RANDALL FAUST is a Horn player. Over the past decades has held a variety of roles, including Composer, Secretary, President, and as a faculty member at Western Illinois University in Macomb, Illinois. He has performed at the Illinois Horn Festival every year and his horn playing and hornist includes over 100 performances including Western Illinois Brass Quintet and LaMoine Brass Quintet, Auburn University, and he has received two citations of honor and the Award in 2009 and Honorary

As a member of the Camille Saint Saëns Society, he has given concerts and clinics through TriStates Public Radio, and the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, and John Stebbins Records. He was also a member of the Brass Quintet—that has been

Randall Faust has been active in the field of horn studies and have been performed in many venues such as the Carnegie Hall. His works have been recorded on Summit Records, and ACA Records.

One significant project is the Horn Studies Project. He is an Honorary Member and President of the International Horn Society. Randall has compiled a series of horn studies, solos, and a series of studies—The Art of the Horn—concepts of Dr. Howells and a collection of solo works for horn ensemble.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHY

RANDALL FAUST is a Hornist and Composer living in Macomb, Illinois.

Over the past decades has served the International Horn Society in a variety of roles, including Composition Contest Coordinator, Advisory Council Member, Secretary, President, and as Host of the 41st International Symposium—held at Western Illinois University in 2009. In addition, he hosted the annual Western Illinois Horn Festival every year from 2002-2018. His experience as a professor and hornist includes over four decades with various institutions and ensembles including Western Illinois University as Hornist of the Camerata Woodwind Quintet and LaMoine Brass Quintet, The National Music Camp/Interlochen Arts Camp, Auburn University, and The Shenandoah Conservatory of Music. He has received two citations of honor from the International Horn Society: The Punto Award in 2009 and Honorary Membership in 2016.

As a member of the Camerata Woodwind Quintet, Dr. Faust regularly performed concerts and clinics throughout the country, has regularly been heard on WIUM—TriStates Public Radio, and has recorded quintets by Jacques Hétu, Anthony Iannaccone, and John Steinmentz with The Camerata Woodwind Quintet on Crystal Records. He was also the Hornist of Western Illinois University's LaMoine Brass Quintet—that has hosted an annual BRASSFEST since 1998.

Randall Faust has been active as a composer for over fifty years. His compositions have been performed in concert at several International Brass Symposia—as well as venues such as the National Gallery of Art, and the Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall. His works have been discussed in several doctoral dissertations, and have been recorded on Albany Records, MSR Classics, Crystal Records, Summit Records, and ACA Digital Recordings.

One significant project has been the publication of the horn music of I.H.S. Honorary Member and Punto Award Recipient Marvin Howe. At Dr. Howe's request, Randall has compiled, edited, and published many of Marvin Howe's manuscripts of horn studies, solos, and ensemble transcriptions. These include the ongoing series of studies—*The Advancing Hornist*, an instructional video illustrating the concepts of Dr. Howe's treatise on stopped horn technique—*How to Stop a Horn*, and a collection of solos for horn and piano—*The Solo Hornist*, as well as various works for horn ensembles.
