Decades of Dominance

By far the most dominant cross country and track and field program of the past three decades, Arkansas has rewritten the record books when it comes to NCAA Championships. Of the 84 (at time of print) championships contested since 1984 in cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field, Arkansas has brought home 40 national titles. No other school has earned more than five during that same time span.

Winning on the National Scale

As one of the most successful programs in collegiate history, University of Arkansas cross country and track and field teams have won 40 national titles since 1984 and have captured an unprecedented five NCAA triple crowns.

The Nation's Top Track & Field Conference

In the ever-changing world of collegiate athletics, the tradition of excellence in the Southeastern Conference has remained constant. The SEC boasts a rich history and has dominated track and field like no other conference.

2011 SEC Men's Track and Field Awards

2011 SEC Men's Indoor Track & Field

Florida captured its second consecutive team title at the NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships in College Station, Texas. The Gators were one of four SEC teams to finish inside the top 20 along with LSU (4th), Ole Miss (11th) and Auburn (t-20th). The remaining conference teams--in order of finish--were Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Tennessee, Kentucky, South Carolina and Mississippi State. At the SEC Indoor Track and Field Championships, Florida captured the team crown and the Gators' head coach Mike Holloway was named the SEC Coach of the Year. Kirani James of Alabama and Christian Taylor of Florida were tabbed the Runner and Field Athlete of the Year, respectively. Freshman Runner of the Year honors went to Florida's Eddie Lovett while Auburn's Stephen Saenz was named the Freshman Field Athlete of the Year.

2011 SEC Men's Outdoor Track & Field

At the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships in Des Moines, Iowa, the SEC was represented by nine teams with Florida (3rd), LSU (4th) and Arkansas (t-10th) finishing inside the top 10. The remaining teams in the field were Ole Miss, Mississippi State, Alabama, Kentucky, Georgia and Tennessee. Arkansas won its 16th team title at the SEC Outdoor Track and Field Championships in Athens, Ga. For leading his team to the win, Arkansas' Chris Bucknam was named the SEC Coach of the Year. Kirani James of Alabama and Will Claye of Florida were the SEC Runner and Field Athlete of the Year, respectively. Tennessee's Dentarius Locke earned Freshman Runner of the Year honors and Stephen Saenz of Auburn was the Freshman Field Athlete of the Year.

Indoor Track

Sixteen national championships since 1992 with 135 NCAA individual champions and three NCAA Championship record holders. The SEC led all conferences with 69 All-America recipients.

Outdoor Track

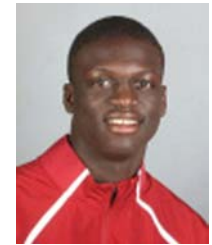

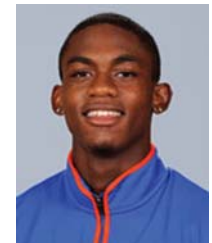

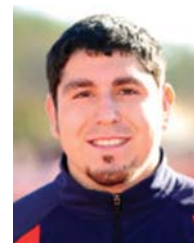

For the sixth time in the storied history of the Randal Tyson Track Center, the facility played host to the SEC Championships during the 2011 season.

2011 All-Americans: The University of Arkansas men's track and field team collected 18 All-America honors with the release of 2011 indoor accolades by the USTFCCA. The accolades were spread among 12 student-athletes in nine events. First-team honors went to Tarik Batchelor and the 4x400 relay team:

RECAP - NCAA Championships: Tarik Batchelor had a fifth-place finish in the long jump and the 4x400-meter relay team of Ben Skidmore, Marek Niit, Chris Bilbrew and Neil Braddy ran to a bronze result this past weekend at the NCAA Championships in College Station, Texas. The Razorbacks finished tied for 22nd place with 10 points at the national meet. The 2011 NCAA Championships aired on tape-delay March 16 at 1:30 p.m. (CT) on ESPN2.

Capping the Weekend: The quartet of Ben Skidmore, Marek Niit, Chris Bilbrew and Neil Braddy combined for a time 3:06.79 and a bronze finish in the 4x400-meter relay at the NCAA Championships. It marked the program's fifth top-eight result in the event, and its highest since the 1987 team ran to a second-place finish.

Who Got In: Arkansas collected 12 national entries spread among nine student-athletes and two relays. Nine of the 12 participants came via an automatic qualifier while the remaining three were at-large selections. Arkansas is the only men's team to qualify both distance-medley and 4x400-meter relays.

Case Earns Regional Honor: Doug Case was recognized Monday with the release of the USTFCCA regional awards for the 2011 indoor season. Case was selected as the South Central Region Men's Assistant Coach of the Year. In his third season at Arkansas, Case coaches the Razorbacks' sprints, hurdles and pole vault crews. During the 2011 indoor season, his athletes have collected six NCAA automatic qualifiers spread among four student-athletes and one relay.

Get the Baton Around the Track: Arkansas is the only team in the men's field with both relays--DMR and 4x400--qualified for the NCAA Championships. The Razorbacks have the top-ranked 4x400 crew with its time of 3:05.13 at the SEC Championships. The distance-medley relay will enter the national meet with the No. 6 time in the NCAA, a 9:30.85 showing at the Razorback Invitational in January.

Impact Freshmen: The Razorbacks qualified three freshmen in individual events for the NCAA Championships with Neil Braddy in the 400 meters, Raymond Higgs in the long jump and Kevin Lazas in the heptathlon. Braddy is the fastest freshman qualifier in the 400 meters and is just one of two freshman in the event. Higgs and Lazas will be one of three freshman in the long jump and heptathlon, respectively.

RECAP - Arkansas Last Chance: In its final home indoor date of the season, the Razorbacks posted three event wins and a handful of season-best marks at the Arkansas Last Chance meet. The team's wins came from Chris Bilbrew in the 800 meters, Solomon Haile in the 3,000 meters and Raymond Higgs in the long jump. Among the other highlights, Scott Gillespie ran to an eight-second improvement on his personal best in a runner-up effort in the mile.

American Junior Record: Having already established the American junior record in the heptathlon earlier in the season, freshman Kevin Lazas extended the mark with his 5,674 points at the SEC Championships. Along the way, he notched personal



collegiate bests in six of the seven events. His previous record of 5,509 points came from his performance at the Jan. 28-29 Razorback Invitational. Prior to this season, the previous record of 5,478 points was set by Mike Morrison while competing for Florida in 2007.

All-SEC Honors: Based on respective performances at the SEC Championships in Fayetteville, the Razorbacks also collected 13 all-conference honors. Tarik Batchelor and members of the 4x400 relay--Ben Skidmore, Marek Niit, Chris Bilbrew and Neil Braddy--earned first-team honors for their victories at the conference meet. Second-team selections went to LaShawn Butler (200m), Duncan Phillips (mile), Eric Fernandez (5,000m) and Kevin Lazas (heptathlon). Four members of the team--Braddy (400m), Lazas (heptathlon), Bryan Cantero (mile) and Raymond Higgs (high jump)--were named to the freshman team.

2011 SEC Championships Wrap-Up: Arkansas scored 136.5 points to earn a second-place finish at the 2011 SEC Indoor Track and Field Championships at the Randal Tyson Track Center. The Razorbacks' point total is their highest since scoring 141 points at the conference meet in 2006. Arkansas finished the three-day event with two event champions and one school record. The team wins came in the long jump with Tarik Batchelor and the 4x400-meter relay. The school record came by way of Kevin Lazas in the heptathlon. The 2011 SEC Indoor Track and Field Championships will be broadcast by ESPNU on March 10 at 8 p.m. (CT).

Jumping to a Title: Batchelor won his first SEC title with his performance in the long jump. He went out over 26 feet in his first three jumps, including the championship mark of 26-5.75 on his third attempt. With the victory, the Razorbacks have won the last two conference indoor titles in the event. Batchelor is the fourth jumper in program history to win the SEC indoor crown, joining former Razorbacks Erick Walder (1992-94), Robert Howard (1997-98) and Alain Bailey (2008, 2010).

4x4 Posts a World Leader: The Razorbacks saved a bit of school history for the final race of the weekend as the 4x400-meter relay captured the program's first-ever SEC indoor title in the event. Running in the third section of the timed final, the foursome of Ben Skidmore, Marek Niit, Chris Bilbrew and Neill Braddy held off Florida and LSU for the title, clocking in at 3:05.13. Arkansas' performance is the fastest time in the world this year, an NCAA automatic qualifier and the second-best time in school history.

All-Academic Team: For his outstanding work in the classroom, Lane Boyer was named to the USTFCCA All-Academic Team for the 2010 cross country season. This marks the third career honor for Boyer who was also recognized in 2008 and 2009. The Fredonia, Kan., native carries a 3.865 cumulative GPA as a geology major in the Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences.

RECAP - Husky Classic/Tyson Invitational: The Razorbacks hosted the 2011 Tyson Invitational this weekend, competing in a field that featured 13 teams ranked inside the nation's top 25. Among the highlights, Dey Tuach posted a top-15 national performance in the 800 meters, Marek Niit had top-10 results in the 200 and 400 meters and the 4x400-meter relay team posted a season-best time. The Razorbacks also sent a handful of distance runners to the UW Husky Classic in Seattle where Duncan Phillips picked up an NCAA automatic qualifier in the mile.

Fast Track: In a re-dedication ceremony Saturday during the 2011 Tyson Invitational, the Randal Tyson Track Center was recognized as "The Home of the Fastest Indoor Track in the World." Joining Vice Chancellor and Director of Athletics Jeff Long on the track for the presentation were Mondo area representative Kirk Sandifer and members of the Razorback coaching staffs.

RECAP New Balance Collegiate Invitational: The Razorbacks finished fourth in the team race with 52 points. Arkansas got victories by Duncan Phillips and Dey Tuach in the 800 meters and mile, respectively, and a runner-up performance by the 4x400-meter relay team—Marek Niit, Ben Skidmore, Chris Bilbrew and Neill Braddy—in the final event of the weekend. Phillips' time in the 800 meters is the No. 5 time in the NCAA this season.

Personal Best for Phillips: Duncan Phillips won the championship section of the 800 meters at the NB Collegiate Invitational. Using a late burst down the final back stretch, he ran to victory in a personal-best time of 1:48.47, more than a second faster than his previous best (1:49.92).

Right There With the Best: Stacked up against a talented field of teams at the NB Collegiate Invitational, Arkansas finished the two-day event in fourth place with 52 team points. The Razorbacks were aided by 16 points in the 800 meters and 13 in the mile. In order, the top-five teams were LSU, Texas A&M, Duke, Arkansas and BYU.

SEC Male Runner of the Week: Dey Tuach ran to a runner-up result in the invitational 800 meters at the Razorback Invitational, clocking a time of 1:48.70, the fifth-fastest time in the nation. The race marked his Arkansas debut in the event. He also ran the 800-meter leg of Arkansas' distance-medley relay that clocked an NCAA automatic-qualifying time of 9:30.85, good for a second-place finish, the No. 2 time in the nation and the ninth-best performance in school history.

RECAP - Razorback Invitational: The men's track and field team hosted the Razorback Invitational which featured a highly competitive field including eight teams ranked in the top 25. During the two-day event, the Razorbacks came away with two NCAA automatic-qualifying marks. The distance-medley relay team of Bryan Cantero, Chris Bilbrew, Dey Tuach and Duncan Phillips combined for a second-place performance in a time of 9:30.85 to secure their spot at the NCAA Championships. Tarik Batchelor notched his second auto qualifier in the triple jump with a mark of 53-4.25, good for third place. In the heptathlon,

Kevin Lazas turned in a third-place finish with a school-record 5,509 points.

DMR Qualifies for NCAAs: The foursome of Bryan Cantero, Chris Bilbrew, Dey Tuach and Duncan Phillips combined for a time of 9:30.85 to seal the crew's spot at the NCAA Championships. The Razorbacks' time is the second-fastest in the nation this season (as of Jan. 29) and the No. 9 mark in school history.

Weekend Produces Big Performances: With a competition field that featured eight teams ranked in the nation's top 25, the Razorback Invitational (Jan. 28-29) saw several NCAA seasonal bests and qualifying marks. All told, the 11-team field (men's and women's) combined to post 23 automatic qualifiers—20 individual and three relays.

RECAP - Arkansas-Texas Dual: The No. 13 University of Arkansas men's track and field team beat 15th-ranked Texas in a dual meet (Jan. 14) at Randal Tyson Track Center. The Razorbacks secured the meet, 97-72, with victories in 12 of the 16 events, including an NCAA automatic-qualifying mark (26-2.5) by Tarik Batchelor in the long jump. He has also qualified for the national championships in the triple jump.

Calling the (Former) Hogs: Razorback track and field history was well represented during Arkansas' dual with Texas as former All-Americans Reuben Reina, Wallace Spearmon, Jr., and Erick Walder were on hand to present awards to a few victorious Razorbacks. Former standout Brandon Rock was also in attendance.

RECAP - Arkansas Invitational: In the season-opening event of the 2011 campaign, the Razorbacks collected three event wins at the Arkansas Invitational. Tarik Batchelor led the way by securing a spot at the NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships with an automatic-qualifying mark of 54-2.75 in the triple jump. Leoman Momoh (800m) and Dey Tuach (1,000m) also won.

Meeting the Standard: In his fourth attempt of the season, Tarik Batchelor became the first Razorback to punch his ticket for the indoor national meet. His mark of 54-2.75 is not only an automatic qualifier but a personal best by more than a foot and a half (previous: 52-7.5). He won the event by nearly four feet.



2011 NCAA Championships: The Razorbacks closed out their season with a 10th-place finish at the 2011 NCAA Outdoor Championships in Des Moines, Iowa. The total totaled 25 points, including 22 on the final day of competition. Arkansas' points come from runner-up performances by Marek Niit in the 200 meters and Dorian Ulrey in the 1,500 meters, a fifth-place showing by the 4x400 relay, seventh-place finishes by LaShawn Butler in the 200 meters and Tarik Batchelor in the long jump and an eight-place result by Raymond Higgs in the long jump. This marks the second top-10 national outdoor finish for the team under head coach Chris Bucknam.

15 All-America Honors: Arkansas totaled 15 All-America accolades spread among 11 student-athletes in seven events. Marek Niit (200m, 4x100m, 4x400m) earned a team-high three All-America accolades. Neil Braddy (4x100m, 4x400m) and LaShawn Butler (200m, 4x100m) were each selected twice.

National Qualifiers: The Razorbacks will be represented by 14 student-athletes, spread among 11 entries in eight events. Arkansas' 11 entries at the NCAA Championships is tied for the fifth most in the nation. The team has two entries in the 200 meters, 1,500 meters and long jump. Full list below:

First in a Long Time: For the first time since the 2000 season, Arkansas will have an entry in the 4x400 relay with the team of Ben Skidmore, Marek Niit, Chris Bilbrey and Travis Southard. In the Razorbacks' last appearance in the event at the national meet, the foursome of Kevin Baker, Sam Glover, Melvin Lister and Ryan Stanley finished second in the nation with a time of 3:02.02.

Bucknam Named Top Coach: Chris Bucknam was named the SEC Men's Coach of the Year for the second time; he was also selected after Arkansas' 2009 SEC team title. At this year's SEC meet, the Razorbacks collected 157.50 points to capture the program's 16th SEC outdoor title. With this most recent honor, Bucknam now has five SEC coaching accolades to his credit—two outdoor (2009, 2011), two indoor (2009, 2010) and one cross country (2010)



All-SEC: Overall, 10 Razorbacks earned All-SEC honors, including first-team performers Marek Niit and Dorian Ulrey. Second-team honors, given to runner-up performers at the conference meet, went to Duncan Phillips, Eric Fernandez, Tarik Batchelor, Kevin Lazas and 4x100-relay members Caleb Cross, Neil Braddy and LaShawn Butler. Lazas and Raymond Higgs were named to the SEC All-Freshman Team as the top freshman performers in their respective events.

Prelim Qualifiers: Arkansas will be represented by 20 student-athletes--spread among 13 events--and two relays at the NCAA West Prelim in Eugene, Ore. The Razorbacks have multiple entries in six events, including a team-high four set for the high jump.

SEC CHAMPIONS: The University of Arkansas men's track and field team won the 2011 SEC Outdoor Championships team title at the Spec Towns Track in Athens, Ga. The Razorbacks finished the four-day conference meet with 157.50 points to secure the 16th SEC outdoor title in program history and 25th overall conference crown, dating back to Arkansas' days in the Southwest Conference. The team win is the Razorbacks' first since 2009, and second under head coach Chris Bucknam. With the victories by Dorian Ulrey and Marek Niit, the Razorbacks now have 98 SEC event titles.

Ulrey Doubles Up: On the final day of competition, Dorian Ulrey won the 800 meters and 1,500 meters. He is the third Arkansas runner to pull off the 800/1,500 double in SEC competition, joining former Razorback standouts Seneca Lassiter (1998, 1999) and James Karanu (2000).

High-Point Man: Ulrey was named the winner of the SEC Commissioner's Trophy as the top men's scorer with 25 points; in his third race of the day, Ulrey finished fourth in the 5,000 meters. This marks the eighth time a Razorback has been the high-point scorer at the SEC outdoor meet, and first since 2005.

Niit Sprints to Victory: Marek Niit won the team's third individual title of the day with a championship run in the 200 meters. The win is the second 200-meter SEC title in Razorback history, and the first since the 1995 season. Niit joins Derrick Thompson as the only other Arkansas sprinter to take first in the event.

Anatomy of a Champion: On their way to the SEC title, the Razorbacks scored in 16 of 21 events, including 24- and 26-point bunches in the 1,500 meters and 800 meters, respectively. The breakdown of Arkansas' 157.50 points:

RECAP - Arkansas Twilight: The Razorbacks closed out their 2011 home slate last Friday with four event wins at the Arkansas Twilight. Among the highlights, observers saw an SEC-leading and top-three national performance by Marek Niit in the



200 meters. Along with Niit, the team got wins from Ben Skidmore in the 400 meters, Andrew Pennington in the 400-meter hurdles and the 4x100-meter relay.

RECAP - 117th Penn Relays: At the 117th Penn Relays at historic Franklin Field in Philadelphia, Arkansas came away with a pair of runner-up relay finishes in the distance-medley and 4xMile relays and a top-10 program performance in the 4x400-meter relay. In second-place results, the DMR (Tom Cattin-Masson, Marek Niit, Duncan Phillips and Dorian Ulrey) had a time of 9:38.40, while the 4xMile relay (Eric Fernandez, Cattin-Masson, Ulrey and Phillips) clocked in at 16:20.42; Ulrey's third-leg split was the fastest by any runner in the race. On the day three, the 4x400 (Travis Southard, Niit, Chris Bilbrew and Neil Braddy) ran to a time of 3:06.29, the fastest by a Razorback mile relay since the 2000 season.

Joining Arkansas' All-Time Bests: A pair of Razorback relays joined the program's top-10 performance list during the team's weekend at Penn Relays. The 4x200 team of Neil Braddy, Ben Skidmore, LaShawn Butler and Marek Niit posted a time of 1:22.63 in the preliminary round, the seventh-fastest effort in school history. The 4x400 crew of Travis Southard, Niit, Chris Bilbrew and Braddy crossed in 3:06.29, the No. 9 performance by a Razorback mile relay team.

RECAP - John McDonnell Invitational: The Razorbacks picked up four wins at the rain-affected John McDonnell Invitational in Fayetteville with victories from Kevin Lazas in the decathlon, Caleb Cross in the 200 meters, Leoman Momoh in the 800 meters and Brede Raa Ellingsen in the high jump. In the process of winning the decathlon, Lazas set the school record with a total of 7,542 points. He surpassed the previous mark of 7,266 points set by David Wehmeyer in the 1983; the decathlon mark had been the oldest remaining record in the Razorbacks' records book.

Lazas Recognized by SEC: For his performance at the John McDonnell Invitational, Kevin Lazas was named the SEC Freshman of the Week. Competing in his first collegiate decathlon, Lazas led throughout the entire second day to claim the victory. With this total of 7,542 points, Lazas has the top freshman point total in the SEC, third overall in the conference and No. 14 overall in the NCAA.

RECAP - Mt. SAC Relays: The distance crew for the Razorbacks competed at the 53rd Mt. SAC Relays in Walnut, Calif. Eric Fer-

nandez won the 'A' section of the university 5,000 meters in a personal-best time of 13:54.33, a personal best by 12 seconds. The Razorbacks also got career-best efforts from Duncan Phillips and Tom Cattin-Masson in the 1,500 meters. Phillips (3:39.87) finished fourth overall, and was the second collegiate finisher, in the invitational section of the event.

Toward the Front: With his personal-best performance in the 1,500 meters at the Mt. SAC Relays, Duncan Phillips is currently leads the SEC and ranked No. 2 in the country in the event. His time of 3:39.87 improves upon his previous best of 3:44.59 set during the 2008 season.

Higgs Recognized by SEC: For his efforts in the long jump and high jump at the 84th Clyde Littlefield Texas Relays, Raymond Higgs was honored by the league office with the SEC Freshman of the Week award. This is the first weekly honor of his Razorback career.

RECAP - Texas Relays: Arkansas won the distance-medley relay on the final day of competition at the 84th Clyde Littlefield Texas Relays this past weekend in Austin. The DMR quartet of Tom Cattin-Masson, Travis Southard, Chris Bilbrew and Dorian Ulrey took first place in a time of 9:46.46. The win is the Razorbacks' 13th all-time in the event, and first since the 2004 event. Arkansas now has 69 Texas Relays titles in program history. During the weekend, the team also came away with second-place results in the 4x200, 4x800 and sprint-medley relays.

RECAP - Razorback Spring Invitational: No. 14 Arkansas opened its outdoor home schedule with three wins last weekend at the Razorback Spring Invitational. The team picked up two victories from its relays—Caleb Cross, Neil Braddy, LaShawn Butler and Marek Niit in the 4x100 and Braddy, Niit, Ben Skidmore and Chris Bilbrew in the 4x400. Individually, Noah Kitelson took the top spot in the high jump competition.

Runner of the Week: Marek Niit was named the SEC Runner of the Week following his efforts at the season-opening Arkansas-Texas-UCLA Triangular in Austin. Niit won the 100 meters and was part of the Razorbacks' 4x100-meter relay that finished second.

RECAP - Arkansas-Texas-UCLA Triangular: The 14th-ranked Razorbacks competed in a triangular meet along with No. 17 Texas and No. 23 UCLA in Austin to open the outdoor season. Wins came from Marek Niit in the 100 meters, Dorian Ulrey in the 800 meters, Duncan Phillips in the 3,000 meters and Tarik Batchelor in the long jump. The Razorbacks finished third in the team race with 106 points.

Niit to the Front: Running the first open 100 meters of his collegiate career, Marek Niit took top honors at the season-opening triangular in a time of 10.21, the then-No. 1 time in the NCAA.

Ulrey Wins in Return: In his first competition since winning the national indoor title at 3,000 meters in 2010, Dorian Ulrey ran to a victory in the 800 meters during Arkansas' tri-meet to open the season. He posted a time of 1:51.23, the then-top mark in the SEC.

Fernandez Debuts in 10K: Taking on the 10,000-meter distance in his first race of the season, Eric Fernandez earned a sixth-place finish in a time of 28:48.44 at the Stanford Invitational. His time is tops in the SEC and No. 6 in the nation.

The 2012 campaign for the University of Arkansas men's track and field team begins Jan. 6 with the Arkansas Invitational at the Randal Tyson Track Center in Fayetteville. The beginning of the season will mark the fourth for the Razorbacks under the direction of head coach Chris Bucknam. As has been the case for the past two seasons, he is joined by assistant coaches Doug Case and Travis Geopfert.

Within its 2012 roster, Arkansas features 12 returning All-Americans from a season ago, including its entire 4x400-meter relay team of Neil Braddy, Marek Niit, Ben Skidmore and Travis Southard. The group represents the third-fastest foursome in program history. Niit, the 2011 SEC champion and national runner-up at 200 meters, leads the returning group of Razorbacks with five All-America honors last season while Braddy was a four-time honoree during his first season in Cardinal and White.

Moving up to its middle- and long-distance crews, Arkansas will benefit from the returning All-America efforts of Chuol Dey, Rick Elliott and Duncan Phillips. The Razorbacks' roster also features 2011SEC cross country individual champion Eric

Fernandez and 2010 cross country All-American Solomon Haile who redshirted last outdoor season.

In the field, Tarik Batchelor posted two top-eight national finishes in the long jump last season to go along with the emergence of Raymond Higgs, an outdoor All-American in 2011. Brede Ellingsen was Arkansas' top performer in the high jump with a trip to the NCAA Outdoor Championships last season. Two-time All-America selection Kevin Lazas, the school-record holder in both the heptathlon and decathlon, will lead a strong group of multi-event competitors.

Joining that cast of experience, the Razorbacks have added a recruiting class that was ranked the fourth best in the country by Track & Field News. Arkansas' incoming freshman class includes Alex Chaffin (middle distance), Kyle Dunn (hurdles), Andrew Irwin (pole vault), Gunnar Nixon (multi events), Devin Randall (throws), Patrick Rono (middle distance) and Ryan Thomas (middle distance).

The incoming class of Razorbacks includes the No. 1-ranked prep decathlete in 2010 (Nixon), top-ranked pole vaulter (Irwin) and second-ranked 400-meter hurdler (Dunn). In June, Nixon was named the 2010-11 Gatorade National Boys Track and Field Athlete of the Year.

Arkansas hosts eight meets—five indoor and three outdoor—as part of its 2012 schedule. All home indoor events will be held at the Randal Tyson Track Center while outdoor events in Fayetteville will be contested at John McDonnell Field. The Razorbacks' indoor home slate includes the Arkansas Invitational (Jan. 6), Arkansas-Texas Dual (Jan. 13), Razorback Invitational (Jan. 27-28), Tyson Invitational (Feb. 10-11) and Arkansas Last Chance (March 2).



The indoor championship season begins Feb. 24-26 with the 2012 SEC Championships in Lexington, Ky. The 2012 NCAA Indoor Championships will be held March 9-10 in Boise, Idaho.

The team's outdoor home schedule features the Arkansas Spring Invitational (March 31), John McDonnell Invitational (April 20-21) and Arkansas Twilight (May 4). The Razorbacks will head to Baton Rouge, La., for the 2012 SEC Outdoor Championships in defense of their 2011 outdoor conference crown. The SEC meet will be held May 11-13. Arkansas will then compete May 24-26 at the NCAA West Preliminary in Austin. After the qualifying meet, Arkansas will wrap its season June 6-9 at the 2012 NCAA Outdoor Championships in Des Moines, Iowa.

Following the collegiate season, several Razorbacks will continue competition into the summer months. The USA Junior Championships will be contested June 15-17 in Bloomington, Ind., while the USA Championships, also doubling as the 2012 Olympic Trials, will be held June 22-July 1 in Eugene, Ore. The track and field competition at the 2012 Olympic Games in London will be held Aug. 3-12.

Three of his season-best marks came at the Razorback Invitational where he finished with a season-high total of 5,042 points. At the SEC Championships, he earned all-freshman honors with a fifth-place showing in the seven-event competition. He finished with 5,020 points, setting seasons bests in the 60 meters, 1,000 meters, 60-meter hurdles and shot put. Outdoor: Outside of his multi-event duties, Kirbos set a personal-best throw of 102-3 in the discus at the Arkansas Twilight. At the Arkansas-Texas dual, he was fourth in the 100 meters and fifth in the shot put, discus and javelin. At Texas Relays, he finished 18th in the decathlon with 6,123 points. He set personal bests in the pole vault (15-1) and javelin (132-3) during the two-day competition. At the SEC Championships, Kirbos finished 11th in the decathlon with a season-best 6,364 points behind seven personal-best marks. He posted new marks in 100 meters (11.06), 400 meters (53.19), 1,500 meters (5:05.88), 110-meter hurdles (15.52), high jump (5-9.25), long jump (22-6.5) and shot put (39-0.5).

2009: Kirbos redshirted the season.

2011: Laird redshirted the season but was named to the SEC Spring Academic Honor Roll for his efforts in the classroom.

Lazas re-established his own school mark with a second-place performance at the SEC Championships and his total of 5,764 points. He set three personal bests during the conference meet with a 7.11 in the 60 meters, 2:47.71 at 1,000 meters and a clearance of 6-6.75 in the high jump. With his effort at the SEC Championships, Lazas also set the American junior record for the heptathlon, replacing the previous mark of 5,478 set in 2007 by Mark Morrison. Lazas earned a bid into the NCAA Championships where he earned Second-Team All-America accolades with a 14th-place finish in the heptathlon. He scored 5,596 points at the national meet and set personal bests in the 60-meter hurdles (8.59) and shot put (43-7). Outdoor: In his first collegiate decathlon, Lazas set the school record with 7,542 points over two rainy days at the John McDonnell Invitational. During the competition, he set a personal best of 44-1.5 in the shot put. On the heels of his performance, Lazas was selected as the SEC Freshman of the Week. At the SEC Championships, he earned his second SEC All-Freshman and All-SEC Second Team recognition of the year with a runner-up effort in the decathlon. Lazas scored 7,703 points at the conference meet with the help of personal bests of 16-8.75 in the pole vault and 136-3 in the discus. For the third consecutive competition, he upped his own school record with 7,802 points and a 10th-place finish in the decathlon at the NCAA Championships. In addition to the school record, Lazas also improved upon his own American junior record which he originally set at the SEC Championships. Lazas' hard work carried over into the classroom where he was named to the SEC First-Year Academic Honor Roll and USTFCCCA All-Academic Team.

AT BRENTWOOD HS: Kevin Lazas was a member of Brentwood High School's two-time state champion team and the 2009 state runner-up team. Lazas holds personal bests of 7,510 in the decathlon, 3,758 in the pentathlon, 23-2.5 in the long jump, 15-0 in the pole vault and 183-8 in the javelin. His decathlon best of 7,213 from 2009 was No. 1 in the nation. He holds the No. 2 point total in the nation in 2010 with his mark of 7,510. He finished second in the 200 meters and helped the 4x400-meter relay to a first-place finish at the Arkansas-Texas Dual. Niit returned to the track at the Razorback Invitational with a runner-up effort in the 400 meters at 46.76, a fourth-place result at 200 meters with a time of 21.05 and a bronze finish as part of the 4x400-meter relay which crossed in 3:09.16. At the New Balance Collegiate, he continued his relays duties and ran the lead-off leg for Arkansas' mile relay that clocked in at 3:09.08, good for a runner-up spot. Niit turned in a pair of seventh-place finishes in the 200 meters (21.02) and 400 meters (46.67) and a third-place finish with the 4x400-meter relay (3:08.68) at the Tyson Invitational. At the SEC Championships, Niit ran the second leg for Arkansas' victorious 4x400-meter relay that clocked an NCAA automatic-qualifying time of 3:05.13. For his role in the relay win, he earned First-Team All-SEC honors. He was also responsible for a sixth-place finish at 200 meters and seventh-place result at 400 meters during the conference meet. During the preliminary round of his individual events, Niit collected personal bests in the 200 meters at 20.70 and 400 meters at 45.99. At the NCAA Championships, Niit earned two All-America selections by way of a third-place finish with the 4x400-meter relay (3:06.79) and ninth-place qualifying effort in the 200 meters (21.08). Outdoor: At the first meet of the outdoor season, Niit posted a victory in the 100 meters and helped the 4x100-meter relay to a time of 39.91, good for second place. For his efforts in Texas, he earned his first of two SEC Runner of the Week accolades. At Texas Relays, Niit was a member of three relays during the weekend including two runner-up finishes with the 4x200-meter relay (1:23.52) and sprint-medley relay (3:16.83). He continued his relay duties at Penn Relays where he helped Arkansas to a second-place finish in the distance-medley relay, fifth-place result in the 4x200-meter relay and sixth-place showing in the 4x400-meter

relay. At the Arkansas Twilight, Niit posted victories at 200 meters in a then-personal best 20.46 and with the 4x100-meter relay in 39.47. He was once again recognized by the SEC on the heels of his work at the Twilight. At the SEC Championships, Niit ran to the 200-meter title to tally first-place points toward the Razorbacks' team total. The win, which earned him First-Team All-SEC honors, was Arkansas' first in the event since the 1995 season. During the conference weekend, he also finished fifth in the 100 meters and was part of the runner-up 4x100-meter team. Niit went on to compete at the NCAA West Preliminary in the 200 meters and with the 4x100- and 4x400-meter relays. He qualified for the national meet in all three events. At the NCAA Championships earned three All-America honors including a pair of first-team selections for his runner-up finish at 200 meters in a personal-best 20.38 and fifth-place performance with the 4x400-meter relay which clocked a season-best 3:03.59. Following the collegiate season, Niit went on to the World Championships to represent his native Estonia. He finished 32nd in the qualifying heats of the 100 meters and 29th in the opening rounds of the 200 meters.

2010: Niit redshirted during the indoor and outdoor seasons.

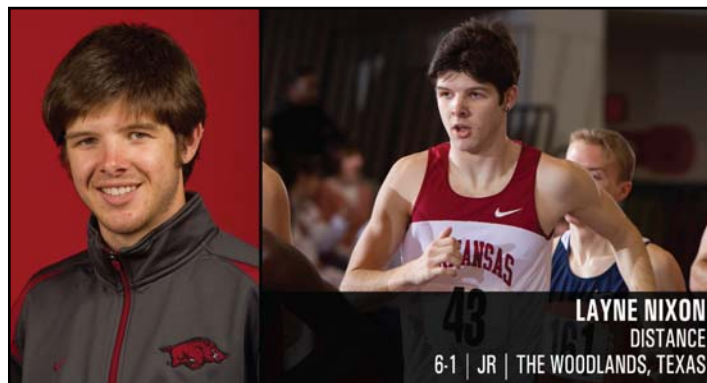

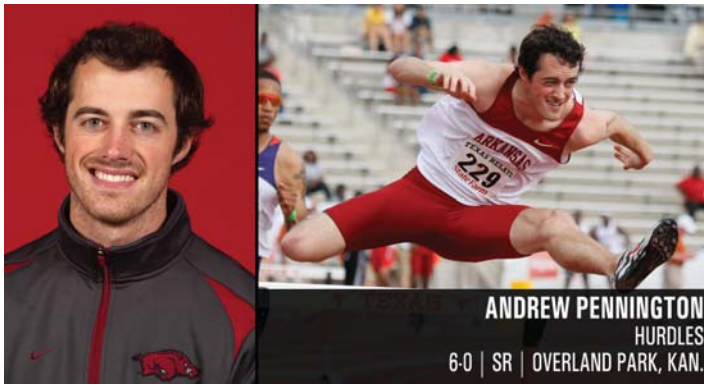

At Texas Relays, he was part of Arkansas' second-place 4x800 relay that clocked a time of 7:20.20. Pennington won the 400-meter hurdles at the Arkansas Twilight with a personal-best time of 52.20. He also posted a season-best effort in the 110-meter hurdles (14.40) at the Twilight. At the SEC Championships, Pennington finished in seventh place of the finals of the 400-meter hurdles with a time of 52.64. He closed out his season at the NCAA West Preliminary with a 39th-place finish and a time of 53.61 during the qualifying round of the 400-meter hurdles. Pennington was recognized for his work in the classroom with a spot on the SEC Spring Academic Honor Roll and USTFCCA All-Academic Team.

2010: Indoor: Pennington opened the season at the Arkansas Invitational where he finished fourth in the 60-meter hurdles (8.33) and fourth with the 4x400-meter relay team (3:20.50). At the Arkansas-Texas dual meet, he ran a personal-best 8.24 to earn a third-place result in the 60-meter hurdles. At the same event, he also ran the lead-off leg for the 4x400 relay which finished in a time of 3:17.63. In the finals of the 60-meter hurdles at the Razorback Invitational and Arkansas Last Chance meet, he came away with fourth- and fifth-place finishes. At the SEC Championships, Pennington ran the 400-meter leg of Arkansas' distance-medley relay team that took home the conference title with a collective time of 9:48.92. It was the first SEC title and all-conference honor for Pennington. Outdoor: In the first event of the outdoor season, he was fifth in the 110-meter hurdles (14.73) and sixth in the 400-meter hurdles (55.25) at the Razorback Spring Invitational. At the McDonnell Invitational, he posted a pair of sixth-place finishes in the hurdle events, including a personal-best clocking of 14.36 in the 110-meter hurdles. Pennington raced to runner-up finishes at the Arkansas-Texas dual meet with time of 14.50 and 53.30. At the SEC Championships, he qualified for the finals of the 110-meter hurdles with a sixth-place finish in the prelims. Despite a miscue at the first hurdle, Pennington scored for the team with a seventh-place finish in the finals. In the 400-meter hurdles, he ran a personal-best 53.28 but missed advancing to the finals by one spot. He closed out his season at the NCAA West Prelims where he finished 36th in the preliminary rounds of the 110-meter hurdles.

2009: Indoor: Pennington clocked a prelim time of 8.37 and a final time of 8.41 to finish sixth in the 60-meter hurdles at the Arkansas Invitational. At the Razorback Invitational, he clocked a 60-meter hurdles time of 8.47 and ran the 400-meter leg of the distance medley relay that finished second with a time of 9:59.75. He was four-time USATF Junior Olympic qualifier.

2011: Indoor: Phillips opened the season with a runner-up finish in the 600 meters at the Arkansas Invitational. He picked up victories in the 1,000 meters (2:22.30) and distance-medley relay (10:03.37) at the Arkansas-Texas Dual. At the Razorback Invitational, Phillips ran the anchor leg of the DMR that clocked a collective time of 9:30.85, an NCAA automatic-qualifying performance. In his only 800-meter race of the indoor season, he ran to a win in 1:48.47 at the New Balance Collegiate Invitational. The following weekend, he posted an NCAA auto time with a personal-best 3:58.82 in the mile at the UW Husky Open. Phillips earned Second-Team All-SEC honors with his runner-up performance in the mile at the SEC Championships. He also helped Arkansas to a third-place finish in the distance-medley relay. At the NCAA Championships, Phillips picked up Second-Team All-America ac-

colades with a 10th-place effort in the mile and 11th-place outing with the distance-medley relay. Outdoor: Phillips won at 3,000 meters during the Texas Triangular to begin his outdoor campaign. At the Texas Relays, he was part of two second-place teams with the 4x800-meter (7:20.20) and sprint-medley relays (3:16.83). Phillips ran to a lifetime best 3:39.87 and a fourth-place finish at 1,500 meters during the Mt. SAC Relays. His performance marked a near-five second improvement over his previous best. At Penn Relays, Phillips was part of three top-four relay marks including second-place finishes with the 4xMile and distance-medley relays while the 4x800-meter relay crossed in fourth place. To begin the championship season, Phillips collected runner-up finishes in the 800 meters (1:50.61) and 1,500 meters (3:49.09) to add 16 points to Arkansas' SEC-title team total. His performance at the conference meet earned him Second-Team All-SEC honors. He went on to compete at the NCAA West Preliminary where he finished seventh in 3:44.84 at 1,500 meters to earn a berth into the national meet. At the NCAA Championships, Phillips closed out the year with a 17th-place finish in the semifinal round of the 1,500 meters. In addition to his credentials on the track, he was recognized for his work in classroom with selections to the SEC Spring Academic Honor Roll and USTFCCA All-Academic Team.

2010: Indoor: Phillips redshirted during the indoor season. Outdoor: He returned to the track with a 10th-place showing in the 1,500 meters at the Stanford Invitational. At Texas Relays, he ran second leg for the second-place 4x800-meter relay team that finished the race in a time of 7:30.49. He was eighth at the Arkansas-Texas dual meet in the 1,500 meters. At the SEC Championships, he advanced with an eighth-place finish in the prelims. In the finals, Phillips crossed in sixth place in a time of 3:52.32 to score points for the team.

2009: Indoor: Phillips anchored the distance medley relay to a win and an NCAA provisional-qualifying time of 9:44.66 at the Razorback Invitational. Earning an at-large bid to the NCAA Championships in the mile, he also ran the lead leg of the DMR. Running three races in two days, he clocked a mile prelim time of 4:02.84 and a final time of 4:08.73 to finish 11th. The DMR earned a runner-up finish with a time of 9:30.31. The clocking ranks No. 7 on Arkansas' all-time list. He earned All-America honors in both events. Outdoor: He redshirted the season.

2008: Indoor: Phillips had a stellar showing at the New Balance Collegiate Invitational where he finished fifth in the 800 meters with a 1:50.65 and ran the lead leg of the DMR, with a 2:56.4 split, that clocked a provisional-qualifying time of 9:40.64 to finish second. At the Tyson Invitational, he ran the lead leg of the DMR that finished third with a provisional-qualifying time of 9:39.63. He competed in the mile at the SEC Championships and finished eighth with a time of 4:09.62. Outdoor: Phillips clocked a regional-qualifying time of 3:44.59 in the 1,500 meters at the John McDonnell Invitational. He clocked an 800-meter regional-qualifying time of 1:49.65 at the Arkansas Twilight. 2011: Indoor: Prentice completed his first of two heptathlons at the Razorback Invitational. He finished in fourth place and posted a personal-best 5,484 points. During the seven-event competition, he reached personal bests in the long jump with a mark of 24-2.25 and high jump with a 6-6.25 clearance. At the SEC Championships, Prentice posted another fourth-place finish with 5,462 in the heptathlon. He matched his personal best in the long jump which he set earlier in the season and established a lifetime best in the pole vault with a clearance of 14-9. At the New Balance Collegiate Invitational, Prentice posted a personal-best 51.66 in the open 400 meters. Outdoor: Prentice posted one decathlon score during the outdoor season. At the SEC Championships, he notched a personal-best 7,199 points to earn a fifth-place conference finish. It represented the first time Prentice eclipsed the 7,000-point mark in his career. During the 10-event competition, he tallied personal bests of 14.62 in the 110-meter hurdles and a 6-9 clearance in the high jump. In non-multi event competition, Prentice worked to establish personal bests in the javelin (151-9) and pole vault (14-9.5) at the Arkansas Twilight.

2010: Indoor: Prentice began the indoor season by competing in the 60-meter hurdles, 4x400 relay, pole vault and shot put at the Arkansas Invitational. At the Arkansas-Texas dual meet, he finished fourth in the 60-meter hurdles (8.36), fifth in the long jump (23-3.5) and sixth in the shot put (37-10.75). He established personal-best marks in eight of the 10 events including the high jump, long jump and discus where he finished second in each event among decathlon competitors. He closed out his season at the NCAA West Prelims with a 29th-place finish in the long jump.

At the Texas A&M Challenge, he ran the second leg of the distance-medley relay that finished third in a time of 9:33.12, a provisional qualifying time for the quartet. At the SEC Championships, Skidmore finished ninth in the 400 meters, one spot out of scoring for the team, but he came back with the 4x400-meter relay team to post points with a seventh-place finish in a time of 3:11.51. The distance-medley relay team had another provisional qualifier at the Arkansas Last Chance meet and, at the NCAA Championships, Skidmore collected his second All-America accolade as the DMR ran to a runner-up showing in a time of 9:37.53. Outdoor: At the Arkansas-Texas dual in Austin, he was fifth in the 400 meters (49.75) and helped the 4x400 relay team to a second-place finish (3:10.96). He equaled the mark the following weekend at the Arkansas-Texas Dual, good for seventh place. Outdoor: Sparks began his outdoor campaign with a clearance of 14-11 at the Texas Triangular. He posted his first 15-foot mark (15-1) of the season at the Razorback Spring Invitational. He closed out the year with a season-best 15-3.5 clearance at the Arkansas Twilight. Sparks was also recognized for his work in the classroom with a selection to the SEC Spring Academic Honor Roll.

2010: Indoor: Sparks' lone appearance of the indoor season came at the Arkansas-Texas dual meet where he finished seventh in the pole vault with a clearance of 14-1.25. Outdoor: He made his outdoor debut with a 10th-place finish (14-7.25) at the Razorback Spring Invitational. Leading up to the conference meet, he was eighth at the McDonnell Invitational, fourth at the Arkansas-Texas dual and third at the Missouri Southern Invitational. At the SEC Championships, Sparks equaled his season-best clearance of 15-11 to secure a fifth-place finish.

AT OKLAHOMA: Sparks attended the University of Oklahoma for two years. He competed during the 2008 indoor season, redshirted the 2008 outdoor season and did not compete at all in 2009 because OU dropped their pole vaulting program. AT JENKS HS: Sparks finished second in pole vault at the 2007 Oklahoma 6A state finals. He was the state champion in pole vault at the 2005 New Mexico 3A state meet. He also placed in three different events at the 2004 New Mexico 3A State Championships: third in the pole vault, fourth in the 110-meter hurdles and fifth in the 300-meter hurdles. He also won the pole vault title at the 2007 Kansas Relays and finished third in the pole vault at the 2007 Great Southwest meet.

PERSONAL: Born July 26, 1988, he is the son of Sheldon and Christy Sparks. His father, Sheldon, played football at the University of Tulsa. He is enrolled in the Sam M. Walton College of Business and also holds an Associate's degree in education from Tulsa Community College.

He also won three events at the NJIC League Championships. During one stretch of his senior season, Rono won 16 consecutive finals. He owns a 5K personal best of 15:14, run in 2010 at the Bergen County Championships. He also found success at the national level with a 24th-place finish at the Foot Locker National Meet in December 2010. He qualified for the national meet by finishing seventh at the Northeast Regional. At the 2009 Nike Outdoor Nationals, Rono finished fifth and sixth in the 3,000 meters and two-mile run, respectively.

AT MARCUS HS: In his senior season at Marcus High School, Thomas a member of the All-State First Team and finished in fourth place in the 800 meters at the state meet. He was the District 6-5A champion at 800 meters and had a runner-up performance in the event at the regional meet. In cross country, he helped Marcus to a first-place team effort at the Nike Regional and a 10th-place showing at the Nike National meet. Thomas left Marcus as the school-record holder in the 800 meters. He owns personal bests of 48.6 at 400 meters, 1:53.56 at 800 meters, 4:19 in the 1,600 meters and 15:52 over 5,000 meters. He was a member of the Lake Cities Track Club in Lewisville, Texas. Thomas also played basketball during his first two years of high school.

PERSONAL: Born April 3, 1993, he is the son of Jeff and Juwana Thomas and has a younger sister, Maya. Thomas plans to pursue a degree in mechanical engineering during his career at Arkansas.

Now in his fourth season at the helm of the Razorback program, head coach Chris Bucknam has guided Arkansas to six SEC titles.





Head coach Chris Bucknam begins his fourth season at the helm of Arkansas Razorback men's cross country and track and field. Following 25 seasons at Northern Iowa, Bucknam was named Arkansas' head coach on June 27, 2008.

Most recently, during the 2011 cross country season, Bucknam led the Razorbacks to their second Southeastern Conference Championship under this watch. The conference victory ran his total to six SEC titles with the Arkansas with two each in cross country, indoor track and field and outdoor track and field. When league year-end honors were released, he was named the SEC Men's Coach of the Year for the second straight season.

For the second time in three years, Bucknam and the Razorbacks won two of the three SEC Championships with the team's efforts in 2010-11. Arkansas began the championship season with a victory at the 2010 SEC Cross Country Championships, the first such league title for the Razorbacks under Bucknam. The team went on to win its second SEC title of the year with top honors at the 2011 SEC Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

On the national level, the Razorbacks finished 10th at the NCAA Cross Country Championships, their highest finish under Bucknam's watch, and earned two All-America selections with Dorian Ulrey and Solomon Haile. Arkansas picked up another top-10 national finish with its team performance at the 2011 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

Overall, the Razorbacks finished the 2010-11 season with 35 All-America honors—two in cross country, 18 during the indoor season and 15 during the outdoor season. Bucknam earned his fourth and fifth SEC Men's Coach of the Year honors following Arkansas' triumphs at the league's cross country and outdoor meets. He was also tabbed the



2010 South Central Region Men's Coach of the Year.

Propelled by five event titles, including two from Ulrey, and two runner-up finishes, the Razorbacks won the team title at the 2010 SEC Indoor Championships. Ulrey took wins in the mile, 3,000 meters and as the anchor of the distance medley relay, Scott MacPherson won the 5,000 meters and Alain Bailey won the long jump.

Ulrey was named the 2010 SEC Indoor Runner of the Year and Bucknam was named the 2010 SEC Indoor Coach of the Year, both for the second-straight season. Ulrey, the 2010 NCAA Indoor South Central Region Runner of the Year, and Bucknam, the 2010 NCAA Indoor South Central Region Coach of the Year, were also honored for the second-straight season.

Ulrey's outstanding season started with a sixth-place finish and All-America honors at the 2009 NCAA Cross Country Championships. Ulrey was the 2009 SEC Cross Country runner-up and won the title at the 2009 NCAA South Central Region Championships. Ulrey was also named the 2009 NCAA South Central Runner of the Year for his cross country efforts.

The Razorbacks won the 2009 NCAA South Central Region Cross Country Team title and posted a runner-up finish at the 2009 SEC Cross Country Championships. The 2009-10 season saw the Razorbacks earn 23 All-SEC honors. Additionally, Solomon Haile was named the 2009 SEC Freshman of the Year in cross country and Lane Boyer was named CoSIDA ESPN the Magazine Academic All-District.

The 2008-09 season was another successful one for the Razorbacks as the squad captured both the Southeastern Conference Indoor and Outdoor team titles. Bucknam was named the 2009 SEC Indoor and Outdoor Coach of the Year and the 2009 NCAA South Central Indoor and Outdoor Regional Coach of the Year. In his first season as head coach, Arkansas student-athletes won 10 SEC individual titles and earned 16 All-America honors.

Since joining the SEC in 1992, the Razorbacks have the only two coaches—Bucknam and John McDonnell—to earn top coaching honors during their respective first seasons in the league. Bucknam also joins McDonnell as the only head coach, since 1992, to sweep the SEC Indoor and Outdoor Coach of the Year honors in the same season.

At the 2009 SEC Outdoor Championships, Arkansas student-athletes picked up six individual titles: Bailey (high jump and long jump), Shawn Forrest (5,000 meters), MacPherson (3,000-meter steeplechase), Alex McClary (800 meters) and Ulrey (1,500 meters). The Razorbacks added to their winning point total with two runner-up finishes from seniors Nkosinza Balumbu (triple jump) and Andy McClary (1,500 meters). The Razorbacks topped Florida's 129 points with a score of 141 points.

At the 2009 SEC Indoor Championships, the Razorbacks won four individual and relay events (800 meters, mile, 3,000 meters, distance medley relay) and earned seven runner-up finishes (60 meters, 200 meters, mile, 3,000 meters, 5,000 meters, long jump and triple jump). Arkansas scored 130 points to Florida's 102.

Outdoors, Bailey was named the SEC Field Athlete of the Year and Tarik Batchelor was named the SEC Freshman Field Athlete of the Year.

At the 2008 SEC Cross Country Championships, four Razorbacks earned All-SEC honors including two named to the SEC All-Freshman Team. MacPherson went on to earn All-America honors with a 32nd-place finish at the NCAA Championships.

Arkansas earned a runner-up finish and an automatic bid to the NCAA Championships at the NCAA South Central Region Championships. MacPherson was the top finisher in bronze place and six members of the squad earned all-region honors.

Ulrey had a stellar first season with the Razorbacks as he earned four All-America honors (1,500 meters, mile, 3,000 meters, distance medley relay) and won three SEC individual titles (1,500 meters, mile, 3,000 meters). Under Bucknam's guidance, he anchored the distance medley relay to a school-record time of 9:28.35 with his 3:54 1,600-meter anchor.

At the 2009 USA Championships, Ulrey picked up a bronze finish in the 1,500-meter finals to earn a spot on Team USA for the 2009 IAAF World Championships in Berlin, Germany. Ulrey picked up the "A" standard in Rome with his clocking of 3:35.23, the second-fastest time in school history. In Berlin, representing Team USA, Ulrey advanced to the semifinals of the 1,500 meters. He clocked a qualifying time of 3:38.86 and a semifinal time of 3:39.33.

Ulrey earned ESPN the Magazine Academic All-District and All-America honors with his 3.50 GPA as a sociology major. He was named



the SEC Indoor Runner of the Year, the SEC's Scholar-Athlete of the Year and was the recipient of the SEC Sportsmanship Award.

In the classroom, 12 men's track and field student-athletes earned selection to the 2009 SEC Spring Academic Honor Roll. Additionally, seven members of the squad were named to the 2009 SEC Freshmen Academic Honor Roll. Earning spots on the 2009 USTFCCA Men's All-Academy Track and Field Team were Lane Boyer, Luke Laird, Alex McClary, Daniel Quinn, James Strang and Ulrey.

Bucknam guided his UNI teams to 35 league titles, two top-10 and six top-20 finishes at NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Championships. A 33-time conference coach of the year, Bucknam produced three national champions and an outstanding 34 All-Americans, who earned a total of 85 All-America awards. That includes seven athletes who earned top-three finishes in NCAA championships competition, three of which came in 2008. In all, Bucknam has sent 146 qualifiers to the NCAA indoor and outdoor championships.

He was Northern Iowa's head men's track and field coach from 1984-2008 and the women's head coach from 1997-2008 after beginning his career as a men's assistant at UNI in 1979. UNI earned 69 All-America honors from 2000-08, including 51 total from 2005-2008. UNI's 47 men's All-Americans from 2005-08 ranked as the 10th-most in the nation over that time.

UNI dominated the action at the conference level in Bucknam's era. During his time as an assistant and head coach, UNI won or shared 38 conference titles (Mid-Continent and Missouri Valley). UNI won nine-straight MVC men's indoor titles (2000-2008). Bucknam also guided the Panthers to 25 MVC team titles and 231 MVC individual crowns.

Bucknam wrapped up his 25th season with the Panthers and tallied an all-time best outdoor showing for the program as UNI notched an 11th-place finish (22 team points) at the 2008 NCAA Outdoor Championships in Des Moines, Iowa. The Panthers put on quite a show for the home state as they crowned nine All-Americans who earned a total of 11 All-America certificates in seven events. UNI also posted back-to-back ninth-place finishes at the 2007 and 2008 NCAA Indoor Championships.

In the men's NCAA Outdoor Championships, his team's high finishes were 11th in 2008, 17th in 1997, 39th in 2001, 42nd in 1999, 52nd in 2006 and 54th in 2005. In the men's NCAA Indoor Championships, his teams had high finishes of ninth in 2008 and 2007, 12th in 2002, 18th in 2006, 20th in 2001, 28th in 2005 and 44th in 1996.

Bucknam's men's teams won 11 Missouri Valley Conference indoor titles, six MVC outdoor titles and four cross country championships. His women's teams won two indoor titles, an outdoor title and a cross country title. His men's teams had a current streak of nine-straight conference indoor titles (2000-08) and won three of the last four outdoor championships.

He also won 10 men's titles while UNI was a member of the Mid-Continent Conference, including five indoors, two outdoors and three in cross country.

After moving from the Mid-Continent to the Missouri Valley in 1992, Bucknam's men's teams won 21 league titles and finished second 13 times while producing 231 individual event champions.

A 24-time MVC Coach of the Year, he was named United States Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCA) Midwest Region Coach of the Year nine times, including five straight

(1995, 2000, 2001, 2002, 2004, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2008). His USTFCCA honors include an indoor award for his men's team and an outdoor honor for his women's team in 2008.

Before UNI moved to the Missouri Valley, he earned nine Mid-Continent coach of the year awards in seven seasons.

Under Bucknam's tutelage, Joey Woody was a three-time UNI All-American and 1997 national champion in the 400-meter hurdles. He placed second in the 400-meter hurdles at 2003 World Championships and was a member of the 1999 World Champion 4x400-meter relay team.

Former UNI pole vaulter Jacob Pauli, also a member of Bucknam's squads, took the 2001 NCAA Indoor title and earned All-America honors five times. Pauli continues to compete internationally, including a third-place finish at the 2007 USA Outdoor Championships and a 15th-place showing at the 2007 World Championships.

Cedar Falls, Iowa native Dirk Homewood became an MVC legend as a member of Bucknam's squads, as he earned nine Valley championships and three All-America honors from 2001 to 2005. Bucknam coached back-to-back MVC men's cross country champions in Mate Nemeth (2000) and Balazs Csillag (2001). Csillag also earned three MVC track championships and was a two-time track All-American in the distance medley relay and 3,000 meters.

A native of Beverley, Mass., Bucknam attended Norwich University in Northfield, Vt., where he was a cross country and track letterman. He was elected cross country co-captain his senior year and is a member of the Norwich Athletic Hall of Fame. He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1978. He earned his master's degree in physical education from Northern Iowa in 1982.

He and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of a son, Eric, and a daughter, Kate.





Doug Case is in his fourth season as an Arkansas assistant coach, charged with the Razorback sprinters, relay teams and pole vault. The 2011-12 season will be his 21st coaching at the collegiate level.

The Arkansas sprint crew garnered 20 All-America honors spread among seven student-athletes in 2011. Marek Niit led the way with five accolades, capping a season in which he emerged as an SEC and national sprint contender. During the outdoor season, Niit won the SEC title at 200 meters and finished second in the event at the NCAA Championships.

Case also oversaw the emergence of the Razorback relays. Arkansas won its first-ever SEC indoor title in the 4x400 relay with the foursome of Niit, Ben Skidmore, Chris Bilbrew and Neil Braddy. That same group finished third at the NCAA Indoor Championships for the program's highest finish in the event since 1987. At national outdoor meet, the Razorbacks' 4x400 relay finished fifth for Arkansas' first All-America status in the event since the 2000 season.

Case's work did not go unnoticed as he was named the U.S. Track and Field and Cross Country Coaches' Association (USTFCCCA) South Central Region Men's Assistant Coach of the Year.

The 2010 season saw Case's student-athletes qualify for the NCAA prelims in the 4x100 meter and 4x400-meter relay for the

first time since the 2005 season. LaShawn Butler also competed at the NCAA Outdoor Championships in the 200 meters.

Hurdler Caleb Cross was Case's biggest success story of 2010. The freshman from Newport, Ark., earned All-America honors in the 60-meter hurdles indoors and competed in the 4x100-meter and 4x400-meter relays, indoors and out. Cross' best indoor time of 7.78 ranks No. 2 in Arkansas school history. His best outdoor time of 13.90 ranks No. 10 in Arkansas school history.

During the summer months of 2010, Cross won the USA Junior title in the 110-meter hurdles with a time of 13.64. He earned a spot on Team USA at the World Junior Championships, in Moncton, New Brunswick, Canada. Cross successfully made it to the finals after clocking times of 13.56 in the prelims and 13.72 in the semifinals. In the finals, he finished fifth with a time of 13.86.

In his first season in Fayetteville, Case's student-athletes earned two All-America honors, an NCAA Mideast 800-meter title, seven Mideast All-Region honors, an SEC Indoor title and four All-SEC honors.

At the SEC Indoor Championships, J-Mee Samuels in the 60 meters and Marek Niit in the 200 meters earned runner-up finishes while Jake Stephens ran the 400-meter leg of the title-winning distance medley relay. Chris Bilbrew won the 800-meter title at the NCAA Mideast Regional Championships. Ben Skidmore ran the 400-meter leg of the distance medley relay that set a new school record and earned runner-up honors at the NCAA Championships.

In the Arkansas record books, Case's student-athletes clocked the No. 6 indoor 200-meter time (20.90), the No. 10 indoor 4x400-meter time (3:09.02), the No. 10 outdoor 200-meter time (20.78) and the No.5 outdoor 4x100-meter relay time (39.43).

As UNI's assistant coach, Case's sprinters and pole vaulters earned 43 All-America honors, including national championships in the 800 meters and the pole vault, and 68 NCAA Division I national meet qualifiers. UNI sprinters and vaulters dominated the Missouri Valley Conference over the last eight





records in the 200 meters and 400 meters, both indoors and outdoors

Prior to his return to UNI, Case spent three seasons as the men's head coach at Drake University. Under his guidance, Drake set three school records during the indoor season and its distance medley relay team placed ninth at the NCAA Championships.

Before coaching at Drake, Case served as an assistant coach at Arkansas State where, during his tenure, ASU's men's and women's programs won nine Sun Belt Conference titles. At ASU, Case was responsible for recruiting 52 outdoor and 49 indoor individual conference champions. His recruiting classes included 39 NCAA Division I national qualifiers, four All-Americans, seven Olympic Trials qualifiers and three Olympians.

A former UNI standout as a sprinter, Case established eight school records between 1982 and 1986 and was an all-conference performer in the Mid-Continent Conference. He was a member of the school record-setting outdoor 4x100-meter, 4x200-meter and 4x400-meter relay teams, as well as the indoor 4x400-meter relay. Individually, he twice placed second at the AMCU meet in the 100 meters.

A native of Marshalltown, Iowa, Case received his bachelor's degree from UNI in 1987 and then served as a graduate assistant with the Panthers in 1988 and 1989. He and his wife, Chris, have four children: Kelsey, Lauren, Cameron and Regan.



years, crowning 97 individual and relay conference champions. At the 2008 NCAA Indoor Championships, UNI's Tyler Mulder took the half-mile title with a time of 1:49.20.

When it comes to the pole vault, Case built UNI into a national leader in the event. He developed three of the greatest vaulters in MVC history in Jacob Pauli, Andre Poljanec and Jarno Kivioja, a trio that claimed 12 MVC championships and eight All-America honors from 1999 to 2007.

Both Pauli, who claimed the pole vault NCAA title at the 2001 NCAA Indoor Championships and Poljanec competed at the 2007 IAAF World Championships in Osaka, Japan. Pauli, who owns UNI's indoor and outdoor school records, also took third at the 2007 USA Outdoor Nationals.

Under Case's guidance, UNI vaulters claimed five of his last eight MVC titles, both indoors and outdoors. In 2007, the Panthers finished 1-2-3 and took four of the top five spots in the MVC indoor pole vault and then claimed four of the top six spots at the outdoor conference meet. Kivioja claimed his second straight Missouri Valley indoor title, while Poljanec took the outdoor crown for the third consecutive season.

Poljanec earned the third All-America honor of his career at the NCAA Indoor Championships and was the nation's No. 1-ranked vaulter outdoors heading into regional competition. Kivioja concluded his career with a berth in the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

In all, Case's sprinters set school records in 10 events since 2001, including the 7.81-second effort by Jarrel Anderson in the 60-meter hurdles in 2007. He also guided Dirk Homewood to a career that included four All-America honors and school



Travis Geopfert is in his third season as the Razorbacks' field events and multi-events assistant coach. He came to the University of Arkansas after a six-year stint at the University of Northern Iowa where he served in various coaching positions. Most recently, he served as head coach of the men's and women's cross country and track and field programs during the 2008-09 season.

Geopfert's work with Arkansas' multi-event crew was on full display during the 2011 track and field season with the emergence of freshman Kevin Lazas. During his first season in Fayetteville, Lazas was a two-time All-American in the heptathlon and decathlon and set school records in both events. He was also the runner-up at both the SEC Indoor and Outdoor Championships in the combined events.

On its way to the SEC outdoor team title, Arkansas picked up 14 points from Geopfert's long jump duo of Tarik Batchelor and Raymond Higgs and another 14 points from the decathlon with Lazas in second place, Terry Prentice in fifth and Matt Kirbos in seventh.

The success carried over into the summer season as Lazas went on to set the American junior record in the decathlon and win gold medals in the event at the 2011 USA Junior and Pan American Junior Championships. Long jumper Raymond Higgs, competing for his native Bahamas, won his nation's title and went on to compete at the 2011 IAAF World Championships in Daegu, South Korea.

In his first season with the Razorbacks, Geopfert coached long jumpers Alain Bailey and Batchelor to a 1-2 finish at the 2010 SEC Indoor Championships and first- and third-place finishes, respectively, at the 2010 NCAA Indoor Championships. Their best indoor marks of 26-9.75 and 26-6.5, respectively, ranked first and third in the NCAA and seventh and 11th in the world for the 2010 indoor season.

The success continued during the outdoor campaign with Bailey grabbing the SEC title with a personal-best and a then-world-leading jump of 27-4.75. Batchelor showed he is a dual threat with fourth-place finishes in both the SEC Indoor and Outdoor triple jump. He also earned NCAA bids in both indoor and outdoor campaigns.

In the combined events, Geopfert coached Prentice to a school-record mark of 5,350 points in the heptathlon. Kirbos scored valuable team points placing fifth at the 2010 SEC Indoor Championships with his personal best of 5,042 points, ranking him third in school history. In the decathlon, both Prentice and Kirbos posted career bests at the 2010 SEC Outdoor Championships.

High jumper Brede Raa Ellingsen finished fourth at the 2010 SEC Indoor Championships, runner-up at the 2010 SEC Outdoor Championships and fifth at the 2010 NCAA Indoor Championships. His indoor and outdoor bests of 7-2.5 and 7-2.25, respectively, rank him in the top 10 on Arkansas' all-time lists.

Also during the 2010 season, Geopfert mentored professional athlete Joe Detmer to become the 66th decathlete in American history to score over 8,000 points. Detmer finished third at the USA Championships with a career-best point total of 8,009 points.

In the past seven seasons, Geopfert has coached three Division I and II National Champions, 13 student-athletes to 26 All-America honors, three academic All-Americans, 54 conference champions, 89 all-conference performers, 43 NCAA qualifiers, 43 NCAA outdoor regional qualifiers and 16 USA Championships qualifiers.

He was selected as the decathlon coach for the 2009 USA vs. Germany Thorpe Cup by USA Track and Field. Geopfert, with Mario Sategna of the University of Texas' men's track and field staff, lead Team USA's decathletes to a victory over Team Germany. Members of Team USA included three-time Olympian Tom Pappas, 2004 Olympian Paul Terek and three-time Thorpe Cup qualifier Detmer. Geopfert, himself, is a three-time participant in the Thorpe Cup (2003, 2005, 2006).

As UNI's head coach in 2008-09, Geopfert led the Panthers to the Missouri Valley Conference Indoor and Outdoor team titles and was named the 2009 MVC Indoor and Outdoor Coach of the Year. During his time as head coach, Geopfert's student-athletes earned four All-America honors and captured 18 MVC event titles. In 2009, Geopfert coached eight NCAA and 15 regional qualifiers, in addition to five student-athletes who competed at the 2009 USA Championships.

The UNI men's team swept the 2009 MVC Outdoor awards with Geopfert winning MVC Coach of the Year, Cory Goos winning MVC Track Athlete of the Year, Mat Clark earning MVC Field Event Athlete of the Year and Terrance Reid named the MVC High Point Scorer. In 2008, Geopfert was named the U.S. Track and Field and Cross Country Coaches Association Midwest Region Men's Assistant Coach of the Year.





He coached five-time All-American Raven Cepeda to the No. 7 all-time NCAA heptathlon score. Cepeda was ranked 12th in the world in 2008. He currently holds the MVC and school records in both the heptathlon and decathlon. He was named the MVC Athlete of the Year four times during his career. Cepeda was also a two-time NCAA Midwest Region Field Event Athlete of the Year.

Under Geopfert's guidance, Cepeda became the first MVC student-athlete to win four indoor heptathlon titles. Additionally, Cepeda won three-straight MVC outdoor decathlon titles.

Geopfert also coached five-time All-American long jumper, UNI record holder, 2005 MVC Outdoor Field Event Athlete of the Year and 2006 USA Championships seventh-place finisher Cody Eichmeier.

At the 2006 NCAA Indoor Championships, under Geopfert's guidance, Eichmeier long jumped 25-10.5 to finish fourth, good for All-America honors. Additionally, Yuri Litvinski also picked up a fourth-place finish and All-America honors with a triple jump of 53-2.5.

At the 2008 NCAA Indoor Championships, UNI was the only school to qualify two athletes for each of the multi-event competitions. Cepeda and Mat Clark each earned All-America honors in the men's heptathlon, while Dani Stipe and Olimpia Nowak both competed in the women's pentathlon. Additionally, UNI also boasted two competitors in the men's high jump competition with Ehi Oamen finishing third.

At the 2008 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships, Geopfert coached three individuals to All-America honors. Cepeda and Clark each tallied All-America efforts in the

decathlon, while Oamen notched another All-America status in the high jump.

High jumpers Oamen and Julian Morris both qualified for 2008 NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Championships with Oamen finishing third and sixth, respectively.

Geopfert's student-athletes have also seen success in the throwing events. In 2008, Marcin Kazubowski was a national qualifier in javelin, throwing a UNI school record of 220-10. At the 2004 MVC Outdoor Championships, Derrick Benner took the hammer title with a UNI school-record and regional-qualifying toss of 202-6. Mike Miller was the 2004 MVC Champion and a regional qualifier in the discus with his throw of 181-7.

Additionally, Geopfert coached three of the 19 decathletes at the 2008 USA Olympic Trials in Cepeda, Clark and Detmer.

Prior to his return to UNI, Geopfert served as assistant track and field coach at Central Missouri. During the 2003 indoor season, Geopfert's athletes scored 25 points at the NCAA Championships, including NCAA titles in the high jump and triple jump.

During his time as a student-athlete at UNI, Geopfert was an All-American and a three-time MVC Champion. During his post-collegiate career, he was a two-time Drake Relays decathlon champion, a three-time member of the U.S. vs. Germany decathlon duel team and a six-time USA Championships decathlon qualifier.

Originally from Panora, Iowa, Geopfert earned his bachelor's degree from UNI in 2002. He and his wife, Nicole, reside in Fayetteville.

Joe Falcon - 1987

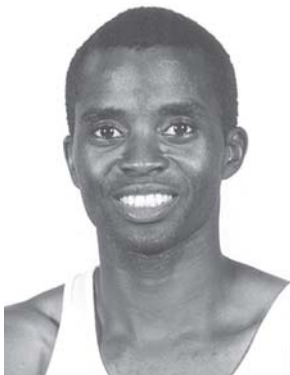


One of the most decorated distance runners in Arkansas history, Joe Falcon compiled seven NCAA titles, 15 SEC crowns and was named an All-American 11 times. He was the 3,000-meter champion in 1987 and 1988, indoor mile champ in 1988, outdoor 10,000-meter champion in 1987, outdoor 1,500-meter champion in 1988 and NCAA cross country champion in 1987.

His NCAA win in 1987 propelled Arkansas to its third NCAA Cross Country team title. Falcon and the squad recorded a team score of 87 to edge out Dartmouth (119 points).

Falcon was ranked among the top distance runners in the world throughout his career by Track and Field News, including a No. 1 ranking at 5,000 meters in 1989 and 1,500 meters in 1990. He was the champion of the annual Oslo Dream Mile in 1990 in Oslo, Norway with a time of 3:49.31, a race that saw his fastest 1,500-meter split: 3:33.6.

Godfrey Siamusiye - 1995, 1996



A two-time Olympian for his native Zambia, Godfrey Siamusiye competed at 5,000 meters in the 1992 Barcelona Games and in the 3,000 meter steeplechase at the 1996 games in Atlanta. He finished 10th in his semifinal heat of the steeplechase with a time of 8:37.41. At Arkansas he was a two-time NCAA Champion in cross country (1995-96), and a back-to-back champion in the outdoor 10,000 meters (1995-96).

Siamusiye's race win in 1995 led Arkansas to its eighth NCAA Cross Country team title. The '95 squad scored 100 points to beat Northern Arizona's 142 points. Arkansas earned an NCAA runner-up finish in the team race behind Siamusiye's win in 1996.

His individual exploits translated into team success for Arkansas. He was a member of four NCAA-title teams as the Razorbacks pulled off the national triple crown in 1995 and captured the 1996 outdoor crown. Siamusiye also helped Arkansas to five SEC team titles, the league triple crown in 1995 in addition to the 1996 cross country and outdoor team honors.

The Razorbacks' home indoor track was resurfaced prior to the start of the 2011 track and field season.

In 2000, the Randal Tyson Track Center first opened on the University of Arkansas campus with the specially designed track, originally built by Mondo for the World Championships in Toronto, Canada. Since opening, the Razorbacks' home facility has played host to several world-class indoor meets, including six SEC Championships—most recently, the 2011 indoor conference meet—and 10 NCAA Championships.

Widely considered as the fastest indoor surface ever constructed, the Tyson track has been home to numerous world records, American records and an impressive 65 percent of all current NCAA Championship meet records. Arkansas will increase its number of national hosting duties to 11 with the 2013 NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships which will be held March 8-9, 2013, in Fayetteville.

In its first year of operation, the \$8 million facility hosted the Tyson Invitational, a meet on the Golden Spike Tour, the 2000 Southeastern Conference Championships and the 2000 NCAA Indoor Championships. In 2001 and 2002, the Randal Tyson Track Center once again served as the host for the Golden Spike Tour's Tyson Invitational and the NCAA Indoor Championships.

During the 2003 season, three events were held at the state-of-the-art facility: the SEC West Challenge, the Tyson Invitational and the NCAA Championships. The 2004 campaign saw four exciting events take place at the Randal Tyson Track Center, including the Arkansas, Razorback and Tyson Invitational meets and the national championships.

The schedule was full in 2005 as the Arkansas, Razorback and Tyson Invitationals and the SEC and NCAA Championships were all held at the Tyson Track Center.

A new 36x20 custom video scoreboard system by Daktronics was installed in time for the 2005 NCAA Championships. It features a 23x13 video display screen with instant replay, electronic timing and scoring capabilities.

The track itself is a 200-meter, 60-degree banked track that has 55-meter straightways running the entire length of the facility. It also includes men's and women's jumping runways and pits. The surface of the track is red and gray Mondo and was repainted in 2003.

With all of the big name events that are held in the facility, the Tyson Track Center was built to handle the demands for the many media outlets. The press box is two-tiered offering 50 seats and has an announcer's booth. There are four elevated camera positions located around the track. A media room is also available in the north concourse.

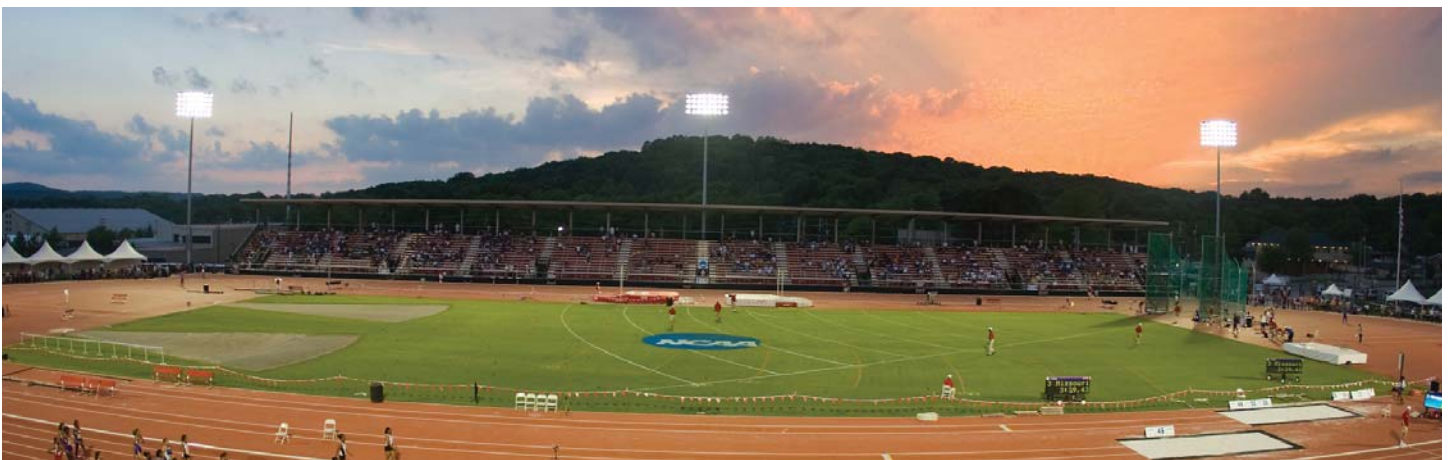
Serving as the outdoor home to the most successful program in NCAA history, John McDonnell Field is one of the top outdoor track and field facilities in the nation. Named for legendary head coach John McDonnell, the winner of 40 NCAA national championships during his career at Arkansas, the facility is one of only two IAAF Class 1 certified track and field complexes in the U.S. and the first such facility on a collegiate campus.

The state-of-the-art competition areas include a nine-lane Mondo track, a grass infield as well as a full hammer cage and multiple throw areas. The pole vault and jumping pits are reversible and contain two sets of runways to accommodate multiple events. Capacity is currently set at 7,000 with the potential to hold 10,000 with additional construction.

John McDonnell Field played host to the 2006 Southeastern Conference Championships, the 2008 NCAA Midwest Regional Championships, the 2009 NCAA Outdoor Championships, in addition to the annual John McDonnell Invitational. The 2006 SEC and 2009 NCAA meets were the first in what promises to be a long line of prominent events slated for the facility.

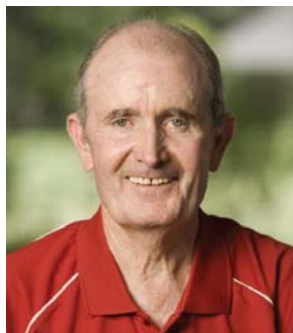

Legendary University of Arkansas cross country and track and field head coach John McDonnell announced his retirement on April 21, 2008 following 36 years, 40 NCAA championships and 84 conference titles.

McDonnell's 40 national titles are more than any coach in any single-gender program in the history of collegiate athletics. He won five national triple crowns, 21 conference triple crowns, 34 consecutive cross country conference championships, including 17 straight in the Southeastern Conference, and has been named national, regional or conference coach of the year a total of 140 times.

From County Mayo, Ireland, McDonnell became head cross country coach of the Razorbacks in 1972, and head track and field coach in 1977-78. Since 1984, he won 19 national championships in indoor track, 10 in outdoor track and 11 in cross country. Since 1984, a total of 69 national titles have been awarded in those three sports, and McDonnell's teams won all but 29 of them.

His five national triple crowns came in 1984-85, 1991-92, 1992-93, 1994-95 and 1998-99; his 84 league titles include 46 in the SEC and 38 in the Southwest Conference, and a streak of 25 straight in all three sports from 1987-95; his 40 national championships include a string of 12 straight indoor titles from 1984-95, the longest streak of NCAA titles by any Division I school in any sport in collegiate history; and his teams have won at least one national championship in 21 of the last 26 years.

McDonnell, who earned his bachelor's degree from Louisiana-Lafayette in 1969, and coached at New Providence (N.J.) High School (1969-70) and Lafayette (La.) High School (1971) before coming to Arkansas, has won 16 more national titles than his next closest competitor (Pat Henry, LSU and Texas A&M), and only one other school, Texas-El Paso with three, has won a triple crown.

In addition to the championships, his list of honors includes membership in the halls of fame for National Track and Field, United States Track and Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA), USA Track and Field, Arkansas Sports and Louisiana-Lafayette as well as the University of Arkansas Hall of Honor. Arkansas' 7,000-seat outdoor facility, John McDonnell Field, is named in his honor.

A 30-time national coach of the year, 50-time conference coach of the year and 62-time region coach of the year, he coached all but three of Arkansas' 187 All-Americans. Those student-athletes combined to earn 656 All-America honors.

He also coached 25 Olympians, including a gold, silver and bronze medalist, 103 NCAA individual event champions and 326 individual event conference champions.

McDonnell won 46 of a possible 51 SEC championships (90 percent), including the 2008 indoor and outdoor conference titles.

McDonnell, who coached former Razorback Daniel Lincoln to the American record in the 3,000-meter steeplechase in July 2006, has been national coach of the year 12 times in indoor track, 11 times in outdoor track and seven times in cross country for a total of 30 awards. He was also named the NCAA Midwest Regional Coach of the Year three of the five years it has been presented (2003-05).

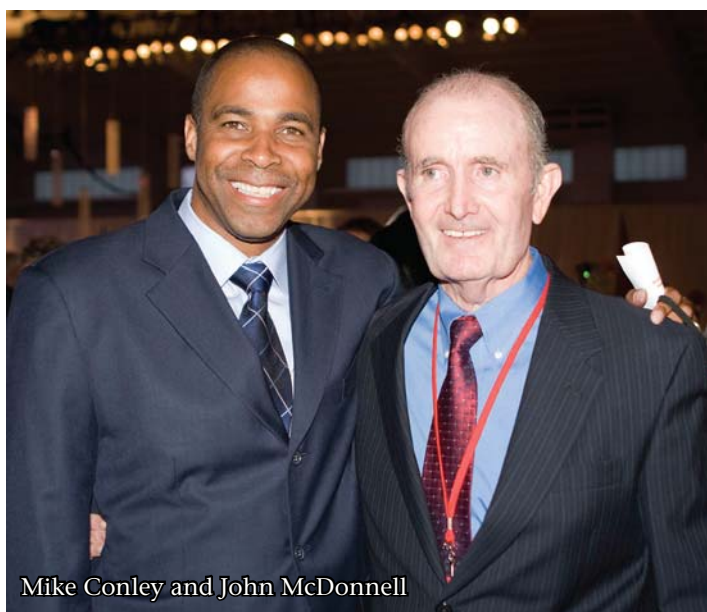
His tenure at Arkansas began in 1972 coaching cross country and assisting Ed Renfrow with the track program. When Renfrow left coaching, former Athletic Director Frank Broyles promoted McDonnell in time for the 1977-78 academic year.

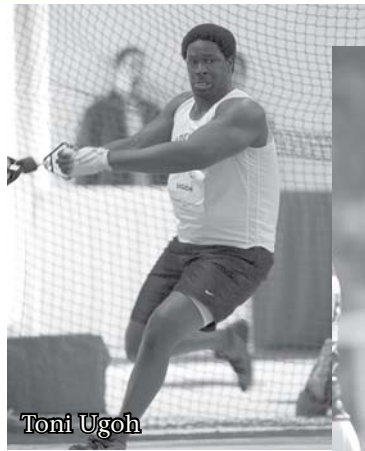
Not only does the University of Arkansas allow its student-athletes to compete in two sports, it encourages it. Arkansas' legendary track and field program has combined forces with the Razorbacks' tradition-rich football program to provide student-athletes a chance to compete in the nation's most competitive conference in multiple sports.

Most recently, two-sport standout Cobi Hamilton used his athleticism on the track and on the football field. During the 2010 season, Hamilton was a member of Arkansas' 4x100-meter relay that advanced to the NCAA Championships.

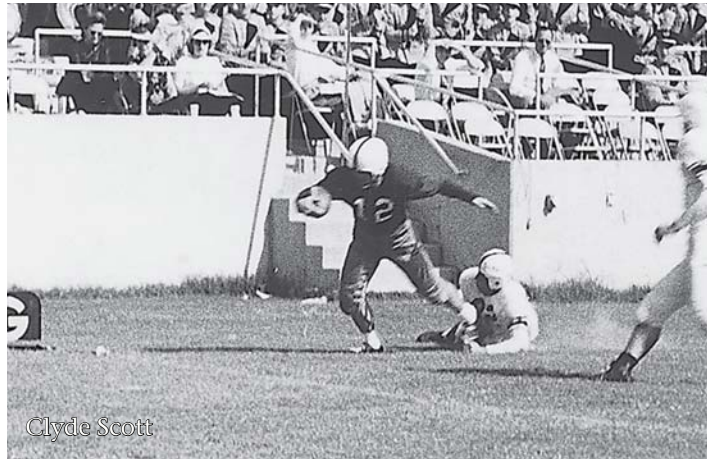
UA's most well-known two-sport star, and perhaps the greatest athlete in school history, is Clyde "Smackover" Scott. After a year of playing for the Naval Academy, he returned to Arkansas and helped the Hogs win the Southwest Conference football title in 1946 and was a consensus All-American in 1948. A NCAA champion in the 110-meter hurdles, he finished second in that event at the 1948 Olympics, winning a silver medal in London with a time of 13.7 seconds.

Offensive guard Tony Ugoh gave Arkansas strength in the throws department, helping rack up points in the weight throw at the 2006 SEC Indoor Championships.

Two-time All-American sprinter and cornerback Ahmad Carroll was the 25th pick of the first round by the Green Bay Packers in 2004. Flanker Richard Smith was a two-time All-American in the long and triple jumps as a Razorback and signed with Kansas City in 2004. Split end Tom Crowder (Dallas) and cornerback Eddie Jackson (Miami) were also taken in the 2004 NFL draft. Jackson was an All-American hurdler, while Crowder was a decathlete.

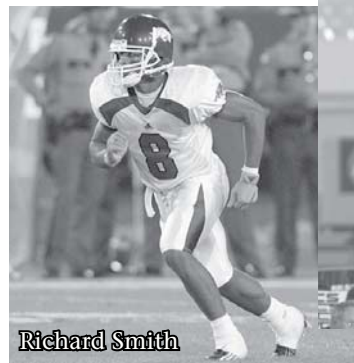

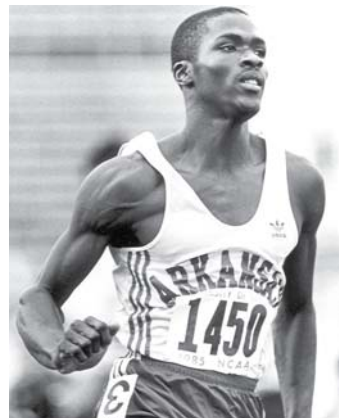

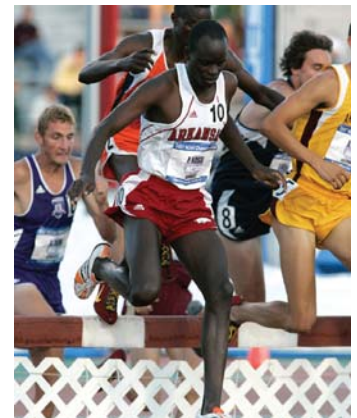
