The New Home of Arkansas Softball

The University of Arkansas softball program was one of the first in the Southeastern Conference to provide a home field for its newest sport.

Lady'Back Yard was born out of the shadows of Arkansas' baseball stadium at George Cole Field, and it has served as the home for Arkansas softball for more than a decade.

The time has come, however, for Lady'Back softball to take the next step and continue the tradition of excellence that has made Arkansas a leader for women's athletics.

That step is the creation of a state-of-the-art stadium at a new location on campus, again making Arkansas a leader in women's athletics.

The New Lady'Back Yard proposal moves the field south adjacent to Lady'Back Field, Arkansas' soccer pitch, and the facilities will share parking and entryway space. In addition, chairback seating, a redesigned press box, skyboxes and fan amenities along the concourse are just a few of the scheduled upgrades.

The playing surface will remain similar to the current facility. The soil and sand mixture allows for speedy drainage making Lady'Back Yard playable in almost any weather.

The incoming talent, combined with veteran savvy, adds to the overall depth and versatility of the 2007 version of the University of Arkansas softball team. The Lady Razorbacks welcome eight newcomers and return 11 players. In his third season as head coach, Jamie Pinkerton looks to keep building traditions.

"We're looking to build on the progress that we've made our first two years here," said Pinkerton. "The difference from last year is that this team is more talented, has more depth and has more team speed. I like the way the team breaks down athletically position by position."

Pitchers

Three pitchers comprise this season's staff, led by junior Katy Henry with a pair of freshmen, Miranda Dixon and Teighynne Hulsey.

Henry returns for her third season in a Lady Razorback uniform, earning 15 wins and four saves on the mound in 2006. Last year, Henry also marked her name in the Arkansas record book for most strikeouts in an individual season with 219.

"Katy has proven she can pitch in this league," said Pinkerton. "She carried us last year and early on she's going to have to carry the load again."

An Oklahoma player of the year, a two-time conference most valuable player and an all-state selection Dixon joins Arkansas from Edmond North High School in Edmond, Okla. She holds several school records and helped her team to a state championship.

Hulsey earned all-conference, all-city, all-region and all-state honors at arch rival Edmond Memorial High School also in Edmond. As a senior, she had a 0.76 ERA and a .375 batting average.

"Once Dixon gets acclimated to the college game she's going to be a quality pitcher," said Pinkerton. "Hulsey will also bring a lot to the table from the fact that she is left handed and is a different type of pitcher than Katy and Miranda."

This is the first year since Pinkerton became head coach at Arkansas that the Lady'Backs have a lack of experience in the circle. "With pitcher Kayce Odle not returning for her senior

season, it will make the freshmen grow up a lot quicker," said Pinkerton.

Catchers

A sophomore and two freshmen vie for the catching duties in 2007. Returning starter Whitney Cloer has the experience at the position, with Jess Reed and Jessica Waddle providing the depth.

Cloer started 42 games last season, sharing catching duties with former Lady Razorback catcher, Shana Easley.

"As a receiver and calling the game, Cloer is mature beyond her years," said Pinkerton. "We felt comfortable letting

her catch last year and she did a good job. With a year under her belt, I think she's going to be more consistent at the plate this year."

Reed and Waddle are Cloer's backups and Pinkerton is excited to see how their hard work will pay off.

"Reed made an impression on me in the fall. She has a lot to learn, but I'm pleased with her progress," said Pinkerton. "Waddle has the size and the tools to be a good catcher. I think she's going to help us offensively and defensively."

Infield

The infield is the backbone behind the young pitching staff with depth and the most experience on the team.

Sophomore Sandra Smith appeared to be the front runner for first base until an injury in preseason practice.

"Sandra is the most fundamentally sound defensive and offensive player we have at this point, said Pinkerton. "This fall was the first sign of what we're going to see out of her. She's an athlete."

Junior Samantha Buckner and Dixon are the other front-runners for the position.

"Buckner has good size and power, and she can help us," said Pinkerton. "Dixon may see some time at first as well."

Freshman Hannah Cicioni plans to redshirt her first season as a Lady'Back. Returning starter sophomore Kayla Johnson will push for a starting job in the middle infield. Johnson started 56 games in 2006 and recorded four multiple-hit and four multiple-RBI games.

"Kayla is a good defensive player and will see a lot of time at second and shortstop," said Pinkerton.

Sophomore Brandy Baze will see some time at second base as well.

"Baze worked hard for two years and is one of those players who will do anything you ask," said Pinkerton. "She's the type of player who is good insurance to have."

Freshman Brittany Robison is expected to start at shortstop. An all-state player from Owasso High School in Owasso, Okla., Robison guided the Rams to a state runner-up finish her senior year.

"Talent-wise, Brittany has the best tools, range, arm and athletic ability for the position," said Pinkerton.

Junior Dayna Huckabee, who saw time at shortstop and third base in 2006, shifts to the starting third baseman.

"Dayna learned a lot, with her bat and defensively, and has come so far in two years," said Pinkerton. "She is a player that has the work ethic and wants to do the right thing. She is probably the most versatile infielder we have."

In 56 games last season, Huckabee led the team

offensively in doubles, triples, RBIs and slugging percentage.

"Overall. I feel really good about the infield and outfield positions," said Pinkerton. "I feel this is the first year we really have enough depth."

Outfield

The outfield is full with eight players competing for starting jobs. The group is led by senior right fielder Rachel LeMaster who was an all-SEC second-team pick in 2005. Last season LeMaster was first on the team with 19 stolen bases and third in runs scored, hits and batting average. In the Arkansas record book she is second in career stolen bases with 53.

"As young as the outfield is, Rachel is basically the only upperclassman in the outfield and I feel really good with her leadership ability," said Pinkerton. "She is a leader by example and is trying to become more of a vocal leader. It's always good to have a player that the younger ones can look up to, especially an all-SEC player who works hard and gets it done both on the field and in the classroom."

Sophomore Brandy Foust and Jess Reed should also see some time in right field. In left field, sophomore Jocelyne Moncrief has a slight edge due to experience. Moncrief started 49 games primarily in left field for the Lady Razorbacks in 2006.

"Jocelyne is good defensively, and offensively she puts the ball into play and provides a bit of speed to the lower half of the lineup," said Pinkerton.

Pinkerton said pushing Moncrief heavily in left field is sophomore transfer Dara Clark, Clark played last season at the University of the Ozarks.

"Offensively, Dara had a great fall and she has speed," said Pinkerton.

Sophomore Hillary Freeman should see action in the outfield as well.

"Freeman can fill in in left field and center field," said Pinkerton. "She has good speed, is good defensively, is smart in the outfield and reads the ball well."

Freshman Jessica Bachkora starts in center field. She was a twotime offensive player of the year, boasted a 100% fielding average her senior year and a .426 career batting average.

"Bachkora is a five-tool player," said Pinkerton. "She can hit, hit for power, run, play defense, and has, quite frankly, the strongest arm in the SEC. She has the tools to be a very, very good player for us."

When she is not on the mound, Hulsey is also expected to see some time in the outfield.

"With as good a fall as she had, we're going to have to find a place in the line-up for her," said Pinkerton.

Schedule

Nineteen homes dates, including two home tournaments, 11 NCAA Tournament teams and two Women's College World Series teams highlight the 2007 Arkansas softball schedule.

The Lady Razorbacks play a minimum of 24 games against opponents that competed in the NCAA Tournament in 2006. Three of the tournament teams Arkansas faces made the Super Regionals, while two of those teams continued on to the World Series.

"I'm really happy with the way the schedule turned out," said Pinkerton. "If we

continue to improve and remain above .500, this schedule should help us accomplish our goal of making the NCAA Tournament."

Arkansas opens its home season hosting the Clarion Inn-Lady'Back Invitational Feb. 23-25 at Lady'Back Yard. The home portion of the schedule heats up the beginning of March. Arkansas hosts the Holiday Inn Express-Arkansas Invitational March 2-4. North Texas comes to Fayetteville for a game March 6.

SEC play begins at Lady'Back Yard March 10-11 against South Carolina. Pinkerton made the schedule in hopes of preparing his team for the SEC portion of games.

"The non-conference portion of our schedule sets us up nicely for SEC play," said Pinkerton. "Playing the NCAA tournament teams is what is going to make this team better."

Head Softball Coach
Third Season



Jamie Pinkerton enters his third season as the head softball coach at the University of Arkansas.

After two seasons at the helm, Pinkerton looks to keep building traditions.

"What we're looking for is to continue the progress that we've made our first two years," said Pinkerton.

The Lady Razorbacks have made progress both on and off the field in Pinkerton's years.

The Arkansas offense improved in Pinkerton's inaugural season as the Lady'Backs set a school record for home runs in a season with 19. The team batting average increased .048 points, and the team recorded its highest stolen base percentage in school history.

The Lady'Backs made history April 23, 2005,


with their first-ever runrule of a Southeastern Conference opponent as Arkansas defeated Kentucky, 10-2, in six innings. Arkansas completed the three-game sweep with a 10-2 five-inning win on April 24, 2005, to give the Lady'Backs their first SEC sweep in three years.

The 2005 season also brought Arkansas its first all-SEC team selection since 2001 as Rachel LeMaster was voted to the second team.

In 2006, Arkansas recorded the fewest errors in school history. The Lady'Backs improved their win-loss record and lowered their ERA by 0.44.

The team had key upsets throughout the season defeating five top-25 teams, including No. 24 Iowa, No. 12 Georgia, No. 22 Mississippi State, No. 18 Auburn and No. 11





In the classroom, Arkansas earned academic honors from the National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) All-Academic Team. Arkansas recorded a 3.27 team grade point When Pinkerton accepted the head coaching position with Arkansas, he returned to his roots. Pinkerton is a Fort Smith, Ark., native, who was the Tulsa Golden Hurricane head coach from 2001-04.

In his four years at Tulsa, Pinkerton was a two-time Western Athletic Conference Coach of the

average in the 2006 spring semester, which ranked fourth in the conference and 30th by the NFCA. The Lady'Backs improved their team GPA and ranking from that in 2005, when the squad posted a 3.166 GPA and ranked 40th.

Pinkerton said he was pleased that his team achieved success in the classroom and hopes to continue the Lady'Back tradition with the bats and books.

"Since I arrived here, it has been a focal point of our staff to make improvements in our team GPA," he said. "We are really proud of that and look forward to maintaining that excellence."

Year at the school where he began his collegiate career as an assistant coach.

"I feel like I left home, but I'm coming home," he said. "I grew up as a Razorback fan, and it's special to be head coach at the University."

In addition to returning home, the challenge of the SEC was a major attraction for Pinkerton.

"It's the chance to coach in one of the top softball conferences in the nation," he said. "I'm looking forward to getting the program going and keeping it in the right direction, and to being in the NCAAs."

In his four years at Tulsa, Pinkerton turned the Hurricane into a winning



program, including three straight 30-win seasons with two 40-win seasons. In 2004, Pinkerton guided Tulsa to a 45-18 finish and a WAC runner-up finish along with his second conference coach of the year award.

That same year, Pinkerton's squad posted its highest batting average of .281 with 79 doubles, 41 home runs and 151 walks. Defensively, the pitching staff tied its lowest ERA since 2002 with 1.35 ERA, giving up only 109 runs, 62 walks and striking out 316 batters. and 21 WAC All-Academic selections.

In his second season at Tulsa, Pinkerton made school history when he directed the 2002 team to its first winning season finishing 48-16. The 48-win season followed a 13-42 finish in Pinkerton's inaugural season. The 35-game improvement marked the second-best softball turnaround in NCAA history.

The 2002 squad also broke 62 school records. The Golden Hurricane transformation gave Pinkerton his first WAC Coach of the Year honor.



The only coach in Tulsa history to post an overall winning record, Pinkerton finished with 140 wins and 105 losses and holds the program's record for the most wins in school history. Pinkerton also guided the Golden Hurricane to its first-ever national ranking at No. 25 in the USA TODAY/NFCA Poll in 2004.

At Tulsa, Pinkerton coached one College Sports Information Directors of America Academic All-American, four CoSIDA All-Academic District VI selections, 27 NFCA Academic All-Americans Pinkerton's crews became spoilers, defeating national contenders like Fresno State and Oklahoma.

His teams not only excelled on the field, but also in the classroom. His teams were among the nation's best in academics, with consistent grade point averages over 3.0.

Prior to becoming head coach at Tulsa, Pinkerton was an assistant coach at the University of Virginia from 1998-2000. While with the Cavaliers, Pinkerton's teams posted two runner-up finishes to Florida State in the Atlan-

tic Coast Conference Tournament in 1999 and 2000.

Pinkerton's other coaching stints included graduate assistant coach at the University of Louisiana-Monroe in 1997-98, where he completed hours towards a master's degree.


In his first stay at the University of Tulsa, Pinkerton was an assistant coach in 1994-97 when the Hurricane won a total of 51 games. Pinkerton helped lead the Claremore-Sequoyah High School team to the 1994 state Class AA runner-

up finish. As head coach of the Oklahoma Mustangs (ASA) in 1988-1994, Pinkerton coordinated recruiting, coaching, fundraising and traveling.

Pinkerton was born in Fort Smith, Ark., and grew up in Broken Arrow, Okla.



He graduated from Tulsa in 1997 with a bachelor's degree in history and a minor in secondary education. Pinkerton and his wife, Dori, have two children, a daughter, Sarah, and a son, Dane. The Pinkertons reside in Fayetteville.

Assistant Coach
Third Season

Beginning her third season as a Lady Razorbacks assistant coach, Tiffany Redding continues her hard work on and off the field.

As the recruitment coordinator, Redding spearheaded the campaign that garnered the Lady'Backs 10 newcomers to the 2006 squad and eight newcomers in 2007. In the staff's third recruiting class, Redding assisted with the signing of eight high school seniors in November 2006.



On the field, Redding is the first base coach while working with the infielders. In addition to the recruiting efforts, she directs the team's camps and clinics. Redding managed the staff's first summer camp and winter clinic in which over 200 players participated.

Prior to Arkansas, Redding was an assistant with Pinkerton from 2002-04 at Tulsa, where she was also a four-year letterwinner at shortstop from 1997-2000.





Redding graduated in 2000 with a bachelor's degree in psychology and a minor in sociology. While at Tulsa, Redding ranked as TU's all-time leader in walks, assists, chances, runs, hits and at-bats. Legore is pursuing her master's degree in community health at Arkansas.





2006 Review

The University of Arkansas softball team faced a challenging schedule in 2006 competing against eight teams ranked in the top 25, including World Series teams Tennessee and Alabama. The Lady Razorbacks played 40 percent of their games against top-25 teams. Working through the demanding schedule, the Lady'Backs started to build traditions both on and off the field.

Last season Arkansas recorded the fewest errors in school history. The Lady'Backs also improved their win-loss record and lowered their ERA by 0.44.

The team had key upsets throughout the season defeating five top-25 teams, including No. 24 Iowa, No. 12 Georgia, No. 22 Mississippi State, No. 18 Auburn and No. 11 LSU twice.

After a three-year absence from the SEC Tournament, Arkansas softball made an appearance as the No. 7 seed.

"The team was closer to being a NCAA tournament team than people think," said head coach Jamie Pinkerton. "We had the key wins."

In the classroom, Arkansas earned academic honors ranked 30th from the National Fastpitch Coaches Association All-Academic Team. Arkansas recorded a 3.27 team grade point average in the 2006 spring semester, which ranked fourth in the conference.

Arkansas picked up its first win of the season against No. 24 Iowa in its opening tournament, The Diamond Fun and Sun Classic in Miami, Fla. After two days of games were cancelled in Shreveport, La., the following weekend at the Centenary College Classic, the Lady'Backs returned home for back-to-back home tournaments.

The Lady'Backs went on a nine-game win streak over the two weekends recording their longest win streak in school history.

Arkansas' first conference victory of the season came March 12 against the 12th-ranked Georgia Bulldogs. The Lady'Backs held Georgia scoreless, allowing only three hits. Blaire Perry picked up the win on the mound and scored the winning run on a sacrifice fly to left field from Dayna Huckabee.

The Lady Razorbacks earned a second upset and SEC win against No. 22 Mississippi State March 19. At Lady'Back Yard, the Bulldogs scored early with a two-run home run, but Arkansas rallied in the third inning for three runs to take the lead. The Lady'Backs added another run in the sixth behind a double from Sandra Smith and an RBI single from Perry to win the game, 4-2.

Against SEC teams Ole Miss and Florida State, Arkansas took two of three games from the Rebels and one game from the Gators. Arkansas's second win against Mississippi was its first run-rule of an SEC team in 2006.

Arkansas swept Missouri State and Louisiana-Monroe in April, and took two games and a series win over SEC opponent Kentucky.

The Lady'Backs finished their regular season with an 11-game home

stretch. A defeat of No. 18 Auburn came in the second game of the series April 22. Arkansas scored early with two runs in the first inning. Behind a complete game on the mound with seven strikeouts from Katy Henry, the Lady'Backs won 2-0, as the Tigers remained scoreless the entire game.

Arkansas also won its first-ever series against the 11th-ranked LSU Tigers April 26. The Tigers narrowly escaped a series sweep, edging Arkansas 4-3 in the second game of the series.

In game one, Rachel LeMaster scored on an RBI single from Perry in the first inning to give Arkansas the 1-0 lead. LSU tied the game at 1-1 in the fourth inning on three hits.

The Lady'Backs answered in the fifth inning to reclaim the lead, 2-1. In the sixth inning, Easley gave Arkansas a 3-1 advantage when she hit a lead-off home run. LSU responded in the top of the seventh inning to cut the lead to 3-2 when sophomore infielder Andrea Smith hit a solo home run.

In game two, Arkansas had a 3-0 lead after four innings, but with two outs in the fifth inning, LSU rallied for four runs taking the lead and the win, 4-3.

The final game of the series was scoreless until the fourth inning when LSU junior Leslie Klein hit a two-run home run to give the Tigers a 2-0 lead. The Lady'Backs tied the game, 2-2, on Kayla Johnson's two-run home run, which was her first career home run. The game remained tied until the ninth inning when Mindy O'Malley led off the inning with a walk. Then LeMaster and Johnson reached on a pair of errors to load the bases for Easley. O'Malley scored the winning run when the Tigers committed their third consecutive error.

Ending a three-year hiatus from the SEC Tournament, the Lady Razorbacks made an appearance as the No. 7 seed May 11. They lost 0-2 to No. 8 Georgia, marking the final appearance for Shana Easley, Mindy O'Malley and Blaire Perry. Arkansas ended the season seventh in the SEC.



Lady'Back Yard

Lady'Back Yard is arguably one of the best playing surfaces in the country for collegiate women's softball and there is no mystery behind the field's, and the team's, success: commitment.

The University of Arkansas added softball in 1996 with the first team taking the field in the spring of 1997. With the addition of the sport came the addition - actually renovation - of the field.

Renovation of the former George Cole Baseball Field, which was completely covered in Astroturf, began in the fall of 1995 allowing the baseball team one final season of practice before moving to their

new facility south of the University. Reconfiguration of the field included moving the fences and home plate, and removing the turf and replacing it with natural grass and a dirt infield.

Some of the significant changes involved in the renovation included shortening the existing 375-foot fences, making the distance from home plate to the backstop 30 feet, shortening the base paths from 90 to 60 feet and moving the mound from 60 feet, 6 inches to 43 feet.

The Bermuda grass overseeded with rye stretches 200 feet down the line and 225 in center to a fully padded sixfoot wall in the outfield.

The crushed rock infield leads up to sunken dugouts and seating for 2,000 fans including chairback box seats.

A four-room press box overlooks the enclosed stands and features central heat and air, a media room, a radio booth, announcers' booth and athletic director's private box with a walk-out porch. In addition, direct phone lines to the dugouts and an intercom system designed to keep media apprised of line-up changes and substitutions have been installed. The two-sided media area also has a

Lady'Back Yard has seen some minor improvements over the past few years. Arkansas added additional fencing along the bullpen areas and has changed the infield slightly. There is a grass border in front

of the dugouts and behind home plate.

Future improvements include the creation of a state-of-the-art stadium at a new location on campus. Chairback

seating, a redesigned press box, skyboxes and fan amenities along the concourse are just a few of the scheduled upgrades.

The Southeastern Conference -- Setting the Standard for Excellence

In only its 10th year of existence, SEC softball has made a name for itself across the nation.

The Southeastern Conference qualified six teams for the 2006 NCAA Tournament - Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU and Tennessee. Alabama and Tennessee both went on to represent the SEC at the Women's College World Series. It was Alabama's fourth WCWS appearance and Tennessee's second, making them two of three SEC teams with multiple WCWS appearances since softball became a conference sport. The Lady Vols would finish third in the WCWS.

The Crimson Tide claimed the regular-season championship and the Western Division title, while Georgia claimed the Eastern Division crown. Tennessee won the SEC Tournament, defeating LSU 3-0, to capture their first SEC Tournament Championship.

Trailing only the Pac-10, the SEC tied a record-number six teams for the 2000 NCAA Softball Tournament. LSU, Arkansas, Mississippi State, Alabama, Florida and SEC Tournament champion South Carolina all made the field of 48.

The sport came under the auspices of the Southeastern Conference in the 1996-97 season. Since that time, nine different conference teams have made appearances in the NCAA Championship, including three Women's College World Series berths - one by South Carolina in the inaugural season, Alabama in 2000 and 2006 and LSU in 2001. LSU reached the semifinals in 2001 and finished the season ranked third nationally. In 1999, four teams earned bids to postseason, the second most by any conference.

Eight teams (Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee) have made Top 25 appearances, and four teams have climbed into the Top 10 (Alabama, Georgia, LSU and Tennessee) of the NFCA/USA Today Poll. At least one SEC team has been ranked in the poll each week since the inception of SEC softball. In 1999 alone, SEC teams made 29 appearances in the poll.

South Carolina is the flagship team of the league with a rich history in softball dating back 28 seasons. The Lady Gamecocks have made 11 NCAA Regional and three WCWS appearances.

Mississippi State played softball for five seasons during the 1980s before resuming the sport when it was added to the SEC. Tennessee added softball in 1995-96, one year before its inception in the SEC. Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU and Ole Miss began softball programs in 1996-97 to give the league 11 representatives (Vanderbilt does not sponsor softball).

The 1999 season was the first in which the conference was eligible for an automatic berth to the NCAA Championships.

In its first 10 seasons, the SEC has watched its newest sport gain in competitiveness and popularity. Two different teams have won the SEC regular-season title as well as the tournament title. South Carolina has won both once, and LSU has won both three times.



Primary among the programs created by the Walton gift was the designation of \$200 million toward the establishment of a university-wide Honors College.

One of the benchmarks to college education is the annual *US News and World Report* "Best Colleges" issue. The 2005 edition moved the University of Arkansas into its top level of the leading institutions of higher learning in the United States. The peer review and data-driven survey put Arkansas at 120th overall, moving the University into the top tier for the first time in school history.

In addition, the Sam M. Walton College of Business ranked 24th place among

the nation's top public undergraduate business schools, according to the 2006 US News. Adding to the good news, the College of Engineering was ranked for the first time

Arkansas enjoyed record enrollment for yet again in Fall 2005, continuing a trend of increasing enrollment each year at the University. Arkansas edged even closer to the 18,000 mark with a record attendance of 17,938 students in classes for the Fall 2006 semester.

Since the turn of the 21st Century, Arkansas has brought home more than its share of the nation's most prestegious undergraduate awards. In fact, the University of Arkansas was the only public or private institution in the country to have Rhodes, Marshall, Goldwater, Udall, NSF and James Madison recipients in the same year in 2001-02, and continues each year to add to the overall total of the highly competitive post-graduate awards.



The Walton gift joins the \$7.8 million from the Donald W. Reynolds Foundation for a conference and research center built in 1999, and the \$8 million received in 2003 from the Willard and Pat Walker Charitable Foundation for a new graduate school, specialty classrooms and research centers.

Established in 1926, the Walton College has been accredited by the AACSB International since 1931. The college has six departments: accounting, economics, finance, information systems, management, and marketing and logistics, and offers five master's programs, including the MBA, and two Ph.D. programs. 
The University and the city of Fayetteville provide a multitude of events for students throughout the year, beginning in the fall with Arkansas football games and ending

Connected to the World By land or by air, Fayetteville is easy to reach

A former coach at Arkansas once joked that Fayetteville wasn't at the end of the world, but you can see it from here.

Well, that thinking is so 20th Century. The days of small planes and winding roads are long over at Arkansas.

Opening in 1997 with the landing of Air Force One's 747, Northwest Arkansas Regional Airport is one of America's newest major airports. With its 8,800-foot main runway complete with a Category I instrument landing

system, NW Arkansas Regional is served by six major airlines -- American, Continental, Delta, Northwest, United and U.S. Air.

Known by its airport code as XNA, NW Arkansas Regional has direct jet flights to Atlanta, Dallas, Denver, Detroit, Charlotte, Chicago, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Houston, Los Angeles, Memphis, Minneapolis, Newark, Orlando, St. Louis, Salt Lake City and New York City. As a result, almost every destination in America is only one connection away from Fayetteville.

The opening of I-540 in 1998 replaced the scenic, but serpentine, stretch of U.S. 71 from Fayetteville to I-40 just outside of Fort Smith. I-540 skirts the western side of the Boston Mountains and includes the state's first highway tunnel.

The I-540 connection complements the Oklahoma corridor opened up in the mid-1990s with the completion of the Cherokee Turnpike from Tulsa to meet with four-lane U.S. 412.

Dr. John A. White, Chancellor

A native of Arkansas and a UA graduate, Dr. John A. White said he returned to his alma mater to do all he could to "make a difference" for the state which had done so much for him and his family. As he begins his 10th year at the helm of the flagship institution of the UA system, White has changed Arkansas forever.

With an ambitious agenda from the moment he was named Chancellor, White's main goal is to realize the University's vision of becoming the nationally competitive, student-centered research university Arkansas needs and deserves in the 21st century. In reaching that goal he seeks to enhance the University's academic reputation nationally and ensure that the University is the economic and cultural engine for the state of Arkansas.

Few goals could have been more ambitious than setting a billion-dollar fund raising campaign goal; a level of support achieved by less than 15 public universities in America. In a testament to his leadership, more than \$1 billion dollars were raised in the Campaign for the 21st Century, including the largest single gift to a public university in the history of American philanthropy: the \$300 million gift from the Walton Family Charitable Support Foundation.

In recognition of this achievement, the University's Alumni Association made a special exemption to its rules to name White as the recipient of the 2006 Distinguished Alumnus Award at the close of the Campaign for the 21st Century.

A man whose leadership is sought by many, he has recently received several important appointments in the area of collegiate athletics to add to his already impressive resume. He is the presiding chair of the Northwest Arkansas Council and a member of the Northwest Arkansas Regional Airport Authority. White has served on both the NCAA Executive Committee and the NCAA Division I Board of Directors as well as a term as the President of the Southeastern Conference.

Upon his appointment as Chancellor, White moved immediately to draw the best students from the state and beyond. To build a foundation for the future at Arkansas, White increased the number of students who received Chancellor's Scholarships. Resulting in a twelve-fold increase in the number of new freshmen who were Chancellor's Scholars in the fall of 1998, the impact of that first class is just beginning with their graduation in 2002.

White has yet to rest. His priorities include increasing the instruction of Arkansas' students through information technology and an environment that is diverse and international in outlook; moving the university from the equivalent of the old Carnegie Foundation definitions of a Research II university to Research I status; increasing the diversity of the university's faculty, staff, and student body; increasing private gift support; and increasing state and federal support. He is also striving to increase enrollment to a 22,000-person student body that is competitive with those at the best publicly supported universities in the nation.

An advocate for improving his home state, he serves on the board of directors for the Arkansas Science and Technology Authority. White completed a second six-year term on the National Science Board last year, and has served as the chair of the Council of Presidents of the Southeastern Universities Research Association and as

president of the Malcolm Baldrige National Quality Award Foundation.

White served previously as president of the Institute of Industrial Engineers, chairman of the American Association of Engineering Societies, and president of the National Consortium for Graduate Degrees for Minorities in Engineering and Science.

Prior to returning to Arkansas, Dr. White was Dean of Engineering at the Georgia Institute of Technology where he served on the faculty for 22 years. His career in higher education and in management and engineering consulting has carried him into the national ranks, including service as assistant director for engineering at the National Science Foundation in Washington, D.C., from 1988 to 1991.

Among his numerous awards, White was honored in June 2006 with the inaugural John L. Imhoff Award from the American Society for Engineering Education, an honor made personally significant as the late Dr. Imhoff recruited White to the industrial engineering field in 1958 and was a mentor of White's until Imhoff's recent death.



White was named the 2005 Northwest Arkansas Humanitarian of the Year by the National Coalition for Community and Justice and the 2005 Regent's Medallion of Merit from Sigma Nu Fraternity. During his academic career, he also received the Donald E. Marlowe Award for Distinguished Education Administration of the American Society for Engineering Education, the Frank and Lillian Gilbreth Industrial Engineering Award of the Institute of Industrial Engineers, the Rodney D. Chipp Memorial Award of the Society of Women Engineers, the Distinguished Service Award of the National Science Foundation and the National Science Foundation Engineer of the Year award.

Chancellor White earned a bachelor's degree in industrial engineering at Arkansas in 1962, a master's at Virginia Tech, and a doctorate at Ohio State. He also holds honorary doctorates from Katholieke Universitiet of Leuven, Belgium, and George Washington University.

White is married to Mary Elizabeth Quarles White and they have a daughter, a son, three grand-daughters and a grandson.

Howard Brill, Faculty Athletics Representative

In his 10th year as the University's faculty representative for athletics is Howard W. Brill. A law professor at the UA since 1975, Brill was named interim dean of the UA Law School in Fall 2005. He previously served as a member of the UA Faculty Athletics Committee from 1991-94 and was on a special committee to prepare the SEC's Gender Equity Policy in the spring of 1994. He chaired Arkansas' NCAA Self-Study committee, finishing in 1998.

Brill is a 1965 graduate of Duke and earned his law degree at Florida in 1970. He received

his master's of law degree at Illinois in 1979. A widely published author, Brill has written two books and numerous law review articles and has received several awards honoring his teaching. He is licensed to practice law in Arkansas, Florida and Illinois and is a member of the Arkansas Bar and the state Judicial Ethics Advisory Committee. He was recently selected the first Vincent Foster Professor of Legal Ethics and Professional Responsibility. He is a past member of the Governor's Code of Ethics Commission and the Arkansas Improvement District

Commission of the state General Assembly.

Active in community service, Brill has served as chairman of the City of Fayetteville's Civil Service Commission, has coached youth soccer and basketball and is a Sunday

School teacher. He and his wife Katherine have three children, Christian, Elizabeth and Andrew.

With the twin goals of academic and athletic excellence, the Women's Athletics Department continues to build, quite literally, upon its past record of achievements toward a bright future for female student-athletes. A separate women's athletics department is only one part of the commitment at the University of Arkansas.

This forward-looking arrangement places the Lady Razorbacks among a handful of similarly minded progressive universities in the nation. It allows the staff and coaches of the Arkansas Women's Athletics Department to address the unique needs of administration, promotion and organization of modern collegiate women's sports.

Example of the University's commitment to women in sport are its funding and sponsorships. Arkansas sponsors 11 varsity sports for women: basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, indoor track, swimming and diving, outdoor track, tennis, softball and volleyball. Each one is fully funded to compete at the national level.



But the most obvious example of the commitment of the state of Arkansas is the Bev Lewis Center for Women's Athletics. The first major training facility constructed from the ground up for the exclusive use of female student-athletes, the 40,000-square foot Lewis Center provides Lady Razorback athletes with America's premier collegiate athletic building.

Setting the tone is Bev Lewis, Arkansas' Director of Women's Athletics. During her tenure as AD, Lewis has instituted bold programs to promote awareness and community participation in Women's Athletics. She guided the Lady Razorbacks through a period of unequalled expansion during the past decade and a half.

She has assembled a coaching staff that includes national champions, members of NCAA selection committees, national team coaches and Olympic team staff members.

During the past decade, Lady Razorback student-athletes have received numerous awards, including NCAA postgraduate scholarships, the Honda Award, national finalist selection for NCAA Women of the Year, earned numerous *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America honors and received several prestigious postgraduate scholarship awards including the university's first and second SEC H. Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Awards.

In competition, Arkansas' broad-based program has the distinction of 10 of the 11 current varsity teams earning a national top 25 ranking at some point in the respective team's history, and 10 of 11 having reached the NCAA Championships during the past five seasons.

Bev Lewis begins her 26th season at the University of Arkansas with the same goal as director of women's athletics that she had when she arrived as the Lady Razorbacks' cross country and track coach: helping young women fulfill their goals of a college degree and athletic excellence at the University of Arkansas.

The 2006-07 season marks Lewis' 18th at the helm of the Women's Athletics Department. During her tenure as a coach and administrator, she has left her mark on the University and defined women's athletics on a state, regional and national level. Lewis took over the AD duties in June 1989 after serving eight years as the Lady Razorback cross country and track coach. For one year she held both positions, stepping down as a head coach in 1990.

The hallmark of her tenure as the Director of Women's Athletics has been the overall excellence of her entire program. Last season, gymnastics achieved the NCAA Championship round in only the fourth season of the program. During her time as athletic director, every Lady Razorback sport has achieved a new pinnacle from basketball reaching the Women's Final Four in 1998 to the national runner-up trophy earned by cross country and national third place by track in the 2000 season.

The success of Women's Athletics is not limited to the field of competition. As a result of her strong emphasis on the classroom, Lady Razorbacks have received numerous academic honors including national academic all-American of the year, team academic national titles and the University's first two SEC/Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athletes of the Year. Over the past decade, 95% of all Lady Razorbacks who completed their four years of eligiblity at Arkansas have left Fayetteville with a UA degree.



A behind-the-scenes worker by nature, Bev Lewis found herself the center of attention on April 9, 2003, with the ribbon cutting and dedication of the Lady Razorbacks' new Lewis Center for Women's Athletics.

Her leadership was also a part of the success of the University's Campaign for the 21st Century. Lewis directed Women's Athletics to over \$11.5 million in direct support for the Lady Razorbacks including gifts for facilities like the Huntley Gymnastics Training Facility and Sutton Strength and Conditioning Center as well as more than tripling the number of named and endowed scholarships for female student-athletes.

During the Campaign, Lewis received one of her greatest personal honors as longtime University benefactors Bob and Marilyn Bogle requested that Arkansas' \$6 million facility for Lady Razorbacks be named the Bev Lewis Center for Women's Athletics. On April 9, 2003, before a standing room only crowd of family and friends, she had the honor of cutting the ribbon on the facility.

In 1998, she was voted into the University of Arkansas Hall of Honor by the University's letterwinners in recognition of her contributions to the Women's Athletics Department both as a coach and an administrator.

As Athletic Director, Lewis was instrumental in taking the Lady Razorbacks to the next level providing the staff, facilities and budget to be successful. In recognition of her outstanding achievements, Lewis was named to Arkansas Business magazine's "Top 100 Women in Arkansas" in 1996, 1997 and 1998. Lewis was a member of the "40 Under 40" which highlighted the achievements of business leaders in Arkansas who were under 40 years old during those same years.

She has served in leadership roles on committees for the Southeastern Conference and the NCAA. After serving four years on the NCAA Championship Cabinet, she is currently a member of the NCAA Management Council. A former member of the track and field committee and its outdoor chair, she also served on the NCAA soccer committee. She also served a term on the SEC Executive Committee from 1992 to

To increase athletic participation at Arkansas for women, Lewis orchestrated the addition of four sports at the University during her tenure as athletic director. Not only providing scholarship opportunities, each new sport -- volleyball, golf, softball and gymnastics -- has reached its respective NCAA championship.

Lewis brought national attention to Arkansas by

hosting numerous SEC Championships as well as the 1994 NCAA Women's Basketball Mideast Regional, the 1994 NCAA Division I Cross Country Championship



However, as a former track coach Lewis takes particular pride in the University's role in hosting the NCAA Men's and Women's Indoor Track and Field Championships for the past six years.

Prior to assuming the duties of AD, Lewis' Lady Razorback cross country and track teams had six top 20 national finishes, and she coached Team USA at the 1990 World Junior Cross Country Championships.

Her Arkansas coaching milestones were numerous. Under her direction, cross country achieved three notable Lady Razorback firsts. On Oct. 4, 1984, her cross country team became the first Lady'Back squad to achieve a national ranking. Arkansas finished that season ranked 16th.

She added the first top 10 finish to her resume in 1986 as cross country finished 10th at the NCAA Championships and backed it up with a ninth-place finish in 1987. Her coaching was instrumental in establishing Arkansas' perfect record of sending a team or individual to every collegiate national meet since the program's inception.

Lewis also coached Arkansas' first conference championship team at the 1988 Southwest Conference Cross Country Championships. As a result, her peers voted her SWC Coach of the Year for the second year in a row. She also was named SWC Outdoor Track Coach of the Year in 1989.

Lewis earned her bachelor's degree from Central Michigan in 1979 and followed it with her master's from Purdue prior to her arrival at Arkansas in 1981.

Her husband, Harley, former athletic director at the University of Montana and a former assistant director of championships with the NCAA, works with the University of Arkansas as director of development for the Chancellor's Scholarship program.

Tracey Mays Stehlik, Senior Associate Athletic Director

Entering her 22nd year with the Arkansas Women's Athletics Department, Tracey Mays Stehlik was promoted to senior associate athletic director in 2004.

Stehlik oversees compliance, operations, eligibility, academics and event management for the Lady Razorbacks. She joined the administrative side of the department in 1995, and was promoted to associate athletic director in 1997.

Among her numerous areas of responsibility, Stehlik has served as the meet director for the NCAA Indoor Championships for the past four years. As an assistant basketball coach, she recruit-

ed some of the greatest players in UA history and helped lead Arkansas to back-to-back Southwest Conference titles.

She has the distinction of scoring the first point in Alabama-Birmingham women's basketball history as a member of the first Blazer team. Her husband, Wayne, is director of development

and the Stehliks have two daughters, Mollie and Maggie.

Kim Harter

Associate Athletic Director for Business Affairs

Kim Harter starts her 16th year with the University of Arkansas Women's Athletics Department as the business manager. Starting with the Lady'Backs in 1991, she was promoted to Associate Athletic Director in 1996. As



the first associate AD for business affairs in the Women's Department, she has set procedures for all financial aspects of the department.

A University graduate, Harter, a certified public accountant, graduated cum laude from the College of Business as a returning student. She worked in a CPA firm for two years and was the manager of a financial institution for 13 years prior to joining the Lady Razorback staff. She and husband Lance (the UA women's track and cross country coach) have five children: Jeff, Meagan, Alison, Christie and Josh.

Melissa Harwood-Rom

Associate Athletic Director for Eligibility and Student Affairs

Women's Athletics Training Room



The University of Arkansas athletic training staff makes up one of the top collegiate sports medicine programs in the nation. Arkansas provides both a qualified staff and the resources necessary to care for student-athletes with the most

up-to-date treatment techniques to prevent and rehabilitate injuries.

The University of Arkansas' women's athletic training room staff is supervised by assistant athletic director

Julie Cain. Cain oversees a staff that includes three full-time assistants and a pair of graduate assistants.

The Lady Razorbacks utilize the main training room at Barnhill Arena, as well as remote facilities at Lady'Back Field, Bud Walton Arena and the Lewis Center. At Bud Walton Arena, the Lady'Backs have immediate off-the-court access to athletic training

The main facility at Barnhill has gone through several changes since Cain's arrival. In addition to expand-

Academic Support

There is no higher priority for the University of Arkansas Women's Athletics Department than the academic progress of its scholar-athletes. To achieve the goal of providing the absolute best in academic support, the department felt it was of extreme importance that female student-athletes have their own academic support personnel. Starting in 1989, the Lady Razorbacks constructed their own academic support staff, and in 1991 constructed a Women's Academic Center at Barnhill Arena.

Two expansions in the Women's Academic Center followed in 1995 and 1997, but thanks to the generous gift of Bob and Marilyn Bogle, a joint academic center to assist both the Men's and

Women's Athletics Departments opened in August 2001 as a part of the Reynolds Razorback Stadium renovations.

The Bob and Marilyn Bogle Academic Center features 15,000 square feet of space including state-of-the-art computer labs and

interactive teaching facilities. Along with formal and informal study areas, the Bogle Center includes private tutor rooms, student life and career development resources and a multipurpose classroom. It also continues the tradition of a dedicated space devoted to the needs of female student-athletes.

Combined with the services of the Aca-

demic Support Program headed by the assistant athletic director for academic support, Deedee Brown-Campbell, the Academic Center gives Lady Razorback athletes a unique advantage in their scholarly endeavors.



Deedee Brown-Campbell

Assistant Athletic Director for Academic Support and Life Skills

Beginning her third year as a full-time staff member, Deedee Brown-Campbell was promoted to assistant athletic director during the summer of 2006. Brown-Campbell oversees the academic center and supervises the Lady'Backs' staff of academic assistants work with each team. She also administers the department's tutoring program, focus (study hall) hours and fifth-year and summer school programs. In addition, she is the director for the HAWGS Life-Skills program for the Women's Athletics Department.


The former Arkansas all-American is a true product of the program. Upon completing her athletic eligibility and graduating with a degree in kinesiology, Brown-Campbell decided to stay with the University of Arkansas as a graduate assistant, working in athletic administration and as an academic counselor for a little over a year. She was hired full time

in January 2004 as the assistant director of academic support, and promoted to director in the summer of 2004. In addition to her duties with the Lady Razorbacks, Brown-Campbell also serves on the Campus Career Coalition and is the minority affairs representative of the Women's Athletics Department to the University's Multicultural Center.

A two-time all-American in the heptathlon as a member of Arkansas' perennial championship track & field team, Brown-Campbell has made an impact since the day she set foot on campus in the fall of 1998. During her competition days, Brown was one of just a select few to ever earn more than 5,700 points in the heptathlon. She won two Southeastern Conference Championships. Brown-Campbell earned her master's degree in sport management in December of 2003. She married Razorback football player Marcus Campbell in 2005, and the couple lives in Fayetteville.

Arkansas Traditions

Why Razorbacks?

Arkansas' athletic teams have not always been called the Razorbacks. During the early years of its athletic history, the Cardinal served as the University nickname.

A lot of things changed in 1909, however, when Arkansas football

coach Hugo Bezdek called his players "a wild band of Razorback hogs," after



guiding his team to a 16-0 victory over Louisiana State on October 30, 1909.

Alluding to the Razorback, characterized by a ridge back and tenacious, wild fighting ability, Bezdek never forgot this idea and often called his team "a fighting band of Razorbacks."

This new nickname became increasingly popular and the student body voted to change the official University mascot from the Cardinal to the Razorbacks in 1910.

In the 1920s, "Wooo, Pig, Sooie" was added as the school yell, referred to more commonly today as the "Hog Call."

Why Lady Razorbacks?

From its inception in 1971, the Women's Athletics Department was a separate entity at the University of Arkansas. Many universities were arranged in separate departments, but with the demise of the AIAW, many universities folded their women's athletics departments into their men's. Not so at Arkansas. Like a handful of similarly progressive major universities, Arkansas maintained and reinforced its separate department to serve the special needs of female athletes.

To emphasize its separate identity, the Arkansas Women's Athletics Department continues to use "Lady" in its nickname. While some consider it progressive to drop "Lady," Arkansas employs it as a marketing and identification tool.

What's a Lady'Back?

The use of the contraction "Lady'Back" as a second reference for the Lady Razorbacks was adopted in 1989 along with a new departmental

logo. Not unlike the evolution of "Razorback" as a mascot, the term "Lady'Back" had been used by fans and headline writers for several years.

The Lady'Back Logo

There have been several Lady Razorback logos to represent the Women's Athletics Department.

In 1995, a new logo was commissioned to celebrate 25 years of Lady

Razorback athletics. The new logo was designed by Tim Walker of Walker Creative. It became the official logo of the Women's Athletics Department in May of 1995.



The Hog Hat

It is true; no Razorback fan's closet

is complete without an official Hog Hat. The hard plastic hat with a long snout, rough razorback ridges across the top and wickedly sharp, pointed curlycue tail is undoubtedly



the most recognized piece of fan apparel in college athletics. Just ask ESPN GameDay's Kirk Herbstreit as he dons the traditional Hog Hat.



their own mascot Hog who is famous at women's home events and in the community as an ambassador to kids and kids at heart. Not unlike some Lady Razorback athletes, former Big Reds have become professional

mascots with minor league baseball and NBA teams.

A Proper Hog Call

A chant of "Woo Pig Sooie" is known worldwide as a Hog Call. Just like any good tradition, there are lots of versions of the Hog Call (even spellings).

A properly executed Hog Call is composed of three "calls," slowly raising one's arms from the knees to above the head during the "Woo." Traditionalists prescribe an eight second "Woo." The fingers should be wiggled and the "Woo" should build in volume and pitch as the arms rise.

Upon completion of the "Woo," both arms are brought straight down with fists clinched as if executing a chin-up while yelling, "Pig". The right arm is extended up and out with the "Sooie."

A full Hog Call -- the kind one will always hear victorious Lady'Back teams execute after contests -- requires

two more Hog Calls, followed immediately by a "Razor-Backs" yell, coordinated with a pumping motion of the right arm after the third "Sooie." So, in order, the full Hog Call is:

Wooooooo. Pig. Sooie! Wooooooo. Pig. Sooie! Wooooooo. Pig. Sooie! Razorbacks! (or Lady'Backs)

They have performed at men's and women's basketball games, volleyball and football




games. Join the Hogwild Band in singing the Razorback Fight Song or the Alma Mater this year.

The Lady Razorback Museum

Considered the nation's first on-campus museum dedicated solely to the achievements of female student-athletes, the Lady Razorback Museum opened to rave reviews in 1999. Located in the north lobby of Barnhill Arena, the 9,000-seat home of Arkansas volleyball and gymnastics, it features all eleven women's sports. The museum highlights the individual and team champions at the University of Arkansas during the three decades of varsity competition. The display is more than trophies. The academic achievements of female student-athletes, Arkansas' numerous statewide NCAA Woman of the Year recipients and the role of athletes as leaders in the community are highlighted.

The major displays of the museum are its Wall of Champions, celebrating the achievement of Arkansas' women on the conference and national level, and the Great Moments Theater, a DVD interactive theater filled with highlights of the first three decades of Arkansas women's athletics.


The giant photo mural entitled "Celebration" which rings the Great Moments Theater and the department's welcoming message to visitors have become the signature displays of the museum.

"The initial goal was to enhance our recruiting," UA Director of Women's Athletics

This space is dedicated to those young girls who will come with that twinkle in their eye; To see the past in hopes that they will learn that this is where they can come to build their future.

Welcome to a special place, where every person from the coaches to the trainers; from the tutors to the fans have only one goal in their hearts-transforming the dreams of little girls into the achievements of women.



Perhaps Arkansas' women's track and field coach Lance Harter said it best -- "There is no facility for female athletes like it in America."

The former Olympic assistant and two-time World Championships head coach for USAT&F knows something about world-class training facilities.

Perhaps the largest strength and conditioning facility devoted exclusively to collegiate female athletes in the country, the Lewis Center houses the 7,000-square foot Sutton Strength Center, designed for the physiology of female athletes. It brings together under one roof Olympic weights, plyometric training, aerobic equipment and selectorized weight lifting machines.





The Bev Lewis Center for Women's Athletics

The first athletic building purpose-built to the needs of female student-athletes at the University of Arkansas, the Bev Lewis Center for Women's Athletics represents a hallmark in the history of both the University and the state.

Made possible by the lead gift of Bob and Marilyn Bogle, the Bogles had only one request. The name of the proposed Center for Women's Athletics reflect the accomplishments of the University's longtime coach and Women's AD Bev Lewis.

As a result, the gift helped create one of the finest training facilities in the nation for female college athletes.







Construction began in December 2001 with site preparation. Portions of the facility opened during January and February of 2003 with the formal dedication on April 9, 2003.

From the custom-made lifting stations highlighting the Lady Razorback logo (below) in the Sutton Strength and Conditioning Center to the one-of-a-kind layout of the 15,000-square foot Huntley Gymnastics Practice Facility (shown in photo panorama below), the Bev Lewis Center for Women's Athletics

lives up to its name as the focus of the University of Arkansas' female studentathletes.

Devoted to the exclusive training of the 11 Lady'Back teams, the 7,000-square foot Sutton Strength and Conditioning Center mixes the best in free weight stations with ample open space for plyometric and other types of conditioning (left).
