ARTIST BIOGRAPHIES

Belgian pianist HELEN BECQUÉ gave her European début at the age of nine, performing a solo recital in a benefit concert for cancer awareness. At 11 she was a Finalist in the National Piano Competition of Liège ('André Modeste Grétry'), Belgium, and at 15 she won first prize in the Geraardsbergen Piano Competition for Young Musicians. But since her childhood and subsequent studies, it is her consistently thoughtful, emotionally-committed and technicallyscintillating performances which have made her an increasingly sought-after young artist in Europe and in North America. Helen credits growing up in a 'polyglot' environment as vital to her strong background in languages. This, in combination with her love of song, the human voice, and the piano has proven thus far an enormous catalyst in the success of her career. Helen is delighted to have had the opportunities she has, and looks forward to much more beautiful music-making in the future.

DR. JONATHAN STINSON joins the faculty as Teaching Assistant Professor of Music. Baritone Jonathan Stinson has appeared in leading and supporting roles with opera companies throughout North American and Europe, including Cincinnati Opera, Lyric Opera of Kansas City, Kentucky Opera, Opera Omaha, Opera Memphis, Dayton Opera, Cleveland Opera, Central City Opera, Ohio Light Opera, Opera New Jersey, as well as abroad in Italy, England, and Bulgaria. He made his international debut in Cortona, Italy in 2010, singing the title role of Don Giovanni. In the 2019-2020 season, he sang Lescaut in Manon Lescaut at The Cleveland Opera and appeared as a soloist with Connecticut Choral Artists in Handel's Messiah. Dr. Stinson has appeared as soloist with the Kentucky Symphony, Cincinnati Chamber Orchestra, the Carmel Bach Festival (CA), the Orchestra of Northern New York, Lafavette Symphony (IN), Liberty Symphony (MO), and Battle Creek Symphony (MI). Recent solo work includes the Requiem of Fauré, Duruflé, and Brahms, Bach's complete Weinachts-Oratorium, Mendelssohn's Von Himmel hoch, Handel's Messiah, Israel in Egypt, and Alexander's Feast, Britten's Cantata Misericordium, Vaughan-Williams' Dona nobis pacem, and John Adams' The Wound Dresser.

A native of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and citizen of the Chickasaw Nation, LAUREN NICOLE CLARE began her professional career as a vocalist in 2001 when she gave a solo recital for the Carol Brice Series at age seventeen. After pursuing a bachelor of music degree in vocal performance at Oral Roberts University, Lauren returned home to sing as a chorus member for the Cimarron Opera Company's summer production of Gilbert & Sullivan's Iolanthe. That fall, Lauren began studies as a coloratura soprano at the esteemed Wanda L. Bass School of Music at Oklahoma City University where she graduated with high honors in the masters of music degree program for vocal performance. While at OCU, Lauren participated in the Miss OCU program in order to pay for her studies and won. As Miss OCU 2006, she went on to win rookie talent, overall talent and interview awards at Miss Oklahoma, finishing as 4th runner up. After graduating with her masters in 2007, Lauren began working as the vocalist for a local jazz trio and serving as vocal coach within the Miss OCU organization. In addition, she opened up a private home voice studio and also worked as a choral liaison for the Summer Arts Institute at Quartz Mountain.

LENORA GREEN-TURNER joins the department's faculty as teaching assistant professor of music. An American Soprano, Green-Turner, a native of Macon, Georgia has been hailed by Opera News as an impressive vocalist and the New York Times as a most expressive singer. She has sung such roles as Mimi (La Boheme); Mary (Highway 1, U. S. A.); Countess Susanna (II Segreto di Susanna); First Lady (The Magic Flute), Donna Anna (Don Giovanni), title role Suor Angelica, Berta (II Barbiere di Siviglia), High Priestess (Aida), Antonia (Les Contes d'Hoffmann). Green-Turner also holds many awards, namely the Jane Willson Emerging Artist award, Leo Rogers Scholarship/Sarasota Opera Guild; MONC Encouragement Award, regional NATS, William Knight Competition, MTNA Young Artist Program, Former Artist-In-Residence for Stax Music Academy, LeMoyne-Owen College, and Opera Memphis (2013-2017). Green-Turner earned her D.M.A. and M.M. from University of Michigan and her Performance Diploma from Indiana University.
