# Shimadzu Visits Campus

The Arkansas Statewide Mass Spectrometry Facility and the Department of Chemistry hosted a meeting initiated by **Don Bobbitt**, the UA system president and Shimadzu Scientific (represented by Derek Selvidge, Dave Jorissen, and Ben Figard) to discuss potentially upgrading the scientific equipment holdings of the U of A for both teaching and research applications. Shimadzu Scientific has become interested in increasing its influence in the US market, in part by making substantial donations to US colleges and universities. They have had prior successful interactions regionally with Southern Arkansas University in Magnolia, and the University of Texas at Arlington, where they established the Shimadzu Center for Ad-



vanced Analytical Chemistry. In fact, it was reported that last year they gave the single largest donation to the University of Texas at Arlington. The aim of this visit to our campus was to explore establishing a similar sort of arrangement with researchers on this campus and perhaps system wide.
