticeably improved, and she collected a season-best seven total blocks at Mississippi State in a Southeastern Conference Western Division win. She also posted a career-best 15 kills in SEC action against Kentucky and hit a career-best .778 (7-0-9) against Memphis as a sophomore. Dorrell's 537 kills rank 18th in the Arkansas record books while she ranks 17th in kills per game (2.10) and 18th in hitting percentage (.237).

AS A FRESHMAN (2004)

Dorrell continued the Arkansas tradition of great freshman volleyball players by capping off her first season of collegiate

play earning selection to the Southeastern Conference's all-freshman team. The first-year player assumed a full complement of duties in 2004 and responded hitting .209 with 266 kills, 2.03 kills per game, 30 assists, 67 digs and 128 blocks against one of the toughest schedules in the country. She improved her numbers against league opponents hitting .321 in the SEC with 127 kills, 29 digs and 71 blocks. Her hitting percentage ranked sixth in the conference.

Dorrell had nine matches with double-digit kill totals including a season-best 15 in her first-ever collegiate match against Kansas. She was key in an SEC Western Division win at Auburn in a thrilling five-game match, recording 12 kills, hitting .474 and tallying seven blocks.

She continued a great weekend with 13 kills and a season-best .667 hitting percentage at Alabama in a match that helped the Lady'Backs secure their 10th Western Division title. Late in the season, Dorrell was still playing strong with 12 blocks against LSU.

AT ALEDO

Dorrell guided the Aledo Bearcats to several tournament titles earning numerous all-tournament team honors during her career. Dorrell earned district newcomer of the year honors as a high school freshman and repeated with three all-district awards. She paced the Bearcats to a 94-39 record in four seasons capping off her final year with her third all-state honor. The team captain won numerous all-tournament team honors her senior year, and she holds the school record for kills in a match with 25, and in a season with 501.

Dorrell is a three-time *Star-Telegram* all-area selection and earned MVP honors at the TGCA 4A-5A All-Star Match in 2004. Dorrell paced her West team to a thrilling five-game win. Dorrell concluded her prep career ranked 89th at PrepVolleyball.com.

In addition to volleyball, Dorrell was a four-year starter in basketball and a three-year track letterwinner at Aledo.

AS A SOPHOMORE (2005)

Ashley Miller's defensive presence has made a significant impact for the Lady Razorbacks. Miller's freshman campaign was strong and the Californian only improved her numbers in her second season. Miller out-did her freshman campaign recording a single-season-best 548 digs. She paced the team with a single-season record 4.31 digs per game and rewrote one of the oldest records at Arkansas with 32 digs in a single match against Utah. Miller earned her first all-tournament team honor at San Diego and holds the career record for individual in a match (32), individual in a three-game match (26), individual in a five-game match (32), individual in a season (548), individual dpg in a season (4.31) and career digs per game (4.12). She finished the season ranked fifth in all matches and sixth in SEC-only contests for digs per game while recording 29 matches with double-digit dig totals and 11 with 20 or more digs. She became the fifth player in school history to surpass the

1,000-dig mark and holds on to that fifth-place spot with 1,058 career digs -- just 601 digs out of the lead.

AS A FRESHMAN (2004)

A true libero, Miller rewrote the Arkansas defensive records earning selection to the 2004 Southeastern Conference All-Freshman team. Miller played in 130 of Arkansas' 132 games recording a single-season record 510 digs. She ranked third in digs in the SEC in both all-matches and in league-only matches averaging 3.92 and 4.08 digs per game, respectively. Miller had double-digit dig totals in 26 of Arkansas' 33 matches, narrowly missing the school record for single-match digs twice. She tallied 29 digs first against Kentucky Oct. 22, and again against Southwest Missouri State Nov. 16, just missing the Arkansas record of 31 in a match. Miller had nine matches with 20 or more digs including a 24-dig match in her first NCAA Tournament against 16th-ranked Missouri in Columbia, Mo.

AT WILL C. WOOD

Ashley Miller was a three-time all-league selection for the Will C. Wood Wildcats in Vacaville, Calif., prior to joining the Lady Razorbacks. The 5-7 libero paced the Wildcats to the second round of the California state high school tournament. Miller's high school totals include 649 kills, 891 digs and 116 service aces.

In addition to high school volleyball, Miller played club for Forefront, and her team placed third at the 18 Open nationals. She was nominated for the all-American team at nationals.

Miller was active in student government and was the student body president. She attended the Youth National Leadership forum on Medicine, earned a business award and a National Youth Science Merit Award in high school. In addition to volleyball, Miller was a two-year letterwinner in track and lettered one season in soccer.

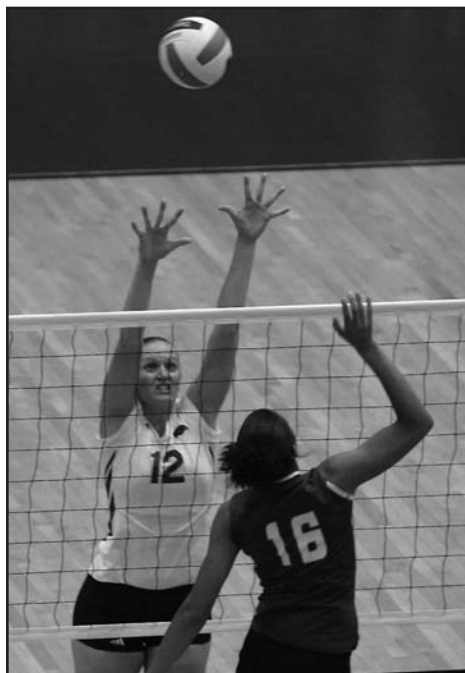
Lady'Backs Improve As Season Progresses

The University of Arkansas volleyball team continued its tradition of success in 2005 by winning a share of its 11th Southeastern Conference Western Division title and reaching the NCAA Tournament for the eighth time its 12-year history.

The season saw the emergence of junior Amy Allison and redshirt freshman Christina Lawrence as both established themselves in the SEC and in the nation to lead Arkansas to a 21-12 overall and 11-5 record in the league.

The year began with three consecutive wins as the Lady'Backs captured the Arkansas Invitational title. Allison earned MVP honors with teammates Karla Crose, Denitza Koleva and Lawrence also selected to the all-tournament team. Lawrence earned the inaugural SEC Freshman of the Week honor the following Monday.

The schedule toughened up with Kansas State and Utah State at the C&C Services Invitational with Arkansas going 1-1 for the weekend. The Lady'Backs fell to Kansas State, but rallied in five games downing USU.

Koleva earned her second all-tournament team selection along with sophomore Jessica Dorrell who earned her first career honor.

Arkansas hit the road for the first away matches of the 2005 season at the Results Advertising Invitational in Springfield, Mo. The Lady'Backs opened with a heart-breaking four-game loss to the host, but stepped up with a pair of wins the following day.

Trailing 0-2 against Utah, Arkansas rallied to win the next three in a hard-fought battle and defeated Iowa State in the final match.

Dorrell was again an all-tournament team selection and libero Ashley Miller set the school record for digs in a match with 32 in the five-game win over the Utes.

The Lady'Backs took their 6-2 record on the road to San Diego for tournament play. Arkansas opened with a win over UNLV, but dropped the next two matches to No. 18 San Diego and No. 25 Long Beach State. Miller was named to the all-tournament team.

Arkansas returned home to Barnhill to begin SEC play with a new twist

on the season. The Lady'Backs would host not only their conference opponent, but would also serve as the home site for LSU and their opponent after hurricanes forced the Tigers to relocate.

NCAA semifinal participant Tennessee handed Arkansas its first SEC loss, but the Lady'Backs rebounded with a win over South Carolina to even their record.

It was on to the Western Division with trips to Auburn and Alabama, both wins for Arkansas. The Lady'Backs got a 3-1 win over the Tigers and a 3-2 win at Alabama to move into the top spot in the division after the weekend.

Allison posted a career-best 13 blocks in the win against the Crimson Tide and was named SEC Defensive Player of the Week for her efforts.

The Lady'Backs hit a snag mid-season. Falling in four at Kentucky and losing in five at home against St. Louis, Arkansas rebounded with wins over Mississippi and Mississippi State in Barnhill Arena to remain near the top of the SEC Western Division race.

A tough loss at fourth-ranked Florida was followed by a six-match win streak with victories at Georgia, against

Alabama, Auburn and Oral Roberts at home and at Mississippi State and Mississippi.

The Georgia victory featured an Arkansas block party with the Lady'Backs posting 23 team blocks - one shy of the school record.

Allison earned her second SEC honor Oct. 19, while Lawrence was honored the following week. Crose earned league defensive player of the week honors following the trip to the Magnolia State as Arkansas held on to sole possession of the SEC Western Division lead.

Needing to win just one of their final two matches, Arkansas' offense stalled and couldn't come up with the W. The Lady'Backs fell at LSU and to Kentucky at home. The Tigers, who played an abbreviated schedule in Baton Rouge, were undefeated on their home court, not losing a single game all season. The losses dropped

the Lady'Backs into a tie with LSU as the teams shared the division title.

Arkansas entered the SEC Tournament as the fourth seed overall behind Florida, Tennessee and LSU. The Lady'Backs defeated Kentucky in the first round and faced the fourth-ranked Gators on day two.

Undaunted by the previous loss to Florida during the regular season, Arkansas pushed Florida to five games before falling, 13-15, in the final frame. The near-miss earned the Lady'Backs even more respect on the national scene and helped propel Arkansas into the NCAA Tournament.

Allison earned SEC second-team honors and was named to the all-tournament team while Lawrence was selected to the league's all-freshman team. Allison was also named to the SEC Good Works team for her contributions to the Northwest Arkansas community off the court.

The Lady'Backs anxiously awaited their name during the selection show and were rewarded with a trip to Columbia, Mo., to face St. Mary's (Calif.) in the first round. The SEC sent an all-time best six teams into the NCAA Tournament demonstrating the strength and improvement of the league's members in recent seasons.

Arkansas opened the NCAA Tournament with St. Mary's - a team that mirrored the Lady'Backs in many ways. Both squads were heralded as good blocking teams, but Arkansas out-blocked the number two blocking team in the nation 14.0-5.0 winning the match in three games.

The Lady'Backs ended their season with a three-game loss to 10th-ranked Missouri on the Tigers' home court.

Allison continued to earn recognition with a selection to the AVCA All-Region team as an honorable mention pick. She and Koleva also earned *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-District honors as the season closed.

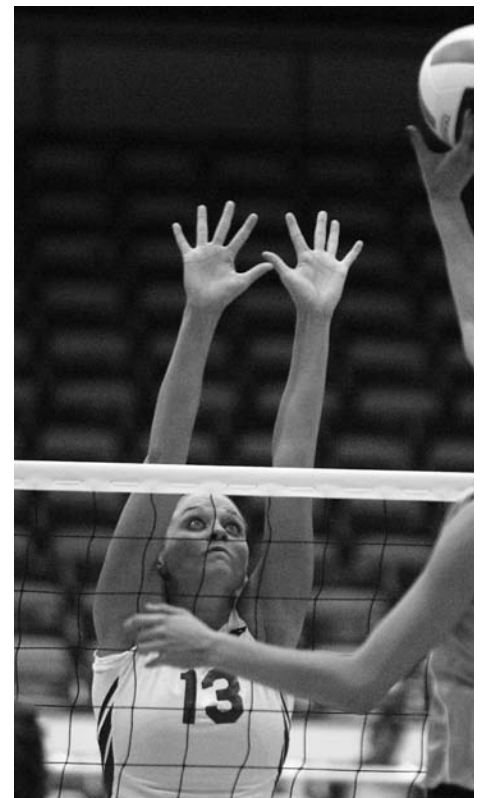

The Southeastern Conference

When Arkansas added volleyball for the 1994 season, there was an immediate impact on the Southeastern Conference.

The addition of a team changed the regular season format dividing the league into Eastern and Western Divisions and the SEC Tournament featured all 11 teams with byes in the first round for the top four programs.

The league and its members have continued to evolve over the last decade as the SEC marked the 16th consecutive season with two or more teams in the NCAA Tournament. In fact, the SEC had six league members earn a trip to the NCAA Tournament.

Tennessee, making the program's eighth NCAA appearance, headlined the field reaching the semifinals before falling to eventual national champion Washington in the program's best season.

Perennial powerhouse Florida capped off another outstanding year reaching the Elite Eight and Arkansas advanced into the second round. Alabama, Kentucky and LSU were all eliminated in the first round with the Crimson Tide celebrating the program's first invitation to the National Tournament.

In addition to the success on the national level, nine of the 11 member teams posted double-digit wins with five teams recording 20+ wins. The Gators paced the SEC with 33 victories followed by Tennessee with 25, Alabama with 23 and LSU and Arkansas with 21 wins each.

The 2006 season sees a change in the regular season format with the elimination of the conference tournament and the addition of a home-and-away match between every team. Teams have been playing a steadily expanding conference schedule in preparation for this year's change. There will be 20 SEC matches for each team up from 16 in 2004.

The SEC also celebrates 27 years of volleyball in 2006. The inaugural year of volleyball in 1982 saw six teams fight for the title and won by Tennessee with a 31-7 record and an .816 winning percentage.

Also in the league for the first year were Georgia (41-12), Mississippi (25-13), LSU (44-25), Kentucky (21-14) and Mississippi State (7-33).

Florida joined the SEC volleyball family in 1984, followed by Auburn in 1986, Alabama in 1989, South Carolina in 1991, and finally Arkansas in 1994.

The Gators have dominated the SEC Tournament winning 12 of the 25 titles. Kentucky has captured five crowns followed by four each for LSU and Tennessee. Arkansas and Georgia have each won the SEC Championship once.

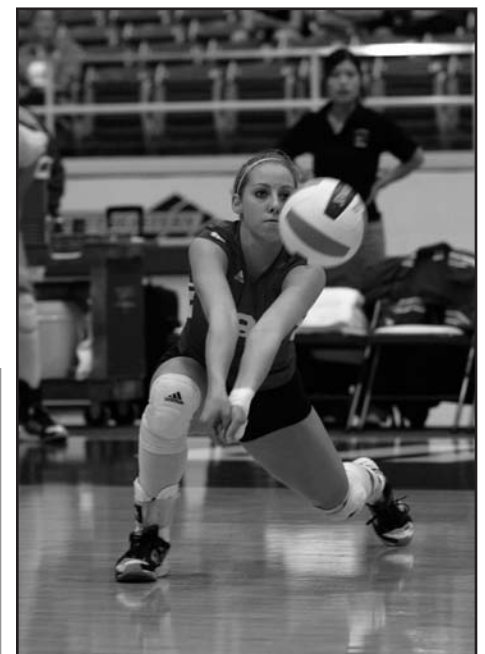

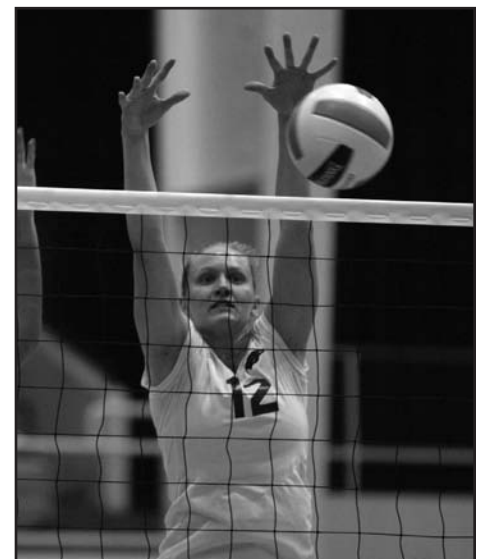

1996

"We're in!! We're in!!" was the cry in 1996 when a three-year-old Arkansas volleyball team made its first appearance in the NCAA Tournament.



The young program was honored to have been selected to the field of 48 teams and was surprised to learn that they would host the first round due to a scheduling conflict for their opponent.

Rhode Island made the trip to Fayetteville and battled Arkansas valiantly before falling in five, 15-12, 15-8, 12-15, 9-15, 15-11.

The victory sent Arkansas to Lincoln, Neb., where they faced defending national champion Nebraska in a four-game thriller. Arkansas lost the match, 15-8, 12-15, 15-7, 15-7, but not before they won the hearts of the volleyball-savvy Cornhusker fans, players and coaching staff.

1997

The field expanded and Arkansas was again selected for the NCAA Tournament. But this time it was no surprise. The Lady Razorbacks had done the impossible, knocking off #4 Florida in the South-

eastern Conference Tournament finals, 15-7, 15-7, 17-15, in Athens, Ga., to receive the automatic bid.

Again selected to host, Arkansas hardly broke a sweat downing in-state rival Arkansas-Little Rock in straight sets, 15-11, 15-3, 15-3, advancing to the second round.

Notre Dame came to Fayetteville with upset on their minds and did just that, eliminating the Lady Razorbacks in front of the home crowd in four games, 15-9, 7-15, 10-15, 14-16.

1998

Arkansas received its third consecutive invitation to the NCAA Tournament in 1998 and took its game to a new level.

The Lady Razorbacks were again selected to host first- and second-round matches, and with the bitter taste of the 1997 second-round match against Notre

Dame still fresh in their mouths, Arkansas rose to the challenge.

The Lady Backs opened with a first-round win over New Hampshire, winning 15-3, 15-0, 15-13 in Barnhill Arena.

The second round saw the Lady Razorbacks crush Indiana, 15-8, 15-5, 15-4, sending them to Gainesville, Fla., where Arkansas faced a tough postseason team in Hawai'i.

The Rainbow Wahine handed Arkansas a 3-0 loss but not before senior Kim Storey made a name for herself, earning East Regional All-Tournament Team honors and becoming the second AVCA All-American in Arkansas history.

1999

Selected to the field of 64 in 1999, Arkansas faced their first-round match on the road for the first time in school history. The Lady

Razorbacks found themselves in Long Beach, Calif., where they opened with a first-round win over Georgetown, 15-3, 10-15, 15-1, 15-6.

They had the unenviable task of facing the defending national champion in the second round for the second time in four trips, falling to host Long Beach State, 6-15, 6-15, 11-15, to be eliminated.

2001

The 2001 season marked a return to NCAA postseason play for a young Lady Razorback team. Arkansas struggled in the opening two weeks of the season with a particularly bad showing against Kansas State in the Wildcat Classic. The volleyball gods gave Arkansas a chance to redeem themselves sending the Lady Razorbacks back to Manhattan for a first-round match-up with Kansas State.

Arkansas lost the match but not before gaining a new sense of respect from Kansas State and its fans as the Lady'Backs pushed the host to five games, narrowly missing the game-five victory.

2003

It was back to the Dance for the Lady Razorbacks in 2003 again traveling to Manhattan, Kan., for first- and second-round action. Arkansas avenged an early-season loss against No. 23 Southwest Missouri, downing the Bears in four games, but fell to the host and No. 6 Wildcats in three games. Arkansas hit .232 behind 11 kills



each from freshmen Denitza Koleva and Kele Brewer. The Lady'Backs added 11 team blocks in the loss.

2004

Selection to the 2004 NCAA Tournament may be one of the more rewarding bids in Arkansas history. The Lady Razorbacks faced one of the nation's toughest schedules and the team's win-loss record reflected the challenges. But head coach Chris Poole's gamble paid off as the team was selected to the field of 64 making their seventh appearance in the Big Dance.

Arkansas traveled to Columbia, Mo., facing 16th-ranked Missouri on the Tigers' home court in the first round. The Lady'Backs fell in four, 28-30, 21-30, 30-25, 26-30, in a hard-fought battle that saw sophomore Kele Brewer tally a team-leading 17 kills and score 19 points for Arkansas. Freshman Ashley Miller added 24 digs in the first-round set back.

2005

Arkansas made its third consecutive post-season appearance last year again traveling to Columbia, Mo., in December. Arkansas' invitation was one of six extended to the Southeastern Conference, the most ever for the league. Also making NCAA Tournament appearances were Alabama, Florida, Kentucky, LSU and Tennessee. The Lady Vols advanced to the semifinals before being eliminated.

The Lady Razorbacks opened their tournament with St. Mary's of California in a match that was nearly even on paper. Both teams were know as solid blocking programs and both had similiar offensive numbers but it was Arkansas who emerged at the end of the night. The Lady Razorbacks

dominated the contest out-hitting St. Mary's .358 to .111 and out-blocking the Gaels 14.0-5.0 in the three-game win.

Senior Karla Crose hit

a match-best .857 with six kills, no errors and seven attempts. She also lead the match with 10 block assists in the win.

Junior Amy Allison added a 7-for-13 performance hitting .538 while junior Denitza Koleva lead Arkansas with 11 kills.

The victory moved Arkansas into the second round where they faced host and 10th-ranked Missouri on the Tigers home court.

Missouri got the best of Arkansas for the second consecutive season ending the careers of seniors Crose and Iva Docekalova. Kele Brewer paced Arkansas with 10 kills in the loss.

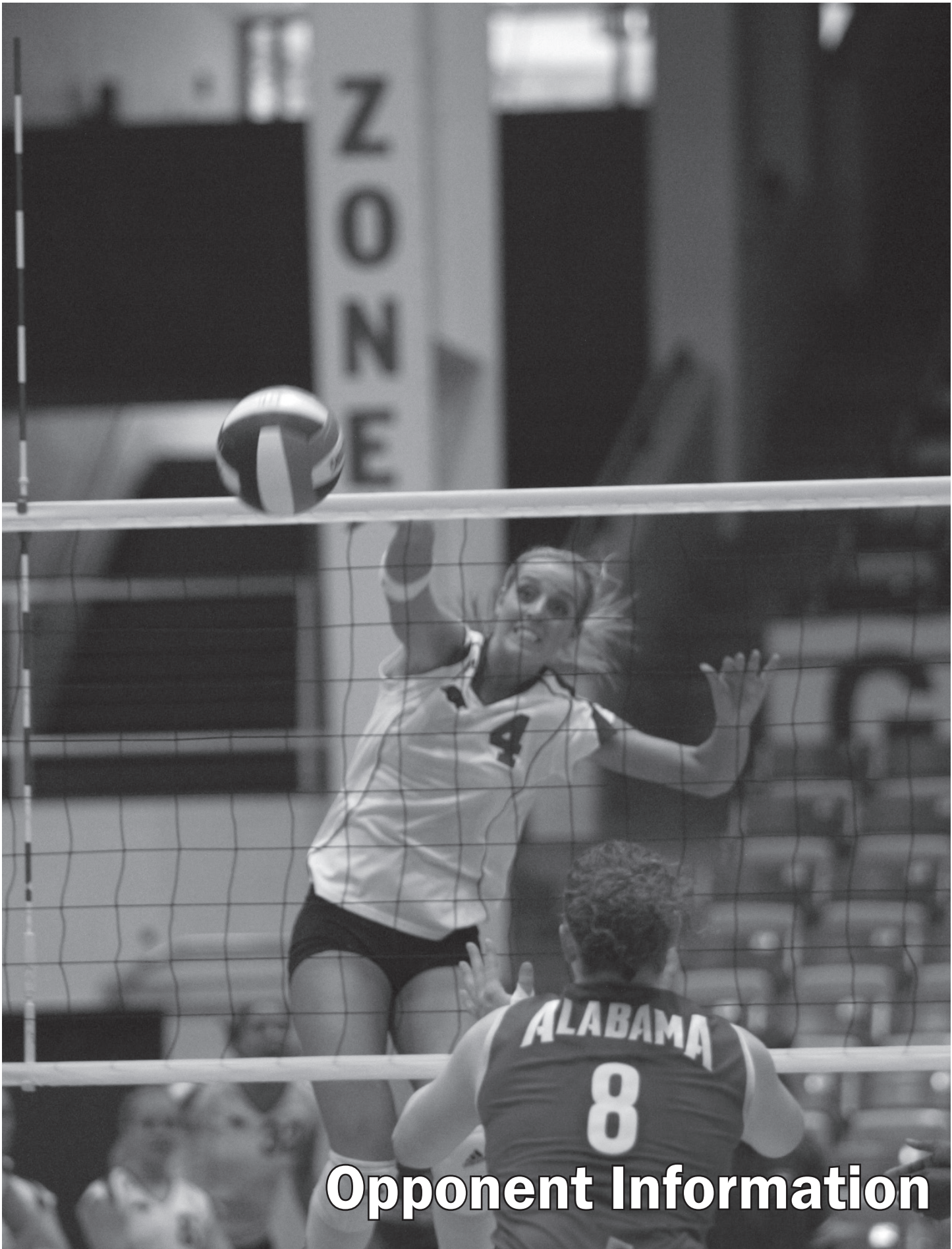

THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

Year after year, the Southeastern Conference shows why it is considered to be one of the premier volleyball conferences in the nation.

In the last two decades, the SEC has made stellar contributions in volleyball. The conference has sent at least two SEC teams to the NCAA Tournament in every season the last 17 years.

The SEC had a team reach the Final Four seven of the 10 seasons in the '90s with the league having a team advance to the regional final nine of those 10 seasons. Since 2000, the SEC has had a team reach the Final Four three times and regional final four times.

In 2006, Florida captured its 16th ever SEC Championship and made its 17th NCAA Tournament appearance and advanced to the regional semi-finals. In all, seven teams from the SEC made the NCAA Tournament, including Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Kentucky, LSU, Ole Miss and Tennessee.

Since the inaugural SEC volleyball championship in 1979-80, many changes have occurred in the conference with volleyball. The addition of Arkansas and South Carolina to the league in 1991 brought the divisional format to the sport with five teams competing in the Eastern Division and six teams in the Western Division.

Along with the popularity growth throughout the country, women's volleyball has also grown in the SEC. A benchmark in that growth came in 1995

SEC volleyball will continue to enjoy the live coverage on SEC-TV to almost 22 million subscribers in the conference's nine-state region.



SEC VOLLEYBALL NOTES

- The 2006 season marked the 17th consecutive season in which the SEC has placed at least two teams in the NCAA Tournament.
- A record-breaking seven SEC teams earned berths in the NCAA Tournament, breaking the previous record of six teams.
- 10 of the 11 teams in the SEC posted wins in double digits in 2006, with LSU posting 26 and Florida 20 respectively.
- LSU claimed the Western Division crown in 2006, with Florida earning the Eastern Division championship.
- Florida captured its 16th SEC Championship and advanced to the NCAA regional semifinals.
- Three players were selected as the Sports Imports/AVCA National Player of the Week.
- Two players were selected to the *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-American Team.

Barnhill Arena



Is it the fans? Is it the facility? Is it the band and cheerleaders?

It's all of those elements that make Barnhill Arena, the home of the Lady Razorbacks, one of the toughest volleyball venues in the country.

Renovated several times, Barnhill Arena officially closed its doors as one of the most feared basketball facilities in the country March 3, 1993. It was re-configured into the largest volleyball-only arena in time for the inaugural season in 1994.

The Barn underwent a second significant face lift prior to the 2002 season to welcome gymnastics.

Barnhill Arena was authorized in 1953 as the University's new multipurpose arena. Named for athletic director John Barnhill, the Fieldhouse, as it was originally known, underwent a drastic renovation in 1976-78. The renovation created the seating arrangement that

turned the facility into a basketball-only configuration.

March 3, 1993, closed Barnhill's career as a basketball facility with a gala party, complete with a coast-to-coast broadcast of the Arkansas-LSU men's game on ESPN and closing ceremonies carried live statewide.

As the home of Lady'Back volleyball, Barnhill underwent renovation of its playing surface to convert the then 19-year-old hardwood floor to a volleyball configuration. It was unveiled to the public during Arkansas' summer camps, including the first-ever volleyball camp at the Fayetteville campus in 1994. In addition to the on-the-court renovation, the Lady Razorback volleyball program was provided with a state-of-the-art locker room. The locker room features a lounge area, team room with a large-screen television and VCR for

viewing film and a changing room with lockers and showers.

Barnhill again underwent changes in the summer of 2002. The volleyball-only facility welcomed the addition of gymnastics for the 2003 season and the facility was given a face-lift to remain one of the best in the country. Changes included new paint on the court, expanding the borders to 10 feet, and refinishing and lightening the surrounding wood surfaces.

New lights, including specialized "show lights" with shutters that allow for instant "on-off" capabilities, and new seating were some of the other changes.

Barnhill Arena also serves as office space for the Lady Razorbacks. Several coaches' offices, most of the teams' locker rooms and the training and equipment rooms are located here.
